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**More Character in Our Communities** by Adam Conyers



Nelson Mandela is attributed with having said, "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world." The time for students in our area to resume arming themselves with scholastic munitions with which to "change the world" is getting under way this month. If only equal emphasis were placed on teaching a discernment, appreciation and/or acknowledgement of the importance of wisdom and higher standards, or any standards at all where morality is concerned, for individuals and as a society when it comes to making changes. ## A LITTLE HISTORY BY ELAINE HUNT

John C. Harris was born in Oconee County near Townville on October 13<sup>th</sup>, 1947, received a common school education. His father, the late B. B. Harris, was a great grandson of General Andrew Pickens, the Revolutionary hero who lies buried at the Stone Church near Fort Hill.

Mr. Harris worked on his father's farm until towards the close of the war when he was drawn into service by the call that swept the Confederacy "from Cradle to the grave." He served until Johnson's surrender in a Calvary company of 17-year-olds commanded by Captain J. Doran Kay.

Returning home, he attended school at Townville a year or two and then engaged in regular farming. For several years, he superintended the farm of Hon. T. G. Clemson at Fort Hill. In 1882, he engaged in merchandising at Townville, which he followed several years successfully. Of late, he has devoted his time to farming exclusively. He runs his farm on scientific principles and the results is profitable crops and improved lands.

He is a believer in thoroughbred stock and has on his farm quite a number of Jersey cows. From six of these he markets 2,200 pounds of butter per year in round numbers and this he sells readily at 20 cents per pound. This is \$73 profit per head, for Mr. Harris estimates that the cost of keeping these cows is fully offset by the natural increase and the barnyard manure obtained. With the mild he fattens the meat used on is place largely so that it is clearly demonstrated that keeping registered cows pays.

Mr. Harris is the man about whose successful experience in raising hogs the *Charleston News and Courier* wrote chapters of commendation a year or so ago. He is one of a hundred who makes their farms self-supporting and has sounded the keynote of agricultural independence and supremacy.

In state politics, he is a dyed in the wool reformer. Mr. Harris has been a ruling elder in the Townville Presbyterian Church for some twelve years and has the confidence and respect of all who know him. *The Anderson Intelligencer.*, September 30, 1896, Souvenir Edition

**August is the right time to prune many things in your landscape.**  
Prune! In August!?

Pruning increases density of young plants, so pruning your small, new plants may be more important than pruning older plants. Pruning encourages new growth. Plants that block windows on your house, grow out over sidewalks and driveways need pruning. However if your plant is not too large for the space, is full and dense...leave it alone! Every plant does not need to look like a meatball either.

While it may seem counter-intuitive to prune plants in the summer, it's the best time for a lot of your landscape plants. The theory of pruning once a year is not a good one...a better theory is: "Prune plants right after they bloom" is a better one. Here is a good partial list of plants that are common in many local landscapes.

Hydrangea macrophylla (Blue Mophead types) and Hydrangea quercifolia (Oakleaf hydrangea) both can be pruned now. The flowers grow on old wood, so summer pruning assures new growth in the fall that will bear flowers next year. Cut back up to half way in August. Fertilize with slow release fertilizer and water.

Roses don't love the high heat of our summer and now is a good time to cut them back to encourage a great end of season bloom cycle. Feed and water deeply.

Perennials that look bad can be rejuvenated. I cut back my sun scalded Hosta every summer and they look great again in a month. Spent daylilies, coneflowers, and iris can be cut back. All will regrow with fresh new growth and some will rebloom for you. Feed and water deeply.

