Meanwhile, open enrollment for the health insurance marketplaces is in full swing, with some states reporting increased or record enrollment figures during these first

weeks of enrollment. [CHIP Coverage is Important for Pregnant Women Too](#)

While the importance of the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) for children has been widely documented, it is also important to remember that states can and many do use CHIP to provide coverage to low-and moderate-income pregnant women. With federal-funding for CHIP due to run out by the end of this federal fiscal year (September 2017), there are again discussions at the national level about the future of this coverage program. [Webinar: Leveraging Managed Care Contract Language to Improve SUD Purchasing Strategies](#)

In 2014, CMS launched a collaborative between the Center for Medicaid and CHIP Services (CMCS) and the Center for Medicare & Medicaid Innovation (CMMI) called the Medicaid Innovation Accelerator Program (IAP). The goal of IAP is to improve the care and health for

Medicaid beneficiaries and reduce costs by supporting states' ongoing payment and service delivery reforms through targeted technical support. As part of our efforts to roll out what we and our partner states have learned from our first year of the Reducing Substance Use Disorders program area, we invite you to join the final webinar in our four-part national dissemination webinar series on **Wednesday, December 7, 2016 from 3:30 – 5:00 PM ET** .

In the December webinar entitled “*Leveraging Managed Care Contract Language to Improve SUD Purchasing Strategies*” we will discuss key elements of managed care contracting that promote good stewardship and purchasing of substance use disorder (SUD) services. Specifically, we will discuss core contract components where SUD service delivery may be strengthened, including benefit design; standards of care; network adequacy; quality metrics; and integration of SUD and physical health. There will be two featured state partners on the webinar panel to discuss their efforts to offer a comprehensive SUD treatment care continuum. On this webinar:

- Virginia Medicaid will discuss how they are working with managed care entities to transform their SUD delivery system to provide the SUD care continuum, remove treatment gaps, and meet the American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) Criteria standards of care; and
- Massachusetts Medicaid will share how they expanded access to SUD care using consistent contract language with their managed care entities, and assigned regional network managers to monitor quality.

SAVE-THE-DATE: Medicaid Innovation Accelerator Program: Data Analytic Support for State Medicaid Agencies

CMS's Medicaid Innovation Accelerator Program (IAP) was designed to improve health and health care for Medicaid beneficiaries by supporting state Medicaid agencies' ongoing efforts related to payment and delivery system reforms. In addition to working with states across program priority areas, IAP also provides targeted technical support and tools to states in four functional areas: data analytics, quality measurement, performance improvement, and payment modeling and financial simulations. This December, CMS is launching a technical support opportunity for Medicaid agencies seeking to design, develop, and/or implement data analytic strategies related to their Medicaid programs' delivery system reform efforts.

More information about the opportunity, including a program overview and expression of interest form will be posted on the [Medicaid IAP webpage](#) in the next few weeks. A webinar will be held on **December 8, 2016 at 3:00PM ET** to introduce states to the opportunity, answer questions, and provide an explanation of the state selection process. Webinar participants will also learn about the individualized support IAP is providing to states to address their data analytic needs across a wide range of topics, such as developing an analytic plan, designing an approach to integrate non-Medicare datasets, interpreting statistical output, or developing statistical programs to analyze and monitor their Medicaid programs.
