Post and Courier: Group wants to store more nuclear waste in South Carolina; stakeholders weigh in

A group that wants to collect radioactive nuclear waste from South Carolina power plants and store it near Aiken and Barnwell counties expects pushback from those who already view the state as a nuclear dumping ground. "Governor Haley has been clear: South Carolina will not become a permanent dumping ground for nuclear waste regardless of where it would be housed or who would house it," spokesperson Chaney Adams wrote Wednesday in a prepared statement. But Mike Stake, president of the Spent Fuel Reprocessing Group, said the intent is not to permanently store the spent fuel — a radioactive material that is considered "spent" once it is used in a nuclear reactor. Stake said the group wants to store the material until a reliable technology is created that can convert the material into a nuclear energy source. He said he knows of companies that are just a few years away from making that a reality. Once the technology is ready, Stake wants to have the spent fuel stored in one place and ready for reprocessing.

Federal regulators say they've found there was a "substantial potential" for an accident that could have injured workers at the Westinghouse nuclear fuel plant near Columbia. Media outlets report the preliminary results of an investigation into a uranium built up at the plant were discussed Tuesday night. Westinghouse does not dispute the information and says it's working to resolve problems at the 47-year-old plant. "We have had significant performance lapses at the Columbia site," said Michele DeWitt, Westinghouse's interim senior vice president for nuclear fuel and components manufacturing. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission says Westinghouse was unable to keep uranium from accumulating in plant equipment. "Potential safety consequences to workers were high," according to a power point presentation from the initial investigation.

Aiken Standard: Barnwell potential new home for additional nuke facility

Barnwell County could become the home of yet another nuclear waste repository, if an Aiken group sees its plans come to fruition. Mike Stake, president of the Spent Fuel Reprocessing Group in Aiken, penned a letter to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission in July. In the letter, Stake officially announced intentions to apply for licensure that would allow the group to construct and operate a processing and disposition facility near Savannah River Site, just outside of Barnwell. Barnwell County is already

home to the Chem-Nuclear low-level nuclear waste disposal facility, which has been leaking tritium for years. While the tritium leak may have caused alarm for some people, including multiple environmental groups, according to the Department of Health and Environmental Control website, radiation levels from that leak are low level and well below recommended exposure levels. According to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission website, "High-level radioactive waste primarily is uranium fuel that has been used in a nuclear power reactor and is 'spent,' or no longer efficient in producing electricity. Spent fuel is thermally hot as well as highly radioactive."

NOTE: Gov. Nikki Haley has said over and over again that the Palmetto State will not become a dumping ground for nuclear waste. Her office added to that in an email statement, saying that stance would not change, regardless of where it would be housed or who would house it.

GSA Business: GHS awaits governor's office on bond reclassification

Greenville Health System officials are waiting on word from Gov. Nikki Haley as to whether she will agree to reclassify \$600 million in bonds from public to private, not-for-profit status. The hospital system has an internal deadline of Oct. 1 to get word on the governor's decision. That is the date the hospital officially changes its governance structure to include a government body that will oversee the lease of property as well as a newly-established community fund, and the Upstate Affiliate Organization which will serve as the provider of care for the region. With bond reclassification, GHS CEO Mike Riordan said if the governor does not reclassify the bonds from public to not-for-profit status, it could cost the hospital system nearly \$167 million in additional financing fees as the bonds would have to be sold on the taxable market. The governor's office did not respond to repeated requests for comment. If the bonds are reclassified, the health system would not have to refinance the bonds, thus saving the additional interest fees, according to Riordan.

A teenage gunman shot two young students and a teacher at an elementary school in rural South Carolina on Wednesday, and his father was later found shot to death at a home nearby, authorities said. The suspect, who officials said was home-schooled, was taken into custody without incident on school grounds shortly after authorities were called to Townville Elementary School at 1:45 p.m. ET by a teacher saying an armed man was on the property, investigators said. "We feel confident that we have the sole shooter, that no one else is involved and the community is not in danger at this point," said Capt. Garland Major, chief investigator for the Anderson County Sheriff's Office. The teacher, a woman, and one of the boys were treated and released from a hospital. The other boy was later transported to the Greenville Hospital System Pediatric Trauma Center, where his condition wasn't reported. The school, in Townville in Anderson County, about 35 miles southwest of Greenville, has 280 students from pre-kindergarten to sixth grade, serving a rural community in the western corner of the state.

A teacher and two young students were injured when a 14-year-old allegedly opened fire at a South Carolina elementary school Wednesday afternoon, reports CBS affiliate WSPA. 911 dispatchers received the initial call around 1:45 p.m. from a teacher who was in a classroom, reporting an armed male on the campus, officials said at a press conference Wednesday evening. The shooting left a 6-year-old boy in critical condition and undergoing surgery, Scott Stoller, Anderson County's director of emergency services, told the Anderson Independent Mail. The other boy and a female teacher were in good condition, said Juana Slade, spokeswoman for AnMed Health Medical Center. Both boys were 6 years old, the Independent Mail reported. Anderson School District 4 superintendent Joanne Avery said the gunman was apprehended "within a matter of minutes." Capt. Garland Major of the Anderson County Sheriff's Office said officers arrived within seven minutes of the 1:45 p.m. 911 call and had the suspected shooter, a teenager, in custody by 2 p.m. The gunman was tackled by a volunteer Townville firefighter, the station reports.