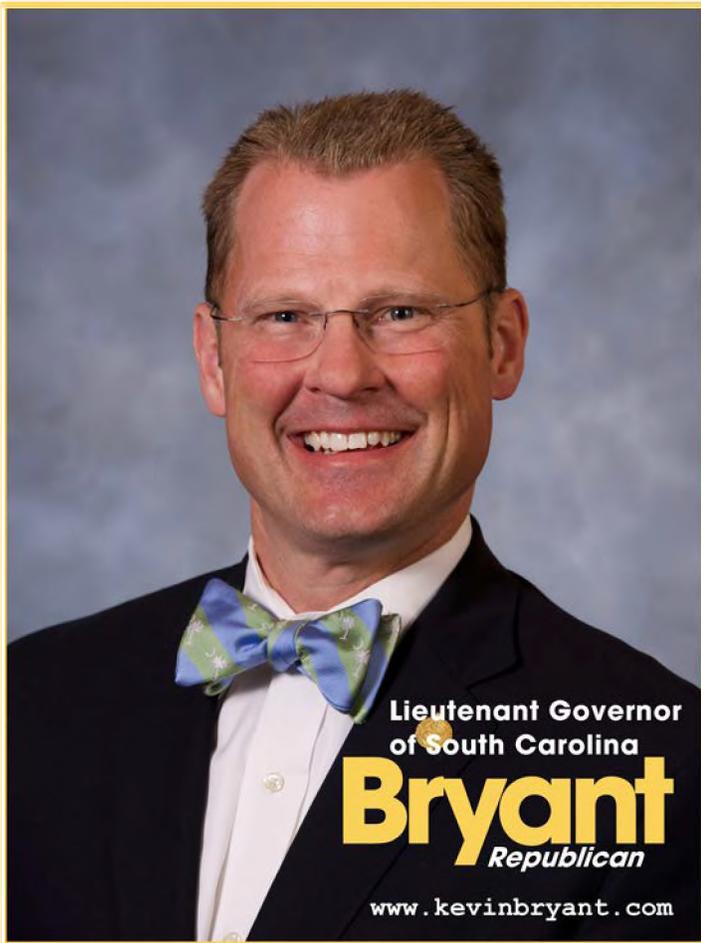
Loropetalum chinensis is commonly called Fringe-flower. The most common forms have deep plum colored leaves and bloom with bright fuchsia blooms in spring and fall. This plant grows rapidly and is often too large for the space it was given. NEVER prune this plant in the fall because the rapid new growth always gets frost burned. Prune in August. I've cut 12' tall Loropetalum back to 4' tall when needed. Normal pruning is "Up to 1/3 of the plant" at a time. Feed and water deeply.

Conifers can be pruned in summer. Gold mop cypress, junipers, Leyland cypress, arborvitae, etc... Can be shaped or cut back and expect a flush of new growth in a few weeks. Feed and water deeply.

Gardenia jasminoides can be summer pruned. Most are done blooming. Up to 1/3 of the plant can be cut back. Feed and water deeply.

**August featured product is summer fertilizers for your landscape.** When feeding your plants in the summer, use slow release types. The best are old fashioned farm by-product fertilizers. ## Veterinary News

This month's behavior topic is on cats and inappropriate elimination (ie not using the litterbox). The first things to realize is that this is not due to spite or an attempt to harm their owner. So do not be angry or punish the cat – instead figure out what is causing the problem and focus on fixing it.

The most common cause we see is that the cat does not have a clean litterbox in a location that the cat is comfortable going to. The box should be scooped twice a day if you are having litterbox problems with your cat and it should be fully cleaned with new litter weekly. To make your cat comfortable with the box, you should have one box per cat plus one. This makes sure all of them can get to a clean box readily. Also have the boxes in more than one location. Sometimes a bully cat won't let a submissive cat come to the litterbox comfortably. Next, have several litter types available and don't change litter suddenly. You can even try dirt if your cat was originally an outdoor cat. Also make sure you didn't put the box in a location that is scary to the cat like near the washing machine (the sound it makes may scare some cats).

Once you've made sure you are providing multiple boxes with various litter types and are cleaning them very regularly, the next step is to check for medical problems your cat may have. Cats can commonly get a condition called feline lower urinary tract disease which is similar to interstitial cystitis in women. Basically the cat feels like he has a UTI though bacteria are rarely found. This can come and go. If the cat was having bladder pain when he urinated in his box, he will associate the box with pain. That can make him avoid the box. Actual UTI's can also occur as can bladder stones. Your vet will run a urine test, blood tests, and xrays to determine if there is a medical reason for these symptoms.

