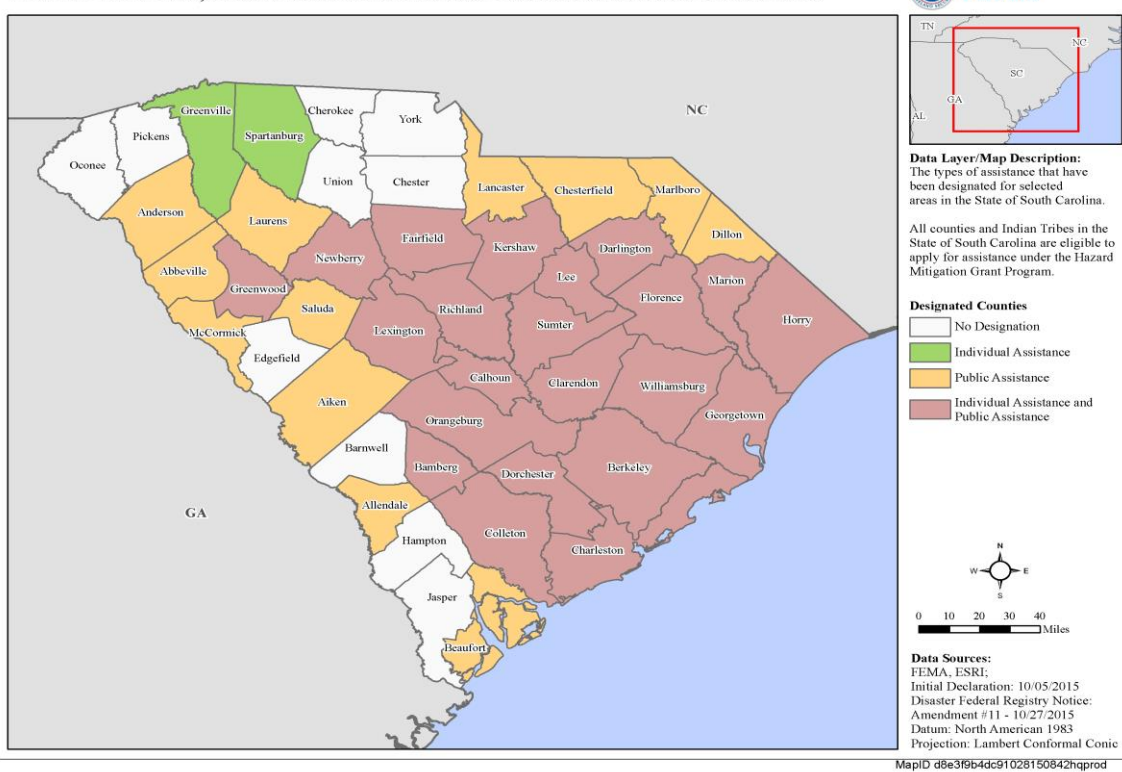

10/03/2015	FEMA-3373-EM-SC	The President declared an Emergency Declaration for Direct Federal Assistance (DFA) for South Carolina in all 46 counties for Severe Storms and Flooding.
10/05/2015	FEMA-4241-DR-SC	The President signed a Major Disaster Declaration FEMA-4241-DR-SC for Severe Storms and Flooding. The declaration provides Individual Assistance for eight (8) counties (Charleston, Dorchester, Georgetown, Horry, Lexington, Orangeburg, Richland, and Williamsburg) and Public Assistance for 11 counties (Berkeley, Charleston, Clarendon, Dorchester, Georgetown, Horry, Lexington, Orangeburg, Richland, Sumter, and Williamsburg counties) for debris removal and emergency protective measures (Categories A and B), including Direct Federal Assistance (DFA) under the Public Assistance program.
