State Sen. Vincent Sheheen's recent focus of winning women voters in his gubernatorial campaign includes

a pitch about strengthening South Carolina's criminal domestic violence laws. As an attorney, however, the Camden Democrat represented at least three men charged with criminal domestic violence of high and aggravated nature since 2001.

Note: "Vince Sheheen has every right to make money as a trial lawyer who puts back on the streets some of the most violent and horrendous criminals in our state – people who have attacked South Carolina's ... women," said Rob Godfrey, a spokesman for Haley's November re-election campaign versus Sheheen. "(M)ost South Carolinians would be shocked to learn that a candidate for governor would choose to do that."

Note: "He's running around the state talking about being tougher on men who beat women, yet he personally made sure that men who attacked women ... spent as little time in jail as possible," Godfrey said, "and he did it for money."