If all of this does not solve the elimination problem, then behavior management needs to be considered. Many cats who don't use the litterbox have underlying stress or separation anxiety. The behavioral management is way too involved to explain in one article as it has to be tailored to each individual cat. However, the basic premise is decreasing stress – this can be done through pheromones, prescription diet, and / or medications.

Please don't assume your cat is untreatable because he/she doesn't use his/her litterbox – instead work with your vet to figure out the cause.

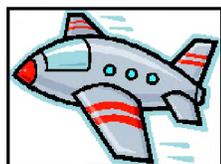

## Drink Up, Grouchy!

The cells throughout your body must have water to function. They contain, and are surrounded by, water. In dehydration, cell membranes become less permeable, hampering the flow of hormones and nutrients into the cell and preventing waste products that cause cell damage from flowing out. When that's happening throughout your body, your energy is sapped, and fatigue and sour mood can take over.

How much water do you need? The most agreed-upon recommendation is six to eight 8-ounce glasses of water daily. This could change though, depending on the climate (such as our August weather) and the type of lifestyle you lead. Your brain is hugely dependent on fluid to function. All those synapses and neurons need liquid to fire properly. One of the most reliable predictors of decline in memory and mental performance is dehydration. And yet some polls estimate that upwards of 75 percent of Americans suffer from chronic dehydration. Mild dehydration interferes with brain processing and breaks down the ability to focus.

Just like sleep, water is one of the most essential needs of your body. In fact, since we're made up of so much water, it makes sense why we would constantly need it to replenish, cleanse and feed our system. Even a 2 percent drop in hydration can cause significant losses in strength and motivation while increasing feelings of fatigue. When we take in the right amount of water for bodies, our muscles become more relaxed, which increases energy and maximizes our performance.

Ever find yourself into the ice cream in your fridge late at night or taking a sampling of your kid's Goldfish, even though you know better? More often than not, hunger is mistaken for thirst. If you downed some water instead of that junk food, you would feel just as full. A new study involving more than 18,000 adults found that when people increased their daily water intake by one to three cups (on top of the four they drank on average), their food intake dropped by as much as 205 calories a day, a significant amount when it comes to weight control.

Even slight dehydration can start wrecking your mood. That's barely low enough to feel thirsty, and yet at that level of dehydration, the moods of those in a study soured and they were more likely to experience headaches and fatigue. So drink up. If you get tired of drinking good 'ole fashioned H2O, consider upping your game by making your 'brew' sparkling or flavored. Water with bubbles offers the same benefits of regular water, and added fruit can make the negative, tasteless sensation of water more interesting.

The gooks walked out into the opening in the center of the village. They were still laughing and joking. I didn't know whether to fire or not as we didn't know if there were more behind them. All of a sudden they stopped and looked around. I whispered, "Get ready to fire." The gooks just stood there and was looking around when I said, "Fire!" We all emptied a magazine apiece and all seven gooks were dead on the ground. I told Roberts and Banks to quickly check the bodies for any documents and collect their weapons. As they were collecting the weapons I radioed Sgt Weaver and informed him what the shooting was about and that we were heading back to his position as quickly as possible. Roberts and Banks returned to my position with seven AK-47 rifles and 2 pistols. They said there wasn't any documents on the gooks. As I was getting ready to tell them to move out I heard some yelling coming from the area where the gooks had just come from. I told my radio operator to inform Sgt Weaver that we heard yelling and there's a possibility we might have gooks chasing us as we get back to the platoon. We quickly moved from the hooch where we were back to the thick vegetation. We quickly entered the jungle and stopped and looked behind us to see if anyone had seen us. All of a sudden several gooks appeared where the bodies were and stopped and looked around. They were talking and several pointing in different directions. I whispered to be ready to move if they start toward us. I grabbed a grenade to throw if they started toward us. All of a sudden they moved quickly in the opposite direction, apparently thinking we had moved in that direction. I told my men to move out toward the platoon's position which was about 300 to 400 meters from us. I told Roberts to keep a steady eye on our rear to make sure no one was following us. We stopped several times to listen for any sounds coming from the direction of the village. In 20 minutes or so we reached the platoon and Sgt Weaver met us and after saying job well done for killing the gooks and getting their weapons, he said that there were 2 gun ships ready to blast the village and area when given the word that we were out of the area. He passed the word for everyone to get as low as possible and gave word for the gun ships to give them hell. After 30 minutes or so of strafing the village and surrounding area they informed Sgt Weaver they were returning to home base.

