Description/Significant Features:

The two-story Ben Avon Methodist Church is a sprawling a sprawling masonry complex, arranged in a U-shape. The building is composed of three primary sections: a northern two-story, side-gabled, four bay northern wing (which appears to be the earliest section and retain early paired multi-light metal casement windows); a southern single-story, flat-roof wing displaying a solid brick facade void of fenestration; and a single-story front-gabled mid-twentieth sanctuary which spans north to south and connects the two wings. The sanctuary features a steep-pitched roof, brick cladding, and modern multi-light fixed windows.

Historical Information:

Ben Avon Methodist Church built its first church at its current site in 1948 at 2362 Avondale Avenue, which it had to replace the following year after fire destroyed it. Due to serious structural issues, the congregation had to demolish this building in 1962 and replace it the following year. Little known about architects Prather and Thomas, who did not include commissions in AIA historical directories. Known to have designed SC National Guard Armories and/or Motor Vehicle Storage Buildings at Greenwood, Pacolet Mills, and Spartanburg.


