Next year, Democrats have a chance to begin to blot out a rare bright spot for Republicans: the nation's governorships. For all the GOP's well-documented problems winning national elections lately, it's easy to overlook the party's dominance at the state level that its banner 2010 election produced. Three in five governors are Republicans — and they used that power to push through far-reaching conservative agendas and quite possibly lock down the House of Representatives for a decade through redistricting.

Note: Democrats have also recruited some strong candidates who they expect will make races in red states competitive. They are most excited about South Carolina, where state Sen. Vincent Sheheen is running again. He only lost to Haley by 4 points in 2010 and has carved out an image as a moderate.

Claims made by a white supremacist couple facing murder charges that they were involved with several different killings and other crimes across South Carolina have not panned out, a sheriff said. Jeremy and Christine Moody are each charged with killing a registered sex offender and his wife in their Jonesville home last month. They appear to be like many members of loosely knit white power groups charged with committing violent crimes, going out on their own to settle a score against someone who represents something they don't like, according to law enforcement officials and an organization that monitors hate groups.