NOTE: South Carolina Governor Nikki Haley was delayed on her way to Townville, but posted a statement to Facebook as she traveled. School would be canceled for the rest of the week and grief counselors would be made available, Avery said.

A teenager opened fire at an elementary school playground during recess in South Carolina on Wednesday, injuring two students and a teacher, but was brought down by a volunteer firefighter who jumped into the fray without being armed, officials said. And investigators believe the incident is connected to the shooting death of a man nearby, who appeared to be the suspect's father. A teacher placed a 911 call stating that a man was on the grounds at Townville Elementary School around 1:45 p.m., said Anderson County Emergency Service Director Taylor Jones and deputies from the Anderson County Sheriff's Office were on the scene within seven minutes, said Capt. Garland Major. But a volunteer firefighter, who was among the first on the scene, "used enough force" to take the suspect, who was armed with a handgun, down, said Anderson County Sheriff's Office Deputy Chief Keith Smith. The suspect never entered the school, and the entirety of the incident happened on the playground during recess, Smith said.

Two children and a teacher were shot at an elementary school playground in Townville, South Carolina, an official with Anderson County Emergency Services told reporters. The suspected shooter, a teenager, is in custody, deputy chief Taylor Jones said. The father of the suspected shooter was found dead of a gunshot wound, Anderson County Coroner Greg Shore told reporters. Shore identified the man as Jeffrey Osborne, 47. The house is about 2 miles from the school. Wednesday afternoon, the three victims at the school were struck by bullets from a handgun, Capt. Garland Major of the Anderson County Sheriff's Office said. One male student was hit in a leg and another boy was struck in a foot. The female teacher was wounded in a shoulder, Major said. It is unclear whether the alleged shooter knew any of the school victims. Major said the motive is unclear, but terrorism has been ruled out. The suspected gunman never entered the school, Anderson County Deputy Chief Keith Smith told reporters. The incident occurred at the school's playground, officials said.

Two children and a teacher were shot Wednesday afternoon at an elementary school in the rural community of Townville, South Carolina. Authorities said the suspect, a local teenager, shot and killed his 47-year-old father around 1:45 p.m. and then drove to the school, Townville Elementary, where he crashed his truck into a fence before opening fire with a handgun. Police apprehended the teen within minutes of the shooting, according to The Associated Press. WYFF, a local TV station in Greenville, South Carolina, said the shooting happened in a playground and the suspect—who WYFF said is 14 years old—never entered the school. A firefighter responding to the scene "took down" the suspect, according to WYFF. The motive for the attack is unclear, but CNN said authorities have ruled out terrorism or racism. It's not known what connection, if any, the suspect had to the school. Both of the students who were wounded are boys. One student suffered a bullet wound to the leg, the other to the foot. The female teacher was hit in the shoulder. None of the injuries are considered life threatening.

A 14-year-old boy armed with a handgun shot two students and a teacher outside Townville Elementary School after killing his father, officials said Wednesday. The victims of Wednesday's shooting at Townville Elementary School were two students and a teacher, authorities said. At a prayer vigil Wednesday evening, one of the students was identified as Jacob Hall. The others haven't been identified. The teacher was a woman and the students were both boys, according to Capt. Garland Major of the Anderson County Sheriff's Office. One of the students was shot in the leg while the other was shot in the foot, Major said. The teacher was shot in the shoulder, he said. All three received medical care for their injuries Wednesday afternoon, authorities said. The teacher and one of the students were taken to AnMed Health in Anderson by ambulance, where they were both listed in good condition, hospital spokesman Ross Norton said. The child was discharged, he said. The second child was airlifted to Greenville Memorial Hospital by LifeFlight, but no information was disclosed about his condition. Greenville Memorial is a Level 1 trauma center, which means it handles the most serious cases. All three were shot with a handgun, Major said.

A 14-year-old boy opened fire with a handgun at a playground at Townville Elementary School on Wednesday afternoon before he was stopped by a longtime volunteer firefighter, authorities said. Two 6-year-old children were injured, one critically, along with a teacher and Jeffrey Osbourne, the father of the teenager, was found shot to death at a home about three and a half miles away, said Captain

Garland Major of the Anderson County Sheriff's Office and Anderson County Coroner Greg Shore. One of the children and the teacher have been released from AnMed Health Medical Center. The firefighter who stopped the shooting, Jamie Brock, has been in the fire service for about 30 years, said Chief Deputy Keith Smith of the Sheriff's Office. Smith said Brock was either not armed or did not use a weapon and it was not clear whether the shooter's gun had a malfunction that allowed Brock to apprehend the teenager. The shooter is believed to be 14 years old and officials could charge him as a minor, Smith said. The teenager was home schooled and was not a student at the Anderson County School District, according to the Sheriff's Office.

