The S.C. House easily passed its first attempt at sweeping ethics reform in decades, establishing a new body to investigate members of all three branches of government and requiring all lawmakers to disclose their sources of income.

Note: Questions on ethics have consumed the Statehouse as Gov. Nikki Haley and other leaders have pushed for comprehensive reform, arguing the current system doesn't instill public confidence.

Note: "While the House bill still contains some problems that we hope will be addressed in conference, this represents real progress for the people of South Carolina," Mayer said. "Now it's time for the Senate to join the House in making sure legislators are no longer investigating themselves or keeping their income secret."

S.C. State University has run out of money to pay its employees and cover its debt payments, and will ask to draw at least \$1.2 million from a \$6 million emergency loan that the state offered last month, college president Thomas Elzey told The State on Wednesday.

Note: With expectations that S.C. State would have enough money to cover its salaries and bond debt, the \$6 million emergency loan – approved by a group of state leaders, including Republican Gov. Haley – was expected to go toward shrinking the school's \$13.6 million in unpaid bills.
