The State: Boeing official touts SC plant but is mum on 777X plans

Boeing officials gave no hint at a media breakfast here Thursday whether South Carolina is in the running for the company's new 777X assembly plant, which could add another 8,500 jobs to the state. Jack Jones, Boeing's vice president-general manager for South Carolina, didn't even acknowledge if South Carolina is making a bid.

Note: "We are always in good talks with Boeing," Gov. Nikki Haley said at the time.

A legislative panel will try to compromise on separate House and Senate versions of a bill representing the largest overhaul of state government in decades. The conference committee meets Thursday afternoon to get a head start on the debate before the Legislature returns next month. Both Gov. Nikki Haley and her chief Democratic opponent are pushing the bill. Haley has made the bill to modernize government and make it more accountable a signature issue. State Sen. Vincent Sheheen has sponsored the proposal for years, even as it died repeatedly throughout former Gov. Mark Sanford's tenure.

A top Boeing official said Thursday that 2013 was a transitional year for the aeronautics giant in South Carolina and also urged the state to spend more on math and science training in its schools. Jack Jones, a Boeing vice president and general manager for its South Carolina operations that employ 6,700 people, met with reporters to review the company's progress in the state during the past year. It was a year when Boeing, which already operates a massive plant to assemble the company's 787 Dreamliners, announced it was investing an additional \$1 billion and would create 2,000 new jobs in South Carolina over eight years.

Spartanburg Herald Journal: DHEC Arrests Man In Connection With Investigation Of Dumping Hazardous Chemicals In Upstate Sewage Treatment Systems

An arrest has been made in the ongoing investigation into the dumping of hazardous chemicals in Upstate sewage treatment systems. Timothy Howard, 48, of 259 Victor Hill Road in Greer, was arrested Wednesday evening and charged with perjury and obstruction of justice. The S.C. Department of Health and Environmental Control issued Howard a cease-and-desist letter on Aug. 23, amid an outbreak of PCB contamination in three Upstate sewer systems. A fourth was later identified. The cease-and-desist order suspended the license of Howard’s company, American Waste Septic Tank Service, after several pieces of equipment were found to be contaminated with polychlorinated biphenyls.

Irmo Fire Officials believe the cause of a Wednesday morning apartment fire off St. Andrews Road that killed a brother and sister was due to an electrical failure, which ignited a nearby Christmas tree. Jarmaion Martin, 5, and his sister Reghin Stevens, 1, were pronounced dead at the scene from injuries sustained in the fire, according to Lexington County Coroner Harry Harman. Investigators said it's likely fire sprinklers would have put the fire out and saved the children's lives. However, sprinkler systems were not required when the complex was built.