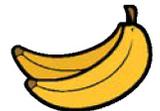
## What's Cookin' With Willie Ann

Business at the stand has been really great, thanks to all of you. We are so thankful for everyone that has come by this summer.

I have been continuously trying to keep things planted, so we don't run out. With all this heat it really has been a challenge, but we have been so thankful for all the rain this spring and summer. I believe this year we all will have plenty of hay. We have to cut the okra every other day and it sure is hard in this heat. We sell lots of okra. 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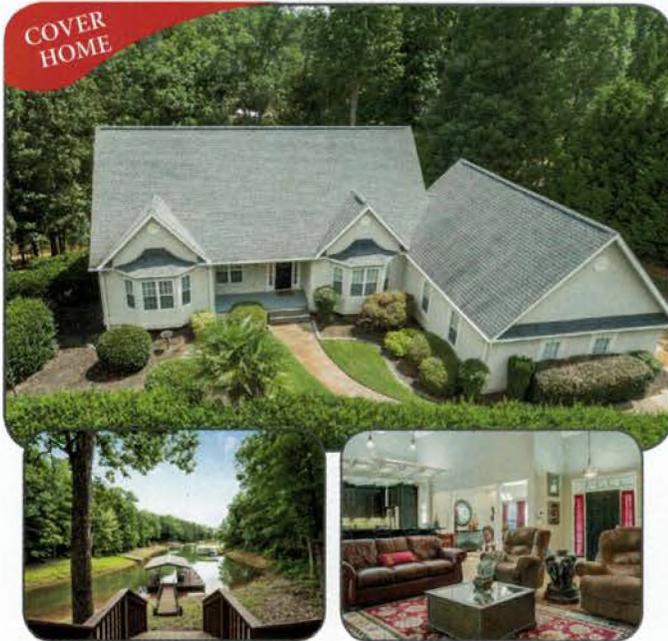
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# Meet Your Neighbors at Vacation Bible School

## The Oconee County Sheriff's Office Provides Information on New Vehicle Child Restraint Laws in South Carolina



With new legislation recently passed in Columbia by the South Carolina Legislature on new vehicle child restraint laws, the Oconee County Sheriff's Office is issuing this press release today in order to inform our citizens about changes in the law.

“The Sheriff's Office is responsible for keeping all of the citizens of Oconee County safe,” says Oconee County Sheriff Mike Crenshaw. “Part of that responsibility is to inform and educate our citizens when changes in laws occurs that could affect them and their families and in the interest of full transparency, we wanted to pass this information along in order to help parents and children remain safe.”

The law, which went into effect on May 19<sup>th</sup> of this year, covers six different areas:

In regards to rear facing car seats, the former law stated children from birth to age one weighing less than 20 pounds had to be in a rear facing seat. The new law states that children from birth to age two must be rear facing in a rear passenger seat until the child exceeds the height or weight limit of the child's rear facing car seat.

Secondly, the old law stated that a child ages one to six weighing between 20 and 40 pounds could be in a forward facing seat with a harness. The new law states that a child at least two years of age or a child under age two who has outgrown their rear facing seat needs to be secured in a forward-facing car seat in a rear passenger seat. The new law also notes that a child should not move forward to a booster seat until they exceed the height or weight of their forward-facing seat, however, this can occur at different ages for children. Remember the term “fit” drives the decision, not the age of the child.

