Tecklenburg reflects on his path to victory against Stavrinakis



Revised county line could cost Dorchester

County might lose at least \$200K annually

It will be up to each one of more than 500 property owners in S.C. to determine how to file a complaint if they want to stay there. Either that or it will be up to the state Legislature to redraw its boundary line with Berkeley County.

That's what is expected to come from a state demand to rezone county lines.

A 13-mile-long thin wedge of nearly 3,000 acres would be transferred to Berkeley County; the new line would run from the county's existing line at Four Miles Swamp to W. 9th Street in Summerville. The revised lines could cost Dorchester hundreds of thousands of dollars, if not millions.

The boundary line dispute has raged for 15 years. State geodetic

Trafficking ring involved S.C. cities

Victims shuttled from one brothel to another

The reconstituted eight-state sex-trafficking ring reached deep into South Carolina, perhaps even into the Holy City.

Women from Mexico and South America were kept at a brothel for a week, to service more than 25 men a day, then transported in another one, according to federal investigators with Operation Safe Haven. The Oct. 29 sweep shut down brothels in 13 cities, including Columbia, Greenville and Myrtle Beach.

A local attorney advises it's not unlikely that some of the women also did business in the Charleston area.

"It is very possible that the girls hidden in the hotels in Columbia and Myrtle Beach were also trafficked."

France targets terrorists in fierce raid

Ring-leader's fate unclear;
2 people dead, 8 arrested

SAINTE-DENIS, FRANCE — The hunt for the mastermind of last week's attacks took a bloody turn Wednesday as a Paris suburb where a fierce gun battle with police left at least two people dead and eight arrested. The fate of the alleged ring-leader is unknown, with authorities saying he was not taken alive and that he was being interrogated to determine if he died in the raid.

Police launched the operation after receiving information from tapped phones.



Ag losses double from flood

Official: Farmers 'are to point of desperation'

CONTINUED South Carolina's estimated agricultural losses from last month's floods have grown to almost

\$600 million and farmers statewide are hurting, state officials say.

State Agriculture Commissioner Hugh Weathers initially estimated losses at \$300 million but officials with his agency told members of the House

Ways and Means Committee on Wednesday that the total agriculture-related losses are now estimated at \$547 million. Agriculture is the state's biggest industry. Farmers already faced a horrible year because of a late freeze and a summer drought. Assistant Agriculture Commissioner Clint Lynch told the panel.


"They are to the point of desperation," he said.

The grim news came as the budget-writing committee heard final testimony from agencies as well as local officials on the impact of the flood, which killed 17 people, closed more than 500 state roads

We are nowhere near the record rainfall for the month of November, but it might feel like it and for good reason. And while we are only about two-thirds of the way through the month, the rain gauge at the National Weather Service in Greer already has recorded nearly 6 inches of rain, well above the 3.7 inches we normally see in the month.

And guess what? Get ready for more. The Upstate could see gusty winds, heavy rain and maybe even a tornado as a thick band of storms was forecast to sweep through the region late Wednesday.

Up to 2.5 inches of rain is forecast to fall in the Greenville area, which remains under a flash flood watch until 10 a.m. Thursday, the Weather Service said.



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

Cost to repair Columbia Canal: \$100M

City says overall flood-caused repairs will cost \$82 million

Council might have to tap reserves, get loans, find savings to offset expenses

Staffers hope FEMA, state aid will cover all of the canal costs and most of rest

Columbia is facing the prospect of having to dip into its reserves or seek short-term loans to help pay for \$132.5 million in flood damage, much of it to the Columbia Canal.

City manager Teresa Wilson disclosed Wednesday, for the first time, that repairs to the breached and weakened canal are likely to cost \$81.0 million - most of which city officials expect to be covered by federal money.

"We've been told the canal mitigation is the largest in the state,"

Wilson said of damage reports that Columbia officials have received from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and state flood-recovery au-

thorities.

So far, Columbia has paid \$10 million out of its own pocket to fix the canal, the primary water source for the downtown treatment plant that supplies water to about 188,000 customers. The city has asked FEMA to pay the entire canal bill, Wilson said.

FEMA has said it will pay at least 75 percent of most flood-damage costs. If it sticks to that figure, that could leave the city with a \$25 million bill just for the canal, Mayor Steve Benjamin said.

