**2004-05 SC Teaching Scholarship Grants**

During the 2001 legislative session, the General Assembly approved the South Carolina Education Lottery Act. One provision of this act provides that teachers who hold a professional or an initial certificate and teach in the public schools of the State will be awarded grants not to exceed \$1000 per year to attend the State's public and independent colleges and universities for the purposes of upgrading existing core content area skills or obtaining a Master's Degree in the teacher's core content area (see Guidelines). The act further stipulates that if there are insufficient funds in the Education Lottery Account to provide the grant to each eligible recipient for a particular year, priority must be given to those classroom teachers (i.e., not administrators, counselors, media specialists, or other support personnel) whose teaching areas are critical need subject areas as defined by the State Board of Education.

In order to be eligible to apply for a SC Teaching Scholarship Grant, an applicant must meet the following requirements:

- ✓ Be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident who meets the definition of an eligible non-citizen under the State Residency Statute
- ✓ Be a South Carolina resident
- ✓ Hold a professional or an initial teaching certificate as defined and conferred by the State Department of Education

- ✓ Be under contract as a teacher in a SC public school

Also, applicants must meet one of the two following criteria:

- ✓ Be accepted as a degree-seeking graduate student in the teaching field (core content teaching area, early childhood, elementary, middle level, secondary, or special education at the Master's level or higher) and be enrolled in good standing at an eligible S.C. based institution, with appropriate documentation provided; OR
- ✓ Be enrolled for graduate or undergraduate courses in current teaching field (fields are described above) or in a teaching field in which add-on certification is being sought with appropriate documentation provided at an eligible S.C.-based institution

The application for the Teaching Scholarship Grant is an electronic application. Agate Software in Michigan developed and maintains the website for the electronic application. Applicants are required to apply electronically and mail in supporting documents such as an "official transcript," a Principal's Letter of Endorsement, a Statement of Commitment, and a copy of their teaching certificate.

The Grant is opened twice a year. The application opens in November for those applicants who took courses during Summer II 2004 and/or Fall 2004. It also opens in May for those applicants who took courses during Spring 2005, and/or Summer I 2005. The teachers are required to pay for the courses and CHE reimburses those eligible applicants once official transcripts are received from the respective institutions.

For the 2004-05 fiscal year, \$815,000 was disbursed to award \$1000 to each of the 815 eligible Teaching Grant recipients. The following pages provide detailed reports to include: recipients by race; recipients by gender; recipients by graduate level; number of Teaching Grants awarded per institution; recipients by county of origin; recipients by school district; content areas; and recipients by public school.
