NewSpring 'moving forward' after Noble

Elgin residents Marcus and Chanelle Sharper showed up a week ago at NewSpring Church in Columbia for just their second attendance, unaware that they, along with the congregation, were about to be broadsided by a beam, not exactly from heaven.

The couple and their two young sons, invited by one of Chanelle Sharper's coworkers to attend service at NewSpring's Northeast Richland campus, heard through that Sunday sermon broadcast live from the main campus in Anderson that church founder and Pastor Perry Noble had been removed.

But this Sunday, the Sharper family showed up again at NewSpring, to the message that the church - with its main Upstate campus, plus 30,000 strong in satellites statewide - will carry on.

"We are moving forward with the Good News. ... People need to hear it," said interim Senior Pastor Clayton King, who succeeded Noble last week.

King, in an energetic sermon, called for everyone to "come to the table" - an allusion to the Gospels - and get to know one another face-to-face, rather than relying on social media.

Although he was believed to be the only person who fired at officers, authorities said they were unsure whether he had some kind of help. "We are not ready to say he acted alone," state police spokesman Major Doug Cain said. Two "persons of interests" were detained in the nearby town of Addis.

A witness described the gunman as wearing all black and carrying extra clips of ammunition. He was identified as Gavin Long of Kansas City, said East Baton Rouge Parish Mayor President Kip Holden.

The 29-year-old black man served in the Marines from 2005 to 2010, reaching the rank of sergeant. He deployed to Iraq from June 2008 to January 2009, according to military records.

Local police 'more on edge'

Area law enforcement is more vigilant than ever after the Sunday shooting of six police officers in Baton Rouge, three of whom died.

"This is only going to make the police more on edge," said Haneshan Police Department Capt. Michael Fowler. "Cops are either going to underreact for fear of being the cause of a protest or an officer might overreact for the fear that someone might be looking to attack a cop."

Either way, he added, it's counterproductive to the goals of civil rights groups calling for change.

S.C. GOP delegates get set for Trump

Lack of diversity a worry as Cleveland convention kicks off

CLEVELAND — South Carolina's delegates, alternates, elected officials and guests have arrived in Cleveland for the Republican National Convention anticipating Monday's opening gavel and a week of pomp and uncertainty.

And to get ready, on Sunday evening close to 100 representatives from the Palmetto State gathered at the city's downtown Holiday Inn Express, where delegates sported their credentials to the Quicken Loans Arena and their laminated passes to state party events proudly reading "First in the South." There was also a trip to the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

"The hospitality of Cleveland has been amazing," said Jane Page Thompson, a delegate from Aiken. "The police officers and Homeland Security are doing an amazing job and the plans of the RNC organizers have been special."

South Carolina Republicans were clamoring to be the first at something else this week, too. Led by James Epley, Donald Trump's Upstate regional director, delegates swarmed around a petition to formally nominate Trump and Indiana Gov. Mike Pence as the GOP's choices for president and vice president. Only a handful of states will be recorded as having officially nominated the leaders of the party ticket, and Epley said he would ensure that South Carolina is among them.

'It was quite a journey' for Trump, GOP

CLEVELAND — A year ago, few imagined Donald Trump as a headline speaker at the Republican National Convention — let alone as its star.

Back then, maybe the billionaire New Yorker was alone in thinking he would arrive in Cleveland this week as the GOP's presumptive nominee for president. There are still some Republicans trying to stop him, but the party's four-day convention of its unlikely White House hopeful will complete his rise from real estate mogul to potential leader of the free world.

"It was quite a journey," Republican National Committee Chairman Reince Priebus said. "Not just what he was able to do in getting more votes than any Republican in the history of our party, but to do it with people running. It is a remarkable thing."

Indeed, the man who opened his campaign as a late night TV punchline will face the nation as the Republican

Driver in deadly truck attack likely radicalized, French authorities say

NICE, FRANCE — There is mounting evidence that Mohamed Lahouaiej Bouhlel, the Tunisian-born truck driver responsible for the deadly carnage in Nice last week, had recently absorbed extremist ideas and had become radicalized, French authorities said Sunday.

