Trump said he was trying to stop the makers of Carrier air conditioning from relocating its Indianapolis manufacturing operations to a company facility in Mexico.

[Trump's stock in oil pipeline company raises concern](#)

WASHINGTON (AP) — President-elect Donald Trump holds stock in the company building the disputed Dakota Access pipeline, and pipeline opponents warn that Trump's investments could affect any decision he makes on the \$3.8 billion project. Trump's 2016 federal disclosure forms show he owned between \$15,000 and \$50,000 in stock in Texas Transfer Partners. That's down from between \$500,000 and \$1 million a year earlier.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Judge Merrick Garland will soon put on his black judicial robe for the first time in months. The reason for President Barack Obama's nominee to the Supreme Court is that Garland's going back to hearing cases at his old high court. Garland now joins a small group of people nominated but not confirmed to the Supreme Court, and the question is how to act as an unsuccessful nominee.
