Whether local governments get more funding, 4-year-old kindergarten programs are expanded and assorted Charleston-area items get backing are all expected to be decided during the next two weeks as South Carolina's General Assembly wraps up its budget and 2014 session.

Note: There are many points of agreement, including new funding for K-12 education pushed by Haley.

Note: Elements adopted from Haley's budget proposal include \$30 million to hire additional reading coaches in elementary schools and \$29 million to improve Internet and wireless capabilities in schools.

Note: McKinney's ad promotes ideas also pushed by Gov. Nikki Haley, who appointed him to the State Ports Authority board. She created a regulation review task force last year, and she touts success in tax cuts and tort reform.