Asked if such a big bill would lead to higher water or sewer rates - beyond the nearly 10 percent increase that took effect in July - Benjamin said, "I'm not going to support any

Workers prep for crises in SRS drill

Regular Savannah River Site personnel played fake news media Wednesday during an emergency drill that scripted the hypothetical transport of three injured workers to local hospitals.

The media and other staffers were faced with a scenario which involved the release of radioactive materials at the Savannah River National Laboratory, a facility operated by the SRS management and operations contractor, Savannah River Nuclear Solutions.

BRYAN ELYER A severe weather event caused the downtime of a power line resulting in damages to a waste drum and a chemical container, according to a mock media release.

Workers suffered injuries during the incident, including one who was transported to Georgia Regents Medical Center with a head laceration. Another employee suffered a broken arm and the final one an injured wrist. Those two were transported to Aiken Regional Medical Center.

Precautionary measures were taken during the incident, which included closing down a portion of Highway 125, berthing site entrances and restricting rail, river and air traffic in the vicinity of SRS.

In addition, radiation monitoring teams were sent to various locations to provide assessments.

"We always keep the safety of our workers and the public in mind in a situation such as this," National Lab Deputy Director Dave Elyer said.



Aiken Public Safety warns against 'sexting'

With an abundance of smart phones now in their grasp, the amount of teens using them cameras and apps offered on the devices seems to grow year after year.

But with the gadgets often comes a risky and dangerous side.

Students at a Colorado high school reportedly found themselves on the wrong side of the technology this month after school officials discovered the students were

"sexting," or sharing graphic images of themselves, using a smartphone app.

The case involves an "unspecified number" of Canon City High School students, who were suspended after "exchanging hundreds of explicit photos of students as young as eighth graders," according to reports by The Associated Press, which cited school officials.

Sexting: What parents should know

• Talk to your children: If parents plan to send children to school with a smart phone, they should have conversations about how to use it properly.

• Have the passwords to your kids' smart phones and devices. Being able to get into the phone or device allows the parent to easily monitor their activity, but to also make sure they're not the target of any online dangers.

• Visit online resources to learn about technology, smartphone-applications. Burgess advises visiting the National Center for Missing

and Exploited Children's website www.missingkids.org.

• Not all sexting cases will result in criminal charges, but statutes do exist in South Carolina regarding those that involve minors.

• Sexting could affect a student's future resulting in possible suspension or expulsion, college eligibility or loss of scholarship.

Local authorities have since been investigating the case and parents are deciding which students could face criminal charges.

Since the story has made headlines, many have found the case isn't just unique to Colorado.

The AP reported in a matter of weeks this month, two 14-year-old boys on New York's Long Island

brier, Tennessee, were charged with sexual exploitation of a minor after exchanging explicit photos on their cellphones.

The issue is also familiar to Aiken authorities, according to Capt. Maryann Burgess, who works in the juvenile division of the Department of Public Safety.

"We deal with it quite frequently," Burgess said. "We have had cases

Fate of leader of Paris attacks unclear

SAINTE DENIS, France — Heavily armed French SWAT teams swooped in Wednesday and neutralized a cell that was ready to launch new attacks, leaving at least two people dead after firing 5,000 rounds during an hour-long siege, a prosecutor said. Eighty people were arrested.

The raid had targeted the suspected planner of the attacks, 27-year-old Abdeslam Abaaoud, but his fate remained unclear.

Paris prosecutor Frédéric Molins said the identities of the dead were still being investigated, but that neither Abaaoud nor the fugitive attacker Salah Abdeslam was in custody.

"At this time, I'm not in a position to give a precise and definitive number for the people who died, nor their identities, but there are at least two dead people," he told reporters.

Earlier, the prosecutor's office had said the dead included a woman who detonated an explosive vest and a man hit by projectiles and grenades. But at a later news conference, Molins clarified the earlier statement that the woman blew herself up, saying: "This point needs to be verified by an analysis of the body and human remains, as well as by all the forensic police operations that have to be carried out."

Molins said heavily armed police squads initially were thwarted by a reinforced door to the apartment in the Saint-Denis neighborhood north of Paris and faced nearly incessant fire as they worked to enter.