In regards to booster seats, the old law states that a child ages one to six weighing between 40 to 80 pounds can be in a booster seat. The new law states that a child at least four years of age who has outgrown their forward-facing seat needs to be secured in a rear passenger seat until they can meet the height and fit requirements for an adult safety seat belt.

Fourth, under the old law, children ages one to six who weighs more than 80 pounds could wear a seat belt. Under the new law, a child at least 8 years of age or who is at least 4'9" tall may be restrained with a seat belt if the lap belt fits across the child's thighs and hips, not across the abdomen; the shoulder belt crosses the center of the child's chest and not the neck; and the child is able to sit with his or her back against the seat without slouching.

In regards to riding in a front seat, the previous law stated that a child must be age six or older in the front seat unless the car had no rear passenger seat or the rear passenger seat fully occupied by children under the age of six. The new law states that only a child who is capable of meeting the fit requirements for an adult seat belt can sit in the front seat. There is an exception for vehicles with no rear passenger seat or vehicles whose rear passenger seating is occupied by children under the age of eight.

There are two special exceptions. First, for medical reasons that are substantiated with written documentation from the child's physician, advanced nurse practitioner or physician assistant, a child who is unable to be transported in a standard child passenger safety restraint system may be transported in a standard child passenger safety restraint system designed for his medical needs. Also, any portion of a recreational vehicle that is equipped with temporary living quarters shall be considered a rear passenger seat.

“On June 1st, the Sheriff's Office issued a citation against an individual who was arrested for reckless driving in regards to a child passenger restraint violation,” continues Sheriff Crenshaw. “There was a three year old, according to our deputy, in the floor board of the cab of the pickup and two juveniles were located in the bed of the pickup, which was a Dodge Ram 1500 pickup. The Sheriff's Office will issue citations to individuals who do not have children properly restrained in their vehicles according to the law. The safety of all our citizens is our utmost priority.”



## Abortion Funding: A Single Penny is a Penny Too Much

Imagine someone murdering little children and then joking about how they did it. Well that is exactly what attendees of the 2014 and 2015 National Abortion Federation conventions did in an alleged video that has recently surfaced. The content of their conversations is shocking, disgusting, and repellent to me and millions of Americans.

In this video, a Planned Parenthood employee says that an unborn child "is a tough little object" and "very difficult" to dismember. An ACLU lawyer complained about the difficulty of breaking a tiny skull--and the audience laughed. And a Planned Parenthood official discussed the sale of the tissue of these murdered children by saying, "the truth is that some might want to do it ... to increase their revenues. And we can't stop them."

I hate what these people do to children, and their vocabulary reflects their total desensitization to the miracle of human life. I pray that someday God will touch their hearts and children will be saved, but until then, I will fight them at every turn.

The truth is that abortion facilities in our state, including Planned Parenthood, receive your money. Planned Parenthood alone received almost \$360,000 from the taxpayer between 2011 and 2016. That money, your money, enhanced their ability to take innocent, young lives.

In South Carolina, abortion providers, like Planned Parenthood, have potential access to three sources of taxpayer funds

The first is Medicaid Title X sub-grants. The second is funds through Medicaid reimbursements for health services supplied by abortion providers. For example, from 2011-2015 South Carolina Medicaid paid for 29 abortions. Similarly, the third source of funding comes from reimbursements from the state employee health plan which has reimbursed providers for 11 abortions since 2011.

I cannot tolerate your taxpayer dollars facilitating the murder of children. A single penny for any service is a penny too much to fund an abortion provider because regardless of the service, funding to these providers supports abortion. We can stop it in South Carolina, and that should be the priority for all of us.

