Separate allegations of misconduct involving county employees and County Council members that became a part of the investigation also were unfounded, a SLED report says.

Nikki Haley, state Senate President Pro Tempore Hugh Letherman, state Attorney General Alan Wilson and the state Ethics Commission, complaining about "SLED being used for political purposes."