The prosecutor said the raid was launched after information from tapped telephone conversations, surveillance and witness accounts indicated that Abaaoud might be in a safe house in the Saint-Denis suburb.



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

Fate of mastermind unclear

SAINT-DENIS, France — The hunt for the mastermind of last week's attacks took a bloody turn Wednesday to a Paris suburb where a fierce gunbattle with police left at least two people dead and eight arrested. The fate of the alleged ringleader was unclear, with authorities saying he was not taken alive and they were trying to determine if he died in the raid.

Police launched the operation after receiving information from tapped phone calls,

surveillance and tipoffs suggesting that 27-year-old Abdeslam was holed up in an apartment in Paris' Saint-Denis neighborhood.

Terrified residents awoke to gunfire and explosions as a SWAT team swooped in and "neutralized" what Paris Prosecutor Francois Molins called a "new team of terrorists" that appeared ready for a new attack.

Molins said the identities of the dead were still being investigated, but that neither Abdeslam nor another fugitive, Salah Abdeslam, was in custody.

Ice skating crews are preparing Morgan Square for the fourth season of Skating on the Square in downtown Spartanburg.

Grading and installation of cooling coils for the ice started this week. The skating rink is scheduled to open Wednesday.

City spokesman Will Rothschild said the city has operated the open-air rink on Morgan Square the past three years. He said the city has handled everything from skating hours, rentals and ticket sales to sponsorships, advertising and staffing for the nearly \$200,000 endeavor.

This year, Rothschild said the city is providing \$35,000 to assist in setting up the rink and handing the operating reins to Magic Ice USA, Inc. As with prior years, Magic Ice is providing its equipment and construction services for the skating rink.



1 dead, another flown out

Sheriff's Office continues investigation into fatal shooting in Lynchburg

Sumter County Sheriff's Office is investigating a shooting incident in the Lynchburg area that left one man dead and another man seriously wounded on Monday evening.

About 10:45 p.m. Monday, deputies responded to a call at a residence in the 3100 block of Narrow Paved Road

in Lynchburg.

Braden Bunch, sheriff's office public information officer, said multiple weapons, make and caliber not disclosed, were found at the scene and investigators continue to search the residence for more evidence.

Upon arrival, deputies found the resident, Joseph Evey, 70, unconscious and suffering from multiple gunshot wounds. He was later pronounced

dead at the scene by Sumter County Coroner's Office, according to a news release from the sheriff's office.

Another man, George Shine, 33, of Florence, was also injured during the incident and was airlifted to a Florence-area hospital for treatment for a single gunshot wound to the chest.

Bunch said Shine is now in the intensive care unit at McLeod Regional Medical Center.

A third man, Travis Byron Jones, 43, of Florence, who was at the scene when officers responded, is being questioned about the incident.

Bunch said Jones, a person of interest, has been taken into custody but has not been formally charged at this time.

The investigation is ongoing, and investigators are still determining what took place, Bunch said.

Tax agency to reduce amount withheld

COLUMBIA — South Carolina's tax agency plans to leave more of your money in your paycheck.

Starting on Jan. 1, 2017, the agency will reduce the amount withheld from South Carolina taxpayers for state income taxes

throughout the year, said director Rick Reames.

That is the good news.

The bad news?

The withholding change will reduce the amount South Carolina taxpayers get back in state tax refunds each spring.

"This is going to put \$3 billion back in people's paychecks, rather than having them loan it to the

government on an interest-free basis," Reames said.

The first year of the changes would leave \$73 more in the paychecks of a married couple filing jointly with two children and a combined taxable income of \$10,000 or more, according to initial estimates by the Department of Revenue.

While the first year will see a

relatively tiny amount left to paychecks, a greater amount will be left in paychecks in future years.

For example, the same couple would see \$365 more to their paychecks in Year 5 and \$730 more in Year 10.

However, the actual take-home pay will vary depending on a taxpayer's filing status. For example, the amount would change if a

taxpayer is single or files with a different number of exemptions.

The changes will benefit primarily lower-income taxpayers, married taxpayers and taxpayers with children, Reames said. Those taxpayers now have a greater portion of their paycheck withheld, he said.


Yearwood said the effort has gotten a lot of support from the community.

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
FLORENCE — The Country Club of South Carolina is for sale.

