South Carolina's voters will decide in November whether the governor should appoint the state's top military officer. The House agreed Tuesday to the Senate's changes to a measure that puts the constitutional question on the ballot. If voters approve, the governor would appoint the adjutant general beginning in January 2019.

**Note:** "That South Carolina will now treat the head of our National Guard the same as every other state in the nation is so important, and is a further leap forward in our efforts to bring our state government into the 21st century," she said. "What happened today is another huge win for the people of South Carolina."
