Dear Director Fleming,

I also have to inform you that we have a signed treaty with the headman of the Santee Indian Organization (Petitioner #53). This is on record, as are the financial status of the research conducted thus far. I have enclosed a copy for that research, and I hold all of the receipts and invoices. I remember as a child on a field trip to a Charleston museum, and having a woman (Assuming she was a PHD) show me a Carolina parakeet in a box. She showed me this as if she was "Circe" and I was "King Picus". I did not understand the situation at 7 years old, but as I have travelled to every temple in Greece, Rome, and Jerusalem (I have been to almost every cathedral in Europe & England as well.). I find that the misunderstanding of the woman at the Charleston museum was lost in a spiral of historical interpretation towards the understanding of what is a legal reality.

The fine State of South Carolina has done giv'em the just record back to these people in regards to the fallacy of Governor Bull in 1770 (Although, I can prove this through documentary evidence from the British archives & library.). As I am also requesting archival documents from Jamaica, Mexico, and Bermuda (I have already disclosed the request with the Barbados and Cuban archives.) to learn the fallacy of a person in the Province of Carolina to best the Vatican, The Archbishop of Canterbury, and the Church of England regarding enslavement of an indigenous population without their consent. 

As it will not be the same specimen that I will send to the President of the United States of America, because I want the BIA to have the most splendid version. I know that one of your own had said over the phone about the non-acceptance of former Britain rule in America as not being a formal nod to federal contact, but I would have to direct your attention to the Catawba Indian Tribe of South Carolina Land Claims Settlement Act of 1993. In this document your office formally through congressional oversight recognized two royal treaties of Great Britain regarding the colonies, and a federal body recognized that this was a government recognition document showing federal contact. The only way that you could conclude that this was federal contact is to the recognizing of the Treaty of Paris of 1783 signed by the United States of America, Great Britain, and “His Majesty”.

As the Santee (Santé) Indian Tribe of South Carolina conducts population demographics regarding education levels, health problems, military service, and unemployment. I do not have to wait for the results. I already know that a population demographic in the twenty first century has a 60% illiteracy rate, 45% with health problems, 45% have served in the military or national guard, and 35% unemployment rates in a capitalist country. It does not please me, and it does not please the United Nations.

As you can see with the included document that I have paid my tithes to humanity, more than ten fold. Making it to a Church of England communion at Westminster Abbey for my first amendment rights is more of a trick! I mean if you have the knowledge to label someone a Croatan Indian, then you should allow that person to follow in the religious path of “Manteo”. As there is no Worldwide Anglican Communion anywhere near the Charleston International Airport (With non-stop flights to New York City I might add.).