## Computer Tips from Tom King Townville Computer Repairs 864-287-1511

I've always found it real handy to be able to access all my computer's files, as well as my user files (Documents, Pictures, Music etc.) right from the desktop. And you can create "shortcuts" on your desktop to do just that. Just right click in any blank area on the desktop, and left click Personalize. Then click "Change desktop icons" in the upper left area. Place a check next to "Computer" and "User's files" click Apply, then OK, and the new shortcuts are now on your desktop. In Windows 10, you'll have to click Personalize – Themes – and then Change desktop icons (good ol' Windows 10 – like chewing gum with your teeth out).

Every version of Windows always needs a major overhaul or two, called a "Service Pack". XP needed three Service Pack updates, Vista two, Windows 7 one. If you didn't install all Service Packs through Windows Update, you would no longer get the latest updates. Then click the Store icon. If you see in the upper left that 8.1 is available, be sure to agree to it and do the upgrade.

Yoga is too weird. Yoga is too new-agey, and not a good enough workout, and I can't do it because I am not flexible enough. Sitting around with your legs criss-cross-applesauce humming "Ooommm" is awkward. If anyone sees me doing it, they'll laugh their heads off at me. When I workout, I want to work, not be all yawny and stretchy.

Those were all the lines and excuses I gave to people over the years who tried to convince me to try yoga. I resisted and resisted until, in 2007, I developed a knee injury that prevented me from running. Around the same time, I ran across some blurb on TV about Jennifer Anniston loving something called Power Yoga—something she did for about 10 minutes per day. I thought I had won the fitness lottery: look like Jennifer Anniston with no more commitment than just 10 minutes per day?! Sign me up! But when I searched for Power Yoga, the best I could find was a DVD with 3 workouts on it that were 50-60 minutes each. With great skepticism, I ordered the DVD. I read that it is best to watch through the entire workout before attempting it and, while I can't dispute the wisdom in that advice, as far as preparing you for the workout, in a way, it was a huge mistake. It was a mistake in the sense that watching what a rollercoaster is going to do to you is a mistake. I love rollercoasters, but if I look at them before I get on, they seem impossibly scary, and I sometimes have a hard time boarding. I have found that if I just get on with no knowledge of what is to come, it is all a big, fun thrill, and over before I know it. Some of the stuff they were doing in that video looked impossible. I thought someone must have removed those people's bones, to let them twist and fold and contort like that. With my yogic skepticism at an all-time high, I unrolled my new mat and started doing the things the instructor, Bryan Kest, said. Miracle of miracles, I was able to do the entire first workout, including the human pretzel parts, which I had anticipated having to sit out. If I had tried getting into those poses each on their own, without his constructing the architecture of them through the series of poses, it never would have happened.

I learned something about yoga I had certainly never understood, but which Bryan kept reiterating: "yoga is not about being loose or strong, yoga is about being alive." 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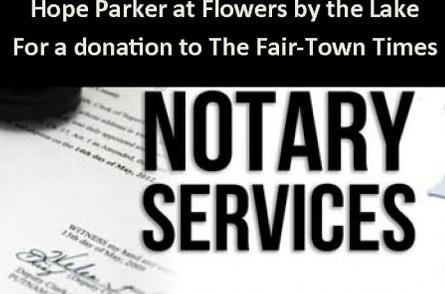
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## The Sandifer Update: Balanced budget and new laws

After a very productive legislative session, it is nice to be home in Seneca during the summer months. I continue to spend time at the Statehouse in Columbia, with committee hearings and important meetings. But summer means I get to enjoy this lovely area more.

