A Statehouse gathering commemorating South Carolina's 1860 secession from the Union will be held Sunday, after state officials reinstated a permit they canceled a week ago.

**Note:** Gov. Nikki Haley said Friday she asked that the Secessionist Party's reservation be reinstated. Haley says the Statehouse grounds belong to the public, whether or not she agrees with those exercising their rights to free speech and assembly.

**Note:** Haley says law enforcement officials have assured her they can handle any public safety concerns if there are counter-demonstrators.

The S.C. Secessionist Party's reservation to hold a rally Sunday at the State House was reinstated Friday at the request of Gov. Nikki Haley.

**Note:** "The governor believes that the State House grounds belong to all people, whether she agrees with their views or not," Haley spokeswoman Chaney Adams said. "She also believes that people's constitutional rights mean something, and that certainly includes the rights to free speech and free assembly.

The S.C. Secessionist Party's reservation to hold a rally on Statehouse grounds Sunday will be reinstated by the state Department of Administration Friday afternoon at the governor's request. James Bessenger, who founded the party earlier this year, said Friday morning his lawyer informed him of the state's plan to reinstate the reservation that had been revoked last week after police expressed public safety concerns.

**Note:** Chaney Adams, spokeswoman for Gov. Nikki Haley, said the governor believes Statehouse grounds belong to all people, whether she agrees with their views or not, and in free speech and free assembly.

**Note:** "When (Haley) was made aware of the reservation cancellation, she met with law enforcement officials, and, after being assured that they could handle the public safety concerns that exist, the governor asked that the reservation be reinstated," Adams said.

A family of two Syrian refugees has resettled in Richland County, and more are on the way to South Carolina despite Gov. Nikki Haley's request that Syrians not be relocated to the state because of security concerns. Another, larger family of refugees is expected to resettle soon in South Carolina, with help from Lutheran Services Carolinas.

**Note:** Haley had asked federal officials not to relocate Syrian refugees to South Carolina. The governor's office said it wasn't told by federal authorities that the refugees were being resettled in South Carolina, learning about it only through a partnership with Social Services and the resettlement agency.

**Note:** But Social Services and other appropriate agencies, including law enforcement, know where the

individuals are residing for the safety of everyone, including the refugees, said Social Services spokeswoman Karen Wingo said.

A Landrum lawmaker has pre-filed a bill to prohibit buying or selling fetal tissue. Republican state Rep. Doug Brannon filed the bill on Dec. 10. Brannon said the bill includes criminal penalties for a person who violates the law. The criminal penalties include a misdemeanor upon conviction, a fine of not more than \$1,000 or imprisonment of not more than 30 days, or both.

Century Aluminum is working to strike a deal allowing it to keep its Goose Creek plant operating at half capacity while state lawmakers work on legislation to allow large industries to buy power on the open market. Century president and CEO Mike Bless tells The Post and Courier of Charleston (<http://bit.ly/1Qsl3Yp>) he is negotiating with Century's suppliers to reduce power costs so the plant can operate for six months through another legislative session.

S.C. continues to add jobs, pushing down the state's jobless rate for a sixth straight month in November. The state jobless rate slid to 5.5 percent in November, falling from 6.8 percent in May, the S.C. Department of Employment and Workforce reported Friday. The U.S. jobless rate in November was 5 percent.

South Carolina's jobless rate dropped to a 14-year low in November and the state is well-positioned to continue adding jobs in 2016. That's the assessment by a Federal Reserve economist after the state Department of Employment and Workforce reported Friday the unemployment rate in the Palmetto State fell for a sixth straight month to 5.5 percent in November from 5.6 percent the previous month, the lowest level since August 2001.

Congress on Friday sent President Barack Obama a bipartisan but deficit draining year-end budget package that boosts federal agency spending and awards tax cuts to both families and a sweeping array of business interests. A 65-33 Senate vote on the measure was the last act that shipped the measure, combining \$1.14 trillion in new spending in 2016 and \$680 billion in tax cuts over the coming decade, to Obama.
