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Subject: State Budget and Ethics -- Update from Sen. Tom Young -- May 6 to May 12, 2014

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The State Senate is in regular session with session ending on Thursday, June 5. One of my goals as your state senator is that you find this update helpful and informative. Your feedback is meaningful and appreciated. If I can help you with an issue, please let me know. State Budget

State Budget: The Senate budget will resume at 10:00 am today and continue daily until the Senate passes a budget to send back to the House. The summary of the budget in its current form as passed by the Senate Finance Committee two weeks ago can be accessed [here](#). Last week, the Senate debated several aspects of the budget with some of the highlights as follows:

Local Government Fund – The Local Government Fund (LGF) is intended to help offset the cost of state mandates by providing local governments at the county, city, and town levels with a certain amount of funding which is apportioned based on population. In this year's budget, the Senate Finance Committee funded the LGF at last year's level of \$229 Million. However, that includes \$25 Million in non-recurring funds of which a little more than \$16 Million are considered "below the line." This means that those funds are projected to be available for use by September but they also may not if the projection does not materialize. Last week, the Senate debated two separate amendments to make sure that all of the Local Government Funds were "above the line" and available as of the July 1 start of the fiscal year. Both amendments failed. I expect more amendments to be offered this week.

Funds for Controversial Mandated College Reading for Incoming Freshmen : One budget amendment debated for several hours on Wednesday would remove approximately \$52,000 from the College of Charleston and \$19,000 from USC

Upstate as a result of the schools' choice of mandated college reading for all incoming Freshmen students last Fall. I was provided excerpts from one of the books. It had explicit illustrations of and written detailed descriptions of various sexual acts. (The Charleston paper editorial reprinted in today's *Aiken Standard* does not mention this.) In addition, the books were required reading for all incoming students, and as I understand it, the students were not given any other reading alternatives. This is a sensitive issue because it involves academic freedom. Nevertheless, because I do not believe the vast majority of constituents in our district would approve of the content regardless of whether it depicted heterosexual or homosexual relationships; state tax money paid for the books; and the books were mandatory reading with no alternatives for the students, I voted not to table the proposed amendment. Further debate may occur this week as the amendment is pending.

School Bus Funding : In 2007, the General Assembly voted to replace school buses on a 15 year cycle. To do this, the state should be spending \$34 Million per year to replace 7% of the school bus fleet each year. Currently, of the state's 5,505 buses in use statewide, at least 3,331 of them are 16 years old or older. The Department of Education requested \$34 Million in funding to buy new buses. The House budget appropriated \$12 Million and the Senate Finance budget added some to that. There will be some amendments offered this week to increase appropriations for new school buses. (Privatization of the school bus system is still something that the State needs to do if it will save money. My understanding is that it will. Legislation to do this did not pass two years ago. I have talked with staff from the Governor's office and the Department of Education about this again over the past several months.)

Pay Raise for Lawmakers: One budget proviso raises the monthly in district expense compensation for lawmakers from \$1,000.00 to \$2,000.00. I am co-sponsoring an amendment with Senator Paul Thurmond that will remove this provision from the state budget. We expect the amendment to come up this week.

Additional Budget Thoughts : The budget process will continue after this week into June as the budget goes back to the House; to a conference committee from the two chambers; then to the Governor where she may veto certain items; and then to the House and Senate where the Governor's vetoes will be considered. Thus, there are a number of uncertainties between now and mid June as to what the final budget will look like. Other State Government News

Ethics and Speaker of the House : Yesterday, Circuit Judge Casey Manning ruled that state law only allows the House Ethics Committee to consider alleged ethics violations by one of its members. The judge ruled that the Attorney General cannot prosecute the case against the Speaker of the House unless the House Ethics Committee referred the case to the Attorney General for further investigation. An appeal to the State Supreme Court is expected. To learn more, go [here](#).

Ethics Perspective : It is critical for the General Assembly to pass meaningful ethics reform this year. While the case against the Speaker is not directly related to most of the pending ethics reform legislation, the case does keep the media's attention on the ethics reform bill. We will read and hear more on this subject in the coming weeks. I will do what I can to make sure that the General Assembly enacts meaningful ethics reform this session.

DSS Director to Resume Testimony : On Wednesday, May 21 at 9:00 am, DSS Director Lillian Koller will resume her testimony before the DSS Oversight Subcommittee that I chair. The subcommittee is expected to continue work on DSS child welfare issues into the Fall.