A teenager opened fire outside Townville Elementary School on Wednesday afternoon — shortly after killing his father at home, authorities said — as this rural northwestern corner of South Carolina joined the national stage of gun violence attacks. The shooter also wounded two students and a teacher. He was stopped by a volunteer firefighter. Anderson County Coroner Greg Shore said the teen used a handgun to kill his father Jeffrey Osborne, 47, at their home. He then proceeded to nearby Townville Elementary where one student was shot in the leg, one was shot in the foot and a female teacher was shot in the shoulder, Capt. Garland Major with the Anderson County sheriff's office said. One male student was flown to Greenville Hospital Systems Pediatric Trauma Center for surgery. His condition is unknown. The teacher and the other male student have been released from Anderson's AnMed Health Medical Center. It is unclear what the shooter's motive was, his connection to the victims and if they were his intended targets. Anderson County Sheriff John Skipper said the shooter and victims are white and no racial overtones were associated with shooting.

A 14-year-old is in custody after a shooting at an Upstate elementary school Wednesday afternoon left two students and a teacher wounded. That attack followed a shooting at a home a few miles from the school in which the teen's father was killed. A teenager killed his father at their home Wednesday before going to a nearby elementary school and opening fire with a handgun, wounding two students and a teacher, authorities said. The teen was apprehended within minutes of the school shooting in this rural town about 110 miles northeast of Atlanta. One of the students was shot in the leg and the other in the foot, Capt. Garland Major with the Anderson County sheriff's office said. Both students were male. The female teacher was hit in the shoulder. Before the shooting at Townville Elementary about 1:45 p.m., the teen gunned down his 47-year-old father, Jeffrey Osborne, at their home about 2 miles from the school, authorities said. "We are heartbroken about this senseless act of violence," said Joanne Avery, superintendent of Anderson County School District 4. She canceled classes for the rest of the week.

NOTE: Gov. Nikki Haley released a statement shortly after the shooting. "As we work together with law enforcement to make sure they have the support they need to investigate what happened in Townville, Michael and I ask that everyone across South Carolina join us in praying for the entire Townville Elementary School family and those touched by today's tragedy."

Wilson also said that he was copying a similar act by a woman in Winnetka, Ill. Witnesses said Wilson shot pupils who screamed.

The Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department has refused to release more than two hours of footage that video cameras captured at the University City apartment complex where police fatally shot Keith Lamont Scott last week. On Saturday, CMPD released about two minutes of video footage, captured by a dashboard camera and a body camera, showing the moments immediately before and after the Sept. 20 shooting. But the police body camera captured a total of 16 minutes of footage, while the dash-cam recorded an hour and 50 minutes. The last 14 minutes of footage from the body camera shows officers performing CPR and providing medical help to Scott, according to CMPD lawyer Judy Emken. Observer lawyer Jon Buchan said Emken told him Wednesday that the footage wasn't released because it is "very violent" and too graphic. She said the video was not shown to Scott's family for the same reasons.

The jury pool has been narrowed to just under 750 people in the federal trial of Dylann Roof, who

About 3,000 potential jurors were summoned, and began reporting this week. A total of 41 were excused or had their jury service moved. But midday Wednesday, the court passed its goal of 700 when 748 potential jurors filled out questionnaires about the June, 2015 church shooting. The others who were summoned don't have to report. The questionnaires will be reviewed by attorneys before jurors return again in early November for individual questioning.

Maniscalco is a Charleston area portrait artist and adjunct professor at Charleston Southern University. He is also the courtroom sketch artist commissioned by a pool of media outlets to document Roof's federal trial.

The State: Retired SC state workers urge legislators to preserve pension benefits

A retired Forest Acres couple told legislators Tuesday they eat only two meals a day, and make house and car repairs themselves to hold down their living expenses. Combined, retired state employees Lynn and Richard Schmidt earn about \$50,000 a year in pension benefits — an incentive, they say, that caused them to work for the state instead of taking better paying jobs in the private sector. "You promised us when we were hired, that if we would accept a lower salary, you would take care of us," Lynn Schmidt, 62, told a panel of lawmakers grappling with how to fix the state's ailing retirement system. "Don't take that away." The S.C. Retirement System has \$18.2 billion in unfunded liabilities — the difference between the amount the pension fund has to pay for workers' retirement

benefits and the amount it has promised to pay current employees and retirees in the system. Lawmakers are grappling with whether to fill that gap with money from S.C. taxpayers or ask state workers and their public-sector employers – state agencies, school districts and local governments – to pay more.

