Florence Morning News: Ethics reform big issue for next SC legislative session

During the past two weeks, legislators have pre-filed more than 400 bills dealing with subjects varying from mopeds to wireless Internet on school buses and revenge porn, with several focused on issues related to criminal domestic violence, ethics reform and infrastructure funding. All are shaping up to be major themes of the new General Assembly session that convenes on Jan 13.

Note: On Wednesday, Republican Gov. Nikki Haley said "enough is enough" after listing several former elected officials who were indicted in ethics scandals. She listed income disclosure, independent investigation and legislators who sue the state to report the agency and payout amount as three essential items to reform.

Note: "In my administration time, we have watched a lieutenant governor get indicted, we've watched a speaker get indicted, we've watched a senator get indicted and I have removed eight sheriffs," Haley said. "I think now is the time for ethics reform."

North Carolina officials want to close the gap with South Carolina and other states that offer larger incentive packages and lower tax rates to lure companies – sometimes causing Charlotte to miss out on hundreds of jobs. But emails and documents obtained by the Observer under a public records request show the state has hurdles to overcome if it wants to keep up with South Carolina and other rivals:

Note: By February, North Carolina officials knew South Carolina and Georgia were finalists for the project. In June, South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley joined Giti officials in announcing the company would invest \$560 million in Chester County, creating 1,700 jobs at a factory off Interstate 77, about 40 miles south of Charlotte.

Some state lawmakers say South Carolina needs to fix its roads, improve its education, better police public officials and get tough on domestic violence. And others think the state would be better off with broader gun rights, stricter abortion laws and the ability to deny government services to any "non-citizen."

Note: Lawmakers also believe they can't keep putting off dealing with the state's crumbling roads and bridges. Gov. Nikki Haley promised during her successful campaign for a second term last fall to present her plan for funding transportation improvements by the time the Legislature convenes Jan. 13.

Note: H.3186, Rep. Kirkman Finlay, R-Columbia. Mandates that lawmakers disclose their private sources of income but not the amount. Haley wants the Legislature to pass reform that shows how much lawyer-lawmakers make from suing government agencies.

Jeff Davis is the founder and mastermind behind Palmetto Kids First, one of five nonprofits OK'd by the state to collect donations and give private-school tuition grants to students with disabilities.
