Anderson Independent: Bill to reconsider Common Core receives approval from House

The state House gave final approval to a bill requiring South Carolina to reconsider the national Common Core State Standards. The bill now will head to Gov. Nikki Haley's desk to be signed into law. Passed Tuesday afternoon by an 80-26 vote, the bill calls for a review of the standards on or before Jan. 1, 2015, and calls for new standards to be put in place by the 2015-16 school year.

Note: "Common Core was brought to South Carolina by a previous administration, and Gov. Haley has fought against it from day one and will continue to do so until it's no longer part of our school system's curriculum," said Doug Mayer, a spokesman for Haley.

A new South Carolina law makes it a crime for someone to falsely claim military service for personal profit. The law signed by Gov. Nikki Haley makes the lie a misdemeanor, with the punishment depending on the lie. In a conviction, anyone pretending to be decorated war veteran could be sentenced to up to a year in jail and a \$5,000 fine.