The image of a religious extremist is

at odds with the portrait that neighbors and family members initially painted of a man who ignored even the most basic rules of Islam, eating pork, drinking alcohol and shunning the mosque.

Many of those who knew him said in the days after Thursday's Bastille Day attack that Bouhlel was a difficult person, describing him variously as aloof and hostile, even violent at times. In March, he received a suspended sentence for a road rage incident — not

enough to put him on the radar of France's security services.

But officials said Sunday that the 31-year-old had apparently undergone a rapid conversion to radical Islam and carefully planned the attack that claimed the lives of at least 84 people, including 10 children, raising the question: How did a delivery driver go from petty crime to carrying out an act of mass slaughter in the space of a few months?

Study: Mental illness common in jails

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More mentally ill people are incarcerated than there are patients in psychiatric hospitals, a new report concludes.

Incarceration "has largely replaced hospitalization for thousands of individuals with serious mental illnesses in the U.S.," according to a report from Public Citizen and the Treatment Advocacy Center.

At the Greenville County Detention Center, at least a quarter of the inmates suffer from a mental illness, officials say.

Serious mental illness was defined as including schizophrenia, bipolar disorder and related conditions but not suicidal thoughts or behavior without other symptoms, or alcohol and drug abuse in the absence of serious mental illnesses.

The report is based on a survey of 230 sheriff's departments in 39 states across

the country, including South Carolina. It showed 21 percent of county jails report at least 16 percent of their inmates have a serious mental illness. And 31 percent of large jails, defined as those with 251 or more inmates, reported at least 16 percent of their inmates were mentally ill.

The findings were not a surprise to Scotty R. Bodiford, administrator of the county detention center, or Marie Livingston, the mental health supervisor there.

While the population was as high as 1,600 a decade ago, the inmate population on Thursday was 1,377, which is fairly typical, Bodiford said.

And while the center doesn't track inmates as mentally ill, it does record the medications prescribed for mental illnesses. In May, some 470 inmates were prescribed these medications, Livingston said.

COLUMBIA - Lt. Gov. Henry McMaster's political clout is about to grow stronger.

As Donald Trump's nomination as the GOP's presidential pick draws near, the billionaire businessman has asked McMaster to play a "prominent role" at this week's Republican National Convention in Cleveland, said Trump's S.C. chairman Ed McMullen.

McMaster was not included in a list of convention speakers released Thursday by the Republican National Convention. And McMullen, in New York last week helping plan convention details, did not provide details on what role McMaster would play, except to say it would be in prime time early in the week.

"Mr. Trump is a very loyal man," said McMullen, president of a Columbia public affairs firm.

"He respects and appreciates what Henry did," being the first statewide official to campaign for Trump across South Carolina. "As a result, Henry will have a prominent role at the convention."

A convention role would repay the Columbia Republican for his support of Trump at a time when the billionaire businessman was facing a critical contest in South Carolina's first-in-the-South primary.

In January, McMaster became the first statewide elected official in the country to endorse Trump, surprising South Carolina's political elite. Subsequently, McMaster attended Trump rallies across the state, introducing the candidate.

"I'm somewhat of a novelty," McMaster said last week of his early support of Trump, who won South Carolina's pivotal primary with 33 percent of the vote.

"We are headed to the ash-heap of history if we don't change," McMaster said. "That's why I'm supporting Donald Trump. He's the man for our time. He's uniquely equipped to do the kind of work and make the kind of decisions, and present the kind of image of strength and determination that we need."

Beyond a convention role, McMaster's early support for Trump could bear bigger fruit for the lieutenant governor if Trump wins the White



Event to honor fallen officers

Ceremony set for this evening at First Baptist in Spartanburg

A service to remember law enforcement officers killed and wounded in the line of duty in recent days in the U.S. will be held Monday in Spartanburg.

The Spartanburg County Sheriff's Office is conducting the Fallen Officers Remembrance Ceremony at 6 p.m. at First Baptist Church, 250 E. Main St.

The ceremony was initially scheduled to honor the Dallas Police Department but was expanded to include Baton Rouge, La., law enforcement officers after a shooting there Sunday morning left three officers dead and three more wounded.

According to the Associated Press, Baton Rouge law enforcement officers were investigating a report of a man with an assault rifle shortly before 9 a.m. when the shooting occurred.