South Carolina's 32,442 state employees are contributing more of their paychecks than ever to the state's pension system, yet a deficit of \$16.8 billion is projected to grow even more, representatives of state employee groups told lawmakers Tuesday. The impact on paychecks, which aren't high to begin with, has gotten so big that teachers, police, parole and corrections officers are leaving their jobs in droves, according to many of those who testified. "It's not right to make state employees shoulder this burden," said Carlton Washington, executive director of the S.C. State Employees Association. "Many are working for less now than when they first started working for the state." Testimony came at a hearing of a joint committee created by S.C. House Speaker Jay Lucas and Senate President Pro Tem Hugh Leatherman to hear about the magnitude of the problem and then propose solutions for the legislature to consider in the upcoming session.

The State: SC lawmakers may rethink controversial property tax law

State lawmakers may rethink a controversial property tax law passed before the Great Recession. Called Act 388, the 2006 law is among a host of tax policies a S.C. House panel is reviewing. The panel hopes to make recommendations for legislative changes before lawmakers to return to Columbia for work in January. On Tuesday, lawmakers heard an overview of the 2006 law from tax experts. The law's key feature was a tax swap that benefited homeowners. The law exempted owner-occupied homes from paying operating taxes for local schools, shifting that burden to commercial and other properties. In exchange, the state increased the state sales tax by a penny and agreed to send money back to school districts, theoretically, to make up for lost revenue.

Traquan Dillon wants a job and needs a chance to prove himself. The 19-year-old Florence resident spends his weekdays filling out applications and pounding the pavement in search of gainful employment. "Anything right about now," he said. "Something to keep me motivated." He fills out applications online and walks from his downtown home all around Florence in search of steady, honest work. "It's tough," he said. "Real tough. All I'm waiting on is that phone call." One day he'd like to own a business. He knows he needs to get his GED. For now, though, he needs a steady paycheck. "I'm trying hard to have a job in the next two weeks. I came here to see what they got," he said mid-morning on Tuesday. He was one of hundreds of hopeful Pee Dee residents who came to the job fair at the state's Vocational Rehabilitation center on West Darlington Street. Dillon is serving three years of probation for a second-degree nonviolent burglary charge and has to come up with \$1,200 to \$1,400. He said the prosecutor explained that his probation could be shortened and his record expunged if he completes his court requirements and becomes employed. "I can't pay it if I'm

lollygagging. But that's not me. I want to work. I want money, but it's hard out here nowadays. My car's in the shop and it's hot and I'm walking on my own two feet," he said. "I almost walked here but my mama caught me walking and gave me a ride."

Post and Courier: U.S. House passes water infrastructure bill authorizing Charleston Harbor dredging

The House of Representatives passed a key water infrastructure bill Wednesday that would, among other things, ensure the Charleston Harbor deepening project stays on schedule. Lawmakers voted 399-25 to pass the Water Resources Development Act, or WRDA. All members of the South Carolina congressional delegation voted "yes." Just 24 hours earlier, the legislation appeared in peril.

Democrats threatened to withhold support as Republicans refused to allow a vote on an amendment that would provide aid to the city of Flint, Mich., which is still grappling with a major contaminated drinking water crisis. Republicans pointed to the Senate-passed version of WRDA, which had that language included. They forecast that when both chambers meet to hash out the details of a final bill in November or December, it was likely that money would survive the negotiations. Democrats weren't willing to trust Republicans at their word, fearing that unless the money was in their WRDA bill, too, they would come to the negotiating table with a weaker hand.

NOTE: The effort to pass the House bill before the October recess, even though it won't be signed into law until after Election Day, was also being closely watched by the S.C. Chamber of Commerce and Gov. Nikki Haley.

Associated Press: Connecticut lawmakers approve deal to keep Sikorsky Aircraft

A \$220 million agreement that would keep Sikorsky Aircraft Corp. in Connecticut for at least the next 16 years to produce a new line of heavy cargo helicopters for the U.S. military easily cleared the General Assembly on Wednesday, with some lawmakers hailing the deal as a positive sign for manufacturing in the state. The deal reached between Sikorsky, Democratic Gov. Dannel P. Malloy's administration and Sikorsky's new owner, Maryland-based Lockheed Martin, passed the House of Representatives by a vote of 136-6 and the Senate on a 35-1 tally. Both chambers are controlled by Democrats. While some minority Republicans grumbled about having to pay the company to essentially remain in the state, many Democrats were celebratory, pleased that Connecticut was able to beat back competition from other, less expensive states. Democratic Senate President Martin Looney, of New Haven, said Connecticut was competing with Florida, South Carolina, Texas and Georgia to build nearly 200 CH-53K King Stallion helicopters.

The Connecticut General Assembly has given final legislative approval to a \$220 million agreement that will keep Sikorsky Aircraft Corp. in the state to produce a new line of heavy cargo helicopters. The bill cleared the House of Representatives on Wednesday by a vote of 136-6. Earlier in the day, it passed the Senate 35-1. Democratic Gov. Dannel P. Malloy's administration reached the deal with

Sikorsky and its new owner, Maryland-based Lockheed Martin. Malloy is expected to sign the bill into law. He calls the agreement "bold" and "forward-thinking" and says it will help Sikorsky workers and hundreds of small businesses across the state. Republican House Minority Leader Themis Klarides (THEHM'-his KLEHR'-ih-dehs) says she supports the deal with "a heavy heart." She says the state shouldn't have to chase after businesses. The Sikorsky agreement needs approval from union workers, who are expected to OK it. The company would build nearly 200 heavy cargo helicopters in Stratford by 2032.

