**Consideration of Request for Amendment to Existing Licenses
to Add New Programs
A.A., Criminal Justice
B.S., Criminal Justice
Strayer University, Charleston, Columbia, and Greenville**

Summary

Strayer University (www.strayer.edu) requests approval of an amendment to its licenses to offer programs leading to the Associate in Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees in Criminal Justice. The programs will be delivered on-site at Strayer's branches in Charleston, Columbia, and Greenville and will also be available on-line. The proposed date of implementation is April 2009.

Strayer University is a private, proprietary entity that is a wholly owned subsidiary of Strayer Education, Inc., a publicly traded corporation. Strayer offers undergraduate and graduate degree programs in business administration, accounting, information technology, education, and public administration to over 38,000 adult students at 60 campuses. In September 2002 the Commission approved initial licensure for Strayer to establish campuses in Charleston, Columbia, and Greenville and delegated to the staff authority to issue licenses as the sites were developed. The Greenville campus was licensed in March 2004, the Columbia campus in May 2005, and the Charleston campus in September 2006.

The Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools, Commission on Higher Education (MSA-CHE) has accredited Strayer since 1981. The institution's main campus in the District of Columbia is licensed by the Education Licensure Commission of the District of Columbia. Additionally, Strayer is approved by the appropriate higher education agency in each of the 12 states in which it operates. Strayer has received approval from MSA-CHE and the Education Licensure Commission of the District of Columbia to offer the criminal justice programs.

The following information from the U.S. Department of Education shows student loan default rates at Strayer.

The U.S. Department of Education sanctions a school when the school's three most recent cohort default rates are 25% or higher or if a school's current default rate is greater than 40 percent. Except in the event of a successful judgment or appeal, such a school will lose FFEL, Direct Loan, and Federal Pell Grant program eligibility for the remainder of the fiscal year in which the school is notified of its sanction and for the following two fiscal years.

Strayer leases its South Carolina campus facilities on a long-term basis. Each campus maintains computer labs, administrative offices, lecture classrooms, and a learning resource center.

The learning resource center at each campus provides basic resources, computer labs, and audiovisual support. The director of libraries at the Wilkes Library, located at the main campus, coordinates library services and collection development for all campus resource centers. A regional librarian, who holds a minimum of a master's degree in library science, is assigned to each region of campuses. Combined library holdings include approximately 71,000 books available through inter-campus lending, 600 periodicals, and 1,500 audio-visual resources.

Strayer employs at each branch a campus director, a campus academic dean, and admissions, financial aid, student support and learning resources personnel. Career

services and facilities support services are also available to each campus location and are shared by campuses in the same geographic region. Strayer University has appointed a university-wide department chair for the criminal justice program. The department chair works closely with the Criminal Justice internal committee composed of faculty and regional and campus deans to ensure program quality. Faculty committees review each course every three years; the Academic Curriculum Committee, comprised of the academic deans and department chairs, evaluates programs at its quarterly meetings.

Faculty members teaching general education courses must have a master's degree from a regionally accredited college with 18 hours in the teaching discipline or must hold a master's degree with a major in the teaching discipline. A terminal degree in the subject area is preferred. Faculty members teaching core courses will be expected to hold a terminal degree in criminal justice or a related field or may hold a juris doctor degree or master's degree in criminal justice with significant and recent professional experience.

Applicants must hold a high school diploma or General Education Development certificate. Prior to their first term, students will be evaluated for proficiency in fundamental math and English. Students who transfer collegiate math or English credit from an accredited college or university, graduate from an undergraduate or graduate program, receive satisfactory scores on the SAT or ACT, or score above the established minimum levels on the placement tests may waive the required fundamental courses. College Level Examination Program (CLEP) exams and Dantes Subject Standardized Tests (DSST) may be evaluated for credit towards a degree. Strayer is also a member of the Service Members Opportunity Colleges network that allows active duty members of the military and their families to complete undergraduate degrees regardless of where they are stationed.

Strayer projects initially enrolling 10 students in the associate's degree program and 10 students in the bachelor's degree program at each of its locations in South Carolina. Tuition is \$1,435 per four and one half quarter credit hour course for full-time students (enrolled in three or more courses per quarter) and \$1,510 per course for part-time students. Total tuition for a student enrolled full-time in the associate's degree program is \$28,700 and for the bachelor's degree program, \$57,400.

The programs leading to the Associate in Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees in Criminal Justice are designed to provide students with current and relevant knowledge regarding the prevention, adjudication, and correction of juvenile and adult crime. Students in the bachelor's level program will further explore the theoretical, operational, and legal components of the criminal justice system. Four specializations are offered in the bachelor's degree program: Criminal Justice Administration, Homeland Security and Emergency Management, Homeland Security Technology, and Computer Security and Forensics. Employment in most federal law enforcement agencies requires completion of a bachelor's degree program.

The curricula for the program leading to the A.A. and B.S. degrees in Criminal Justice are shown below:

There is no specialized accrediting agency for criminal justice programs. Practitioner licensure or certification is not required for employment.

According to the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, *Occupational Outlook Handbook*, protective service occupations such as correctional officers, police, detectives, investigators, security guards, and gaming surveillance officers are high growth occupations with excellent job opportunities available for those with college degrees.

Thirteen of the state technical colleges offer an associate's degree program in criminal justice, as well as U.S.C.-Lancaster, Forrest Junior College, Miller-Motte Technical College, and Spartanburg Methodist. Other colleges and universities in the state that offer a bachelor's degree program in criminal justice are The Citadel, Lander, South Carolina State, U.S.C.-Columbia, U.S.C.-Upstate, Anderson, Benedict, Claflin, Coker, ITT Technical, Limestone, Morris, Voorhees, Remington, Saint Leo, South, Troy, Virginia College, and University of Phoenix. Also for consideration by the Committee on Academic Affairs and Licensing (CAAL) at its December 4 meeting is a proposal from Virginia College to add a site in Charleston at which it will offer programs leading to the A.A.S. and B.S. degrees in Criminal Justice.

Recommendation

The Committee on Academic Affairs and Licensing commend favorably to the Commission approval of an amendment to the licenses of Strayer University to offer programs leading to the Associate in Arts degree and Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice for implementation in April 2009 in Charleston, Columbia, and Greenville.
