## Federal Judge Issues Ruling on FLSA Regulation

On Wednesday, January 14, U.S. District Court Judge Richard Leon issued a ruling that vacated a portion of the Department of Labor's Fair Labor Standards Act Homecare regulation. The ruling dealt with a portion of the regulation that changed the definition of "companionship services" for purposes of an FLSA exemption. The January 14th ruling followed a separate ruling from December 22nd, where Judge Leon vacated a separate part of the rule that dealt with third party employers and their ability to claim a FLSA exemption. Combined, the two rulings vacate the Homecare regulation in entirety. The Department of Labor issued a statement indicating that it disagrees with the decisions and is considering all legal options.

The report, *Social Security Disability Benefits: Agency could Improve Oversight of Representatives Providing Disability Advocacy Services*, highlights SSI/DI advocacy approaches in Minnesota, Hawaii, and New York, and also provides recommendations for improved oversight by the Social Security Administration.

## Funding Opportunity: Geriatrics Workforce Enhancement Program

The Health Resources and Services Administration Bureau of Health Workforce is accepting applications for the FY2015 Geriatrics Workforce Enhancement Program (GWEP). The funding opportunity aims to establish and operate geriatric education centers that will implement the GWEP project to develop a health care workforce that maximizes patient and family engagement and improves health outcomes for older adults by integrating geriatrics with primary care. Special emphasis will be on providing the primary care workforce with the knowledge and skills to care for older adults and on collaborating with community partners to address gaps in health care for older adults through individual, system, community, and population level changes.

The focus areas for this announcement are:

- Transforming clinical training environments to integrated geriatrics and primary care delivery systems to ensure trainees are well prepared to practice in and lead these kinds of systems.
- Developing providers who can assess and address the needs of older adults and their families/caregivers at the individual, community, and population levels.
- Creating and delivering community-based programs that will provide patients, families and caregivers with the knowledge and skills to improve health outcomes and the quality of care for the older adult(s).
- Providing Alzheimer's disease and related dementias (ADRD) education to families, caregivers, direct care workers and health professions students, faculty, and providers.

## Older Americans Act Reauthorization Package to Be Introduced

The Health, Education, Labor, & Pensions (HELP) Committee intends to introduce the Older Americans Act Reauthorization Act of 2015 on Tuesday, **January 20**. The proposed bill is similar to the one from last Congress, with two changes:

1. Includes a compromise to address Title III grants formula
2. Removes a since-completed GAO [report](#) on transportation.

Changes to Ombudsman provisions, abuse prevention, ADRCs, and other policy items will reflect prior OAA reauthorization packages.

#### APS Report on Cost of Financial Exploitation Released

The Wyoming Department of Family Services has released the state's first Adult Protection Services report, *The Wyoming Cost of Financial Exploitation 2011, 2012 and 2013*. The report aims to determine the cost of financial abuse of vulnerable adults on state systems. The study reviews 32 cases across the three-year span and provides a comparative analysis of the financial losses to both Medicaid and the victimized seniors across the years.