A Kiawah Island couple's letter to Sen. Lindsey Graham about their son's death in Israel has prompted the South Carolina senator to threaten U.S. aid to the Palestinian Authority. Roy Blunt, R-Mo., say the U.S. should stop all economic assistance to the Palestinian Authority until it stops financially rewarding people described by the three senators as terrorists who commit acts of violence against Israel. Taylor Force, a graduate of the U.S. Military Academy, was killed in March while in Jaffa during a trip for his graduate-degree program. The Palestinian attacker, who also wounded 10 others, was shot and killed. Congress has previously required that U.S. aid be reduced by the same amount the Palestinian Authority spends to support terror suspects and their families. Graham said the legislation introduced Tuesday would target all economic assistance.

In 2010, Stuart and Robbi Force retired — as many do — to Kiawah Island, looking for a change of scenery and a chance to do something new in their "golden years" now that their two children, a son and daughter, were all grown up. Six years later, they found a calling in the aftermath of unfathomable tragedy: The death of their 28-year-old son, Taylor, at the hands of a Palestinian terrorist during a trip sponsored by Vanderbilt University, where he was attending graduate school. The circumstance surrounding Taylor Force's fatal stabbing in Tel Aviv in March of this year led his parents through a run of Google searches, news articles and court opinions on the Palestinian Authority's reported practice of offering monetary rewards to Palestinians who kill Americans or Israelis. Finally, on Wednesday, it brought them to Washington, D.C., for the unveiling of legislation named for their son — an Iraq War veteran — and introduced in his honor. "We are here to let the Force family know their son did not die in vain," U.S. Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., said at a press conference to announce the Taylor Force Act, which would compel the secretary of state to confirm the Palestinian Authority is not incentivizing terrorist acts. Without those assurances, the U.S. government's cash flow to the Palestinian Authority would be stopped.

Trey Gowdy. "Mount Pleasant would be lucky to have such a prestigious museum in the shadow of the USS Yorktown, and the National Medal of Honor Museum could find no better home than one of the top tourist destinations in the world," Sanford said.

U.S. Rep. Mick Mulvaney, R-Indian Land, has a wide lead over Democrat Fran Person in the 5th District congressional race, according to a new poll commissioned by the S.C. Republican Party. Conducted by Benchmark Research, the automated telephone survey shows Mulvaney winning with 51 percent support in the state's Piedmont district. Person of Tega Cay, a former aide to Vice President Joe Biden, has 28 percent support. Nearly one in five voters – or 18 percent – are undecided, and American Party candidate Rudy Barnes picked up 2 percent support, the poll said. Benchmark's Walter Whetsell, a GOP consultant from Lexington, said the poll reflects the opinions of 1,200 registered voters contacted on land lines Tuesday. First elected to Congress in 2010, beating long-time Democratic U.S. Rep. John Spratt, Mulvaney won re-election in 2012 with 56 percent of the vote over Democrat Joyce Knott. In 2014, Mulvaney beat Democrat Tom Adams, picking up 59 percent of the vote.

Greenville News: Supreme Court case opposes Greenville college voter registration policy

The Greenville County Election Commission faces a challenge to defend its policy that effectively bars college students from registering to vote using their on-campus address as the weight of case law opposes its policy, including a ruling by the highest court in the land. Greenville County is clinging to a 1973 federal court decision rendered by a judge in Greenville that allowed the county to issue questionnaires to college students who live on campus as a way to verify their eligibility to register to vote in Greenville. But the Supreme Court, in a 1979 ruling in *Symm vs. the United States*, upheld college students' right to register to vote at either their college address or their previous home address. That case dealt with a similar policy held by a voter registrar in Texas to issue questionnaires to college students who registered using their campus address. "It's a Supreme Court decision summarily affirming a decision that struck down these challenged questionnaires," said Jon Sherman, counsel for Fair Elections Legal Network, a national nonpartisan voting rights organization. "It's certainly very persuasive authority that these questionnaires are unconstitutional."

Hillary Clinton dominated Google searches in South Carolina during Monday night's first presidential debate, surpassing Donald Trump as the top-searched candidate in the state. The only exception was the Augusta metro area, which includes Aiken and Edgefield counties, according to Google Trends. Besides her name, the top trending search for Clinton in South Carolina was "Hillary Clinton dot com," after she asked viewers to follow along in real time on her website to fact-check Trump's statements. Another top search was "Hillary Clinton fact checker." The top trending search for the Republican nominee in South Carolina was "Did Donald Trump support the Iraq War." When Clinton said that Trump supported the war in Iraq, he called her statement "mainstream media nonsense," likely triggering the spike in searches for his record on the conflict. There is no evidence that Trump ever expressed public opposition for the war, but he did express lukewarm support. In the last year, South Carolinians' most frequent searches have included "Hillary Clinton seizures," "Hillary Clinton indictment" and "Hillary Clinton dead," according to Google Trends. Among the most frequent Trump queries over the last 12 months were "Donald Trump SNL" and "Donald Trump family."

