Report and Recommendations: Fighting Elder Financial Exploitation through Community Networks

The Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) released a report about how to fight elder financial exploitation by using community networks. The CFPB conducted research nationwide and with the assistance of the Federal Research Division of the Library of Congress, they attended network meetings and interviewed representatives from 23 elder protection networks and various experts in the field.

The CFPB also offered specific recommendations for existing networks and stakeholders to assist in the fight against exploitation.

2017 State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) Base Grant

The Administration for Community Living (ACL) released the 2017 State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) Base Grant Funding Opportunity Announcement. The SHIP was created by Congress in 1990 to provide education and assistance to Medicare-eligible individuals, their families and caregivers to assist in making informed health insurance decisions. There are currently 54 active SHIP grants; one in every state, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. The funds awarded through this application are for a three year project period running April 1, 2017 through March 31, 2020. Eligible applicants include state offices of insurance, the state Medicaid offices, or the departments on aging as designated by the state or territory, who demonstrate their ability and commitment to providing SHIP services state-wide. All awards

will be subject to the availability of federal funds and have a project period of up to three years. One SHIP grant will be awarded to cover each state, the District of Colombia, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. All applications must be electronically submitted by **11:59 p.m. ET on November 30, 2016**. There will be a conference call for potential applicants on **Tuesday, September 20, 2016 at 2:00 pm ET**. Report Identifying Ways to Maximize Social Security Benefits

On Wednesday, September 14, 2016, Senators Susan Collins (R-Maine) and Claire McCaskill (D-Missouri), the Chairman and Ranking Member of the Senate Aging Committee, held a hearing titled, "Maximizing Your Social Security Benefits: What You Need to Know." During the hearing, the Government Accountability Office (GAO) unveiled a new study that examined how Americans make decisions about when to claim their benefits. Witnesses for the hearing included: Charles Jeszeck, Director, Education, Workforce, and Income Security, U.S. Government Accountability Office; Virginia P. Reno, Deputy Commissioner for Retirement and Disability Policy, U.S. Social Security Administration; William Meyer, CEO, Social Security Solutions, Inc.; and Sita Nataraj Slavov, Professor of Public Policy, Schar School of Policy and Government at George Mason University.

Statewide Meetings for Consumer and Provider Feedback

Courtney Miller, Director of the Division of Developmental Disabilities is traveling statewide in September on a "Let's Talk" tour, designed to gain additional stakeholder input on services to be provided through the Developmental Disabilities Home and Community-Based Waivers. The waivers are identified as a priority in the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Business Plan. Miller is also looking for feedback on services provided through the Beatrice State Developmental Center services (BSDC) and the Bridges Program in Hastings.

Goals include strengthening access, coordination and integration of care through streamlined eligibility processes and collaborative case management, as well as promoting independent living in the least restrictive setting

possible through the use of consumer-focused and individualized services and living options.

New Policy Briefs on Paralysis and Health Care Access

The Christopher & Dana Reeve Foundation announced the release of three new policy briefs on paralysis and the associated effect on accessing healthcare. The American Journal of Public Health also published the findings from the briefs. Below are highlights from the briefs identified by the National Disability Navigator Resource Collaborative.

- 5,357,980 people - roughly 1.7% of US population are paralyzed. Of those, 1,462,220 have a spinal cord injury.
- An estimated 397,309 Americans - 12.3% of all those with paralysis are doing without essential durable medical equipment.
- 84% of people living with paralysis in the U.S. (an estimated 2,630,224 individuals) are unable to obtain necessary medical care, tests or treatments.

CMS Announces a New Funding Opportunity for Track 1 of the Accountable Health Communities Model

CMS, in January 2016, released a new Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA) for a model called the Accountable Health Communities (AHC). This Center for Medicare & Medicaid Innovation model focuses on the health-related social needs of Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries. The AHC Model is based on emerging evidence that addressing health-related social needs through enhanced clinical-community linkages can improve health outcomes and reduce costs. The original FOA requested applications for three different scalable tracks featuring interventions of varying intensity that would address health-

related social needs for beneficiaries. After receiving inquiries and stakeholder feedback, CMS has decided to make modifications to the Track 1 application requirements and is releasing a new FOA specific to Track 1 of the AHC Model. Track 1 will support bridge organizations to increase a patient's awareness of available community services through screening, information dissemination, and referral. Track 1 award recipients will partner with the state Medicaid agency, community service providers and clinical delivery sites to implement the Model. The modifications to the Track 1 application include the following: (1) Reducing the annual number of beneficiaries applicants are required to screen from 75,000 to 53,000; and (2) Increasing the maximum funding amount per award recipient from \$1 million to \$1.17 million over 5 years.

Under this announcement, CMS is accepting applications from community-based organizations, health care practices, hospitals and health systems, institutions of higher education, local government entities, tribal organizations, and for-profit and non-for-profit local and national entities with the capacity to develop and maintain relationships with clinical delivery sites and community service providers. All applicants, including those who applied to

Tracks 1, 2 or 3 in the previous FOA, are eligible to apply to this FOA.

Applicants that previously applied to Track 1 of the AHC Model under the original FOA (# CMS-1P1-17-001) must re-apply using this FOA (# CMS-1P1-17-002) to be considered for the Model.
