Consideration of Proposed FY 2000-2001  
Administrative Budget,  
S.C. Student Loan Corporation

Summary

In 1971, the General Assembly established the South Carolina State Education Assistance Authority, empowering it to provide financial assistance to students in their pursuits of postsecondary education through the making, insuring and guaranteeing of student loans to South Carolina residents. The Authority is a public instrumentality of the State of South Carolina and is governed by its members, who are by statute members of the State Budget and Control Board.

In providing such financial assistance, the Authority has acted through its contractual agent, the South Carolina Student Loan Corporation, a private, non-profit corporation headed by its own Board of Directors. The Corporation was incorporated in 1973 for the purpose of acting as the agent of the Authority in performing the functions of making, handling, servicing and providing information about student loans.

In June, 1984, the General Assembly named the Corporation as administrator of the South Carolina Teachers Loan Program (TLP), a program established by the Education Improvement Act (EIA) of 1984 to assist students who wish to become certified teachers in the state in geographic or subject areas of critical need. These loans, first offered to qualified students in 1985, may be canceled at a rate of 20% per year for each full year of teaching in a critical area.

The General Assembly empowered the Commission on Higher Education to establish regulations to govern the Teachers Loan Program. These regulations charge the Commission with two primary duties: 1) approval of the Corporation's annual operating budget associated with administering the Teachers Loan Program; and 2) approval of the appropriation request for loans made through the TLP. This report concerns the first of these duties, the approval of the FY 2000-2001 operating budget for the Teachers Loan Program.

The following table details the proposed FY 2000-2001 operating budget for the administration of the Teachers Loan Program and information on the current year's budget.

In the first two columns, the table displays the budgeted and estimated expenditures for FY 1999-00. The third column, totaling \$279,275, is the Corporation's operating expense budget request for FY 2000-2001, as approved by the Corporation's Board of Directors on May 2, 2000. The total amount requested is \$9,975 less than year's request. This overall decrease in the budget request is a direct result of the Legislature's approval to include the Student Loan Corporation employees in the State Health Plan rather than a private carrier.

For information purposes, the table on the next page compares the number of borrowers and the amount of loan expenditures for the Teachers Loan Program for FY 1998-99 and FY 1999-2000. FY 1999-00 figures are current as of May 24, 2000.

Dear Karen:

I am enclosing for your review, and for approval by the Commission on Higher Education at its next meeting, the proposed budget for 2000-01 for administration of the Teachers Loan Program. This budget has been reviewed and approved by the Board of Directors of the Corporation at its Annual Meeting on May 2, 2000.

In the first two columns below I have summarized the budgeted and estimated actual expenditures for the 1999-00 fiscal year. The third column, totaling \$279,275, is the amount proposed by the Corporation for 2000-01. For purposes of comparison, the regular administrative budget of the Corporation for the operation of the Federal Family Education Loan Program, not including operating costs associated with the Teacher Loan Program, is shown in the fourth column.

Comparison of the FY 1999-00 figures with 1998-99 figures reveals a slight decrease in expenditures and the number of borrowers for the TLP.

In terms of average loan amounts, the average Teachers loan for FY 1998-99 amounted to approximately \$3901 while the FY 1999-00 figure amounted to approximately \$3783 per loan.

#### Recommendation

The Committee on Access & Equity and Student Services will meet immediately prior to the June 1<sup>st</sup> Commission meeting to consider the Teacher Loan Corporation budget request. The recommendation of the Committee will be given during the meeting of the full Commission.