A lawsuit filed against the Department of Energy over proposed shipments of liquid nuclear waste to the Savannah River Site has stalled in court. Legal counsel recently withdrew from a coalition of environmental and nuclear watchdog organizations that filed suit against the Department of Energy over proposed shipments of liquid nuclear waste from Chalk River in Ontario, Canada, across American roadways to SRS. Washington, D.C.-based attorney Diana Curran, legal counsel for the coalition, submitted a notice of withdrawal last week, notifying the judge in the case, Tayna S. Chutkan. The coalition was given until Nov. 1, 2016 to obtain allowable counsel and notify the courts, at which time the hearing motion can be submitted again. According to a spokesperson from Beyond Nuclear, one of the plaintiffs from the watchdog coalition, the group plans to find new counsel soon.

At the bimonthly meeting of Savannah River Site's Citizens Advisory Board on Tuesday, the board voted to send official recommendations to the Department of Energy and highlighted ongoing negotiations surrounding the newly constructed Salt Waste Processing Facility, or SWPF. One of the recommendations came before the board from the Strategic and Legacy Management Committee regarding the community involvement plan. That plan is a requirement for Energy Department projects that last for longer than 120 day. The baseline plan was developed from interviews and conversations with community residents. According to the recommendation, the plan was revised and updated several times since its inception, but a new baseline has not been set since it was implemented in 1991. The recommendation calls for a new baseline to be established because of technological and waste management evolution in the last 25 years. The second recommendation came from the Waste Management Committee and honed in on the DOE models for liquid waste management in the future. According to the recommendation, the CAB looked at three model plans laid out by DOE, each with variables for timelines and equipment.

WHERE WERE you, what were you doing, when the water started rising? Because human beings feel a need to mark anniversaries — particularly communal anniversaries, particularly early on — it's a question we'll ask and be asked over and over as we approach Tuesday's one-year anniversary of the floods we never could have imagined. But there's another question we need to ask — certainly of ourselves, if not of others also: What did you do about the floods? And another still: What are you still doing about the floods? For many of us, the answer to the first question will be heart-warming. Many heroes rushed into the floodwaters to save neighbors and even strangers. They pulled out their boats and maneuvered them through rivers and lakes that had been streets and yards, plucking up infants, the infirm and everyone in between, and hauling them to higher ground. They pounded on doors to roust neighbors and help them gather up what possessions they could as the waters rose.

IF THE RAINS came again today, they would not destroy nearly as many homes and businesses, would not force nearly so many evacuations and disruptions. But much of Columbia could be without drinkable water for as long as we were a year ago. The good news comes largely from inertia: The walls of water that swept through our community have already done their worst to the homes and businesses in their path; today the buildings sit empty, or have been bulldozed over, or rebuilt to higher and safer standards. And the dams that breached and sent those walls of water over our homes and business a year ago have not been repaired; the lakes they held back have reverted to meandering streams. The bad news also comes from inertia: Although Columbia officials finally patched the 60-foot gash in the Columbia Canal dike that is crucial to distributing safe water to 188,000 customers, the patch is hardly ready for another onslaught of floodwaters. And while the waterlines that sprang leaks under the weight of the flooding have been repaired, the city has not updated the sprawling system of aging waterlines. That means Columbia's water system is no more ready today than it was a year ago to distribute safe water to a flooded community.

The State: Canal's failure put Columbians 'less than a day away' from losing water supply

The soft-spoken engineer from rural Newberry County took the helm of Columbia's drinking water system because he wanted less stress on his family life. Eight weeks later, an epic rain nearly broke the capital city's water supply. Clint Shealy accepted the job and a cut in pay to put an end to long hours as a consultant and to see his wife and kids more. Then the heavens opened. The flood of October 2015 was the greatest crisis in the history of Columbia's water department. It tested the endurance Shealy developed as a triathlete, stressed his even-keeled personality, and threatened fresh water for 188,000 customers stretching to lower Richland County. By the time the weekend deluge ended, two feet of rain flooded the metropolitan area, taking nine lives in Richland County and causing at least half a billion dollars in damage. Customers suffered through days of interrupted water service. The nearly 200-year-old Columbia Canal wall gave way. The city issued its first system-wide,

boil-water advisory. Repairs to the canal — far from finished — are expected to cost about \$100 million.

