Two prominent SC lawmakers have responded to the announcement that President Barack Obama wants to start the process of closing down Guantanamo Bay and move those detainees to facilities in the United States. Governor Nikki Haley and US Congressman Joe Wilson both gave statements denouncing the president's proposal to transfer detainees from Guantanamo Bay.