This year saw a number of new and important pieces of legislation pass than I can share in this month's column. I shared information about some important new laws last month too and I will continue to share more next month—2017 was a busy and productive session! My goal is to keep you up-to-date on the changes that impact you and your family. Here are a few highlights from a handful of the new laws:

- **Animal and human protection.** We passed a law imposing restrictions on the ownership of large wild cats, non-native bears and great apes as a means of furthering conservation efforts for the welfare of vulnerable, threatened and endangered species. We wanted to protect both the animals and the public against the potential safety risks posed by holding these kinds of animals in captivity.
- **Night hunting.** We made provisions to reduce the populations of some destructive animals, by allowing for a night hunting program for coyotes, armadillos and feral hogs.
- **Child safety.** We updated the age, weight, size and position requirements for child safety seats, keeping kids safe while traveling.
- **Food safety.** The new South Carolina Product Safety Act gives the SC Department of Agriculture authority to oversee new federal safety standards for certain produce items.
- **Crime victim support.** We consolidated the state's various crime victim services and funds in a division of the Attorney General's office. The SC Crime Victim Services Act makes it easier for crime victims to get the support they need.

Another critical piece of information to share is an update on the state budget, which determines how your hard-earned tax dollars are used. Because we operate on a balanced budget, our state is required to not commit to spend more than we bring in annually. Often, House members and Senators are called back to Columbia to re-vote on budget items that have received a veto from the governor. The good news this year is that Gov. McMaster vetoed a very small percentage of the items in our proposed \$8 billion state budget, so we are able to vote on those vetoes when we return to Columbia in January, a move that will save taxpayer dollars. As always, it is critical to point out that we do tuck away the maximum amount allowed in a reserve account, to be used for rainy days.

This year's budget includes an increase of roughly \$140 million in funding to our K-12 schools, as well as an additional \$10 million for our state's colleges and universities. In addition, we are investing \$68 million in Hurricane Matthew cleanup, \$150 million for our state's underfunded pension system and \$25 million to cover state employees' health insurance increases.

A. None. It's a woman's job.



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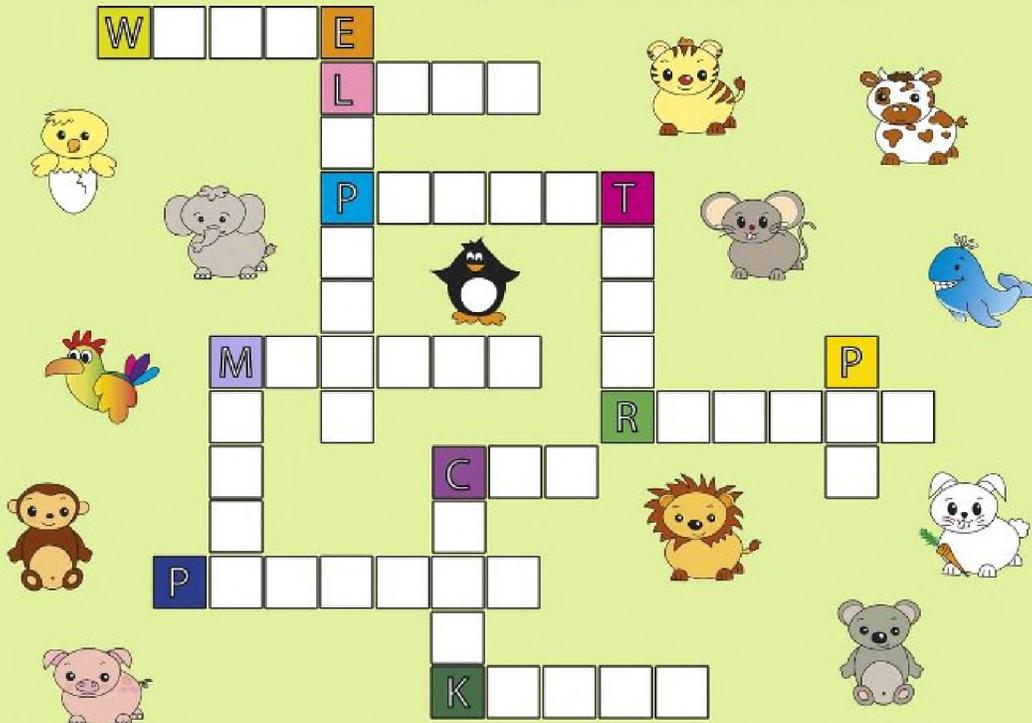
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