The sight of a wrecked title loan building on Devine Street causes Lois McCarty to shake her head in grief almost every day. One year ago next week, her husband, Bob, drowned in a flood after a dam on Fort Jackson broke. His body was found just up the creek from the abandoned building. Lois McCarty drives past the battered structure when she leaves her nearby home and heads up Devine Street toward downtown Columbia. "Every time I go by that building, it tears me apart," she said. "I can just picture seeing Bob that day. It's a terrible, terrible reminder." Lois McCarty is among more than 100 people who have hired lawyers to sue the federal government over the failure of the Semmes Lake dam, an aging Fort Jackson structure that blew out Oct. 4, 2015.

For the first time since October's historic floods Joseph Henry's house is starting to feel like home again. "Oh it was scary. Since we are on this corner we were catching all the water coming down the street and across the street," says Henry. He tells ABC Columbia they didn't experience a large amount of standing water, but the little they had still did enough damage to require repairs. The homeowner explains, "A whole lot of mold damage, and water damage stuff like that. From the work and the money stand point we wouldn't have been able to do half of it, none of it." The American Red Cross and non profit disaster recovery organization the St. Bernard Project brought in a team of volunteers who wasted no time getting to work. "The first thing that we did was repair the roof. We've also put in some french drains to try and trap that water that's going to keep trying to roll towards the house and then mold remediation was the next big step," says Leah Cossette with the St. Bernard Project. The South Carolina American Red Cross opened 2,000 cases following the floods, 700 of them in the central part of the state. Making the historic rainfall South Carolina's worst disaster in recent history.

As South Carolina approaches the first anniversary of the historic floods that hit the state last October, a national expert on insurance and risk management says there are some lessons the state, and its homeowners and business owners, should have learned. Robert Hartwig is a new professor at the Darla Moore School of Business at USC and co-director of the Risk and Uncertainty Management Center there. He says one lesson applies to both homeowners and small business owners. "It is a popular misconception that your standard homeowner's insurance policy or your small business policy covers you for flooding. It doesn't. It is universally excluded. You need a separate policy," he says. The flood that hit the state last October has been referred to as a "thousand-year" flood, so some homeowners and business owners might think it's such a rare event that, having gone through that already, they don't have to worry about getting any more flooding.

South Carolina's legal community mourned Wednesday for Circuit Judge Tanya Gee, who has died after a battle with cancer. She was 39. Gee's community involvement started in college, when she became involved with a local homeless shelter. In law school, she served as president of both the Pro Bono Board and the Public Interest Law Society.

A national hospital chain headquartered in central Pennsylvania has agreed to pay \$32.7 million to resolve allegations that it billed Medicare for medically unnecessary services. The Department of Justice alleged that between 2006 and 2013, Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania-based Vibra Healthcare admitted patients to five long-term health care hospitals and an inpatient rehabilitation facility although their symptoms didn't qualify them for admission. Federal authorities also alleged that the company extended the stays of patients unnecessarily, sometimes ignoring its own clinicians' recommendations that they were ready for discharge. The company, which has facilities in 15 states, said it settled the suit without an admission of liability to resolve the case and avoid a prolonged legal battle. Vibra Healthcare said it denied wrongdoing and believed its hospitals acted in accordance with all applicable regulations.

Island Packet: USMC: Siddiqui's death didn't stop hazing, recruit abuse in his platoon

The death of Pvt. Raheel Siddiqui wasn't enough to end the hazing and abuse documented in his training platoon at Marine Corps Recruit Depot Parris Island. "Instances of recruit abuse continued to occur in Platoon 3042 (Company K, 3rd Recruit Training Battalion) after" his death on March 18, according to a copy of a Marine Corps investigation obtained by The Island Packet and Beaufort Gazette through an open records request. The heavily redacted document — more than 40 of its 133 pages are completely blacked out — details instances of drill instructors choking recruits and requiring them to engage in unauthorized incentive training. And the investigation — one of three recently obtained by the newspapers — also details a troubling "command philosophy" in Company K. Siddiqui — a 20-year-old American Muslim of Pakistani descent from Taylor, Mich. — died from injuries sustained after an almost 40-foot fall after jumping from the third floor of his barracks, according to the investigation. The fall was preceded by a drill instructor allegedly slapping Siddiqui in the face after making him perform "get-backs" for failing to properly report when requesting permission to go to sickbay for a sore throat.

Audio from 911 calls has revealed more information about the morning Marine Corps recruit Raheel Siddiqui fell to his death. A staff sergeant "from Kilo Company" called 911 at 5:36 a.m. March 18 and informed dispatchers that a recruit had "jumped from the third deck" and was on the "PT-field side" of "Building 683," according to audio and documents obtained from the Beaufort County Sheriff's Office through an open records request by The Island Packet and The Beaufort Gazette. Building 683 is a barracks in 3rd Recruit Training Battalion at Marine Corps Recruit Depot Parris Island, according to depot spokesperson Capt. Greg Carroll. Siddiqui, 20, an American Muslim of Pakistani descent from Taylor, Mich., was assigned to 3rd Battalion's Company K — Kilo Company. He was allegedly hazed and called a "terrorist" at some point before his death, according to initial findings from a Corps command investigation. Prior to reportedly jumping from the third floor of his barracks, a drill

instructor allegedly slapped him after forcing him to run back and forth inside the barracks for failing to properly report — Siddiqui was requesting permission to go to sickbay for a sore throat.