Big boon coming to Abbeville

New company will create 48 new jobs, investment brings \$2.3 million

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Advanced Manufacturing & Power Systems Inc., a manufacturer of generator enclosures, is establishing its first South Carolina operations in Abbeville County, the state Department of Commerce announced Wednesday.

The company is investing \$2.5 million in the project, which is expected to create 48 new jobs in Abbeville during the next five years.

"We are honored AMPS selected Abbeville County to be their new

manufacturing home in South Carolina. We look forward to working with them in the coming years to help their business grow in our great county," County Council Chairman Bryan McClain said.

Established in 1999, the Deland, Florida-based company is a specialty severe power systems integrator, servicing the power generation industry.

The company will be leasing 10,000 square feet in the county's incubation building, located in the Lakelands Commerce Park, which was built last year in help businesses grow.

"It's a soft landing, it's for businesses that want to locate to South Carolina and kind of dig their toes in the water, which is exactly the intention of the incubate buildings," County Director David Porter said.

Porter said the previous county administration showed great foresight in constructing the building.

"I think it just shows that the county

is very aggressively marketing itself. Community and economic development have been huge priorities of County Council," Porter said. "I think we're starting to see some of the fruits of our labor."

The company was the first, and is currently one of two, high velocity hurricane zone-rated manufacturers certified by the state of Florida. The firm is owned by Pacific International LLC, which is an affiliate of the Triple Five Group, which also owns and operates The Mall of America.

The plant is expected to be fully

operational by January. Those interested in employment can visit www.indexjournal.com.

"The pro-business environment in South Carolina and, in particular the helpful effort put forth by Abbeville County, is noted and greatly appreciated. This is just a first step as we look forward to hopefully significantly expanding this and other businesses into the state," tea J. Attorney: Student hadn't drank

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A car with alcohol containers strewn across the floor "had been all over the road" before striking a tractor-trailer, according to witnesses and a trooper cited in a report. But the driver's attorney said it did not appear she had been drinking before the crash.

Courtney Hagedorn, a 22-year-old Lander student, faces a felony DUI charge after her passenger died in the Oct. 23 wreck on Interstate 26. Samantha Gilena Shilane, 27, died at the scene.

Hagedorn was a member of the Lander Women's Soccer team, and voluntarily left the team to focus on her current situation and her studies, said Megan Price, a spokeswoman for the college.

When the state Highway Patrol trooper who filed the Oct. 23 report arrived on the scene, paramedics were placing a sheet over the passenger in the Volkswagen Golf. Hagedorn had been driving, according to a report filed by Highway Patrol Trooper Christopher Nicholls.

"I was told we had multiple witnesses and that they stated the driver of the Volkswagen had been all over the road prior to the collision," the trooper said in the report.

Mastermind not arrested in raid

French SWAT teams neutralize a terrorist cell that was prepared to launch more attacks

SAINTE-DENIS, France — The hunt for the mastermind of last week's attacks took a bloody turn Wednesday in a Paris suburb where a fierce gunbattle with police left at least two people dead and eight arrested.

The fate of the alleged ringleader was unclear, with authorities saying he was not taken alive, and they

were trying to determine whether he died in the raid.

Police launched the operation after receiving information from tapped phone calls, surveillance and tipoffs suggesting that 27-year-old Abdelhamid Abaaoud was holed up in an apartment in Paris'

Saint-Denis neighborhood.

Terrified residents awoke to gunfire and explosions as a SWAT team swooped in and "neutralized" what Paris Prosecutor Francois Molins called a "new team of terrorists" that appeared ready for a new attack.

Molins said the identities of the dead were still being investigated but that neither Abaaoud nor another fugitive, Salah Abdeslam, was in custody.

"At this time, I'm not in a position to give a precise and definitive number for the people who died, nor their identities, but there are at least two dead people," Molins said.

The site of Wednesday's raid is not far from the Stade de France soccer stadium, where suicide bombers blew themselves up outside the stadium during an international soccer game as part of the attacks last Friday that left 129 peo-

ple dead and hundreds wounded. Molins said police units including snipers threw grenades and fired 5,000 rounds in an hourlong gunbattle that began before dawn on Wednesday. The dead included a woman who was believed to have blown herself up with a suicide belt, though Molins said "this point needs to be verified by an analysis of the body and human remains."
