Thanks for Joining Us! - Nurturing Developing Minds Conference & Small Talks Events

ICS was pleased to partner with the Children's Hospital and The Bradshaw Institute of the Greenville Health System on the 2018 Nurturing Developing Minds Conference and Research Symposium.

We began the convening with an afternoon of pre-session conference events, Building Resilience in the Face of ACEs and Opioids. ICS hosted a screening of the award-winning documentary Resilience, which explores our growing knowledge on the impact of toxic stress and how society can respond to prevent and help children overcome these impacts. ICS Senior Fellow Janice Gruendel led an interactive discussion following the film to encourage attendees to consider how their programs help build resilience and embrace trauma-informed care. Nearly 100 attendees joined us for the expert panel *The Opioid Epidemic, Adverse Childhood Experiences, and Implications for Healthcare and Education*, a far-ranging discussion on the intersection of education, medical, law enforcement, and child welfare for families and communities facing the impact of opioids. We appreciate the participation of our stellar panelists, Dr. Andrew Garner of Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine; Michelle Greco of the Child Abuse Prevention Program of Bradshaw Institute for Community Child Health & Advocacy; Captain Ryan Butler, North Division Commander, Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department; and our moderator

Marion Broome, Dean of the School of Nursing at Duke University and ICS Board Member.

ICS also moderated two research tracks for breakout sessions during Nurturing Developing Minds, focused on *Early Childhood Education and Learning*, *In and Out of the Classroom* and *Promoting Optimal Health and Development*, including a session on Medical-Legal Partnerships co-presented by our Associate Director of Policy Research Keller Anne Ruble and another on fostering equity on early childhood offered by our Director of Innovation and Inclusion Mary C. Garvey. Finally, ICS Senior Fellow Janice Gruendel conducted the last plenary session of the day, sending the 200 attendees out the door with a rousing call to action on behalf of families and children.

Opportunities for Special Education and Early Intervention in Pay for Success

As familiarity with Pay for Success models has grown in the U.S., there is significant interest in using this model to support chronically underfunded investments in early childhood education, welfare, and health. Special education is another area where early investments in what works can help prevent larger costs of remedial services in the future, improving outcomes for children and their families. In a [new paper](#) and accompanying [blog](#), ICS Director of Policy Research Megan Carolan and Vice President Bryan Boroughs explore the goals of current PFS projects in their consideration of special education outcomes and also push the conversation to the next level: how can PFS be used to expand and improve services for young children with disabilities?
