### Governor Nikki Haley Declares State of Emergency:

Flooding could be life-threatening this weekend, forecasters warned, as a deluge continues through Sunday. That's without an impact from Hurricane Joaquin, which was expected to stay far offshore. "The concern is that people are going to be so focused on the hurricane, they won't realize that this is going to be a significant event," said meteorologist John Quagliariello, with the National Weather Service, Charleston.

**Note:** Gov. Nikki Haley declared a state of emergency and directed local and state agencies to coordinate resources. Haley said in an announcement on her Facebook page that parts of the state could experience significant flooding.

Weather forecasters say South Carolina is about to get drenched. Heavy rain and flooding are forecast for the weekend as an east-moving weather system is expected to combine with the edge of Hurricane Joaquin to pound the Palmetto State.

**Note:** Gov. Nikki Haley declared a state of emergency in advance of potential impacts from Joaquin and the weather system approaching from the west. Haley's emergency declaration puts state emergency plans into effect. That enables agencies to coordinate resources and better respond to requests for state assistance from county emergency managers, the governor's office said.

Haley was honored by the Harvard Foundation for Intercultural and Race Relations on Thursday evening with a dinner ceremony to celebrate her contributions to the progress of racial justice. Harvard Foundation Director S. Allen Counter presented her with an award of appreciation for her calls to remove the Confederate flag from the South Carolina state capitol this past summer.

Chris Nisbet, the Dorchester County coroner for the past two decades, was suspended from office Thursday after he was indicted on a misconduct charge in a racially charged confrontation with a black neighbor.

**Note:** An executive order by Gov. Nikki Haley stated that a grand jury had charged Nisbet "for willingly and unlawfully breaching his duty of accountability to the public" and "for misusing his office to effect an unlawful arrest of a private citizen."

South Carolina's Legislative Audit Council postponed voting Thursday on whether to launch another state investigation into Planned Parenthood. Members of the agency's governing board expressed concern about duplicating other investigations. But they said they're still inclined to approve audit requests signed by dozens of House and Senate Republicans.

**Note:** In August, Gov. Nikki Haley asked South Carolina's public health agency to investigate the state's abortion clinics, starting with Planned Parenthood. Attorney General Alan Wilson then announced he's looking into Medicaid payments for abortion.