The site of the incident was less than one mile from police headquarters in Baton Rouge, according to the report. The deadly shooting continues to be under investigation by authorities.

Spartanburg County Sheriff Chuck Wright and the Rev. Don Wilton are scheduled to speak during the ceremony at First Baptist Church, which will also honor the Dallas police officers killed and wounded on July 7 during a shootout with a lone gunman in downtown Dallas. The ceremony is free to the public and will include a presentation by the Spartanburg County Sheriff's Detention Honor Guard.

Arrest made in Woodruff murder case

A Goose Creek man charged with murder in Woodruff earlier this year has been arrested in Richland County.

Woodruff Police Chief Alan Bledsoe said Sunday that Adriel Nicholas Garnett was being held at the Richland County Detention Center and would be taken to Woodruff to face the murder charge. According to police, Garnett allegedly shot Cecil Perrel Gilliam, 40, of 110 Robinson Lake Road in Woodruff, dead with multiple gunshot wounds on Feb. 6.

Police responded to the shooting at 405 Sharp St., at 4 a.m. that morning.

According to police, Gilliam was involved in an argument with Garnett.

Gilliam, a U.S. Navy veteran, was a skilled nuclear welder, and became a contract welder when he left the Navy. Police believed after the shooting that Garnett might have fled to Columbia or Goose Creek.

18th Zika case reported in SC

YORK — A York County resident who traveled to a country where the Zika virus is active marks the 18th case of the disease reported in South Carolina.

Multiple media organizations reported that the case is the first for the county on the North Carolina border near Charlotte.

The South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control received confirmation of the case from a lab Friday night. Agency spokesman Jim Beasley says the state isn't releasing where the person contracted the virus.

All 18 cases reported in South Carolina this year involved travelers to countries where the Zika virus is active. Nineteen cases of Zika

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Darlington County 9-year-old, grandmother found dead Incident ruled double homicide

DARLINGTON COUNTY — A double homicide has been discovered in Darlington County, where a 9-year-old child and the child's grandmother were found dead Sunday morning.

According to Darlington County Coroner Todd Hardee, the incident has been ruled a double homicide.

The call came in shortly before noon Sunday, and the scene was a home off S.C. 151 near the Darlington Dragway, Darlington County Sheriff Wayne Byrd told WBTV.

Hardee has yet to release the names of the victims.

Because the investigation is in its early stages, no other information has been made available. Hardee indicated that no further information would be released until this morning.

Hardee's office is receiving assistance from the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division (SLED) crime scene unit as well as the SLED child fatality unit.

No ground broken yet for center

Developer of Okatie Crossing says proposed shopping center in 'Catch-22 situation'

City of Hardeeville recently signed agreement with developer, Jasper County

Next step is for the developer to nail down commitments from anchor tenants and money for a connector road

The developer of the long-awaited Okatie Crossing shopping center, where a Costco has been proposed, has not yet broken ground on the 300-acre site at the intersection of U.S. 278 and S.C. 170, but says that recent agreements with the City of Hardeeville and Jasper County will help move the project forward.

Doug Horne, president of Horne Properties in Knoxville, Tenn., has been trying to build the shopping center for more than 10 years. Last fall, he said he expected to begin building in late 2016 or early 2017.

Now he said he hopes it will be sometime in 2017.

The shopping center is of particular interest to residents of Beaufort County, who in a 2015 survey by The Island Packet and The Beaufort Gazette listed Costco as the No. 1 national retailer that they wish would open in the Lowcountry. Costco, along with Kohl's, Lowes and Marshalls, appeared on the developer's site plan seven months ago.

An Ethan Allen, Zaxby's, Advanced Auto and Cracker Barrel have already been built.

Horne said the latest delay for the project is because of ongoing negotiations with big-box retailers and because funding is needed to build a road on the property that would connect the two highways.

Without tenant commitments, Horne said he cannot raise enough money to build the road, but retailers are wary of making a commitment without a road in place. "It's kind of a Catch-22 situation," he said.

In order to build the road, Horne sought a payment incentive plan with Jasper County and the City of Har-

3 Baton Rouge officers die in shooting; suspect ID'd