Police say some of the reported sightings have been hoaxes.

But when asked what he hoped would come out of his second upcoming trial for the kidnapping charge, Moorer simply said, "the truth." When asked what that truth was, he told reporters to ask Assistant Solicitor Nancy Livesay. Moorer was sentenced to five months in jail July 29, after Judge R. Markley Dennis found him to be in contempt when he spoke to a reporter, violating a gag order in the first trial of his kidnapping charge. He earned credit for an earlier release through good behavior and picking up work duties at the jail. Moorer is accused of kidnapping Elvis, who was last seen or heard from Dec. 18, 2013.

The State: Car crashes, overdoses top causes of accidental deaths in Lexington

Vehicle crashes and overdoses were the leading causes of accidental deaths in Lexington County last year. Forty-nine people died from injuries sustained in vehicle crashes, and 46 from overdoses, according to an annual report released Wednesday by county coroner Margaret Fisher. The leading

cause of all deaths was heart-related health concerns, Fisher said. Fisher said that of the 1,691 deaths in the county last year, the majority, or 1,492, were natural deaths. The leading cause of natural deaths, making up 30 percent of them, was heart-related illness. But 126 deaths were accidental, 44 were suicides, 21 were homicides and 8 were undetermined. "These statistics are representative of much more than numerical values," Fisher said. "Each life was meaningful, and each individual was valuable." Gunshot wounds made up the vast majority of homicides in 2015 – 81 percent. Neglect made up 10 percent of homicides and beating accounted for 9 percent. "We do not intend to minimize the impact of each death," Fisher said. "Rather, we seek to gain wisdom from each one that allows us to prevent losses of this magnitude whenever possible."

Associated Press: Fatal bus crash: No North Carolina charges against church

North Carolina authorities said Wednesday they won't file criminal charges against the South Carolina church that owned a bus that crashed, killing four people. The state Highway Patrol said the driver of the bus lost control when a tire blew Sept. 17, causing the bus to hit the median guardrail and strike cement bridge support columns on U.S. Highway 74 near Hamlet. Sandy River Baptist Church in Chester, South Carolina, owned the bus, which received an estimated \$25,000 damage, the Highway Patrol report said. No one answered the church phone Wednesday, and it didn't have voicemail. The Highway Patrol filed four civil penalties against the church for non-wreck-related violations, including improper registration plates. The fine for all four penalties is about \$150, said Highway Patrol spokesman Lt. Jeff Gordon.

No criminal charges will be filed in the charter bus crash that killed four people and injured more than 40 others traveling with a Rock Hill football team, the N.C. State Highway Patrol announced Wednesday. The church that owned the bus, however, will have to pay civil penalties. Four people, including an 8-year-old boy, were killed in the Sept. 17 crash on U.S. 74 near Hamlet, N.C. Investigators determined the left front tire on the bus blew out, causing the driver to lose control and sending the bus crashing into a guard rail in the median before slamming into a concrete bridge support. The bus was carrying the team, made up of students from several schools, from Rock Hill to Fayetteville, N.C., for a football game that night at the University of God's Chosen. Killed in the crash were the driver, Brian Kirkpatrick, 43; Clinton College students Devonte Gibson, 21, and Tito

Hamilton Jr., 19; and 8-year-old Darice Hicks Jr., whose father is one of the team's coaches.

Richland 1 school district officials are working through a "personnel matter," the district's chief said, after missing a deadline to be reimbursed \$3.1 million in federal funding for impoverished schools. Superintendent Craig Witherspoon was grilled about the issue at a town hall-style meeting last week in which Witherspoon acknowledged the deadline was missed to receive federal Title I reimbursement money but refused to say the funds had been "wasted." "We have to deal with it, which we are," Witherspoon said at the meeting Thursday at St. Andrews Middle School. "No, we didn't waste. Those students are getting devices. They're getting more books and so forth for literacy," he said, referring to students in the district's 20 schools that receive Title I funding for disadvantaged students. The district receives about \$9 million in Title I funding each year.

Allen University has fired its president and hired a interim leader, according to two sources with knowledge of the situation. The historically black school in downtown Columbia on Friday fired Lady June Cole, who had been president three years, without explanation. On Monday, the school hired Ernest McNealey as interim president, according to the sources, who did not wish to be identified. McNealey was president of Stillman College, a historically black college in Alabama, for 16 years until he resigned in 2013. Most recently, he has been an Atlanta-based education consultant. Allen officials have been silent on the transition, saying they cannot talk to media. Repeated efforts to reach members of Allen's board of trustees for comment this week also were unsuccessful.

Associated Press: Despite harsh reviews, Trump resists new debate approach

Unmoved by harsh debate reviews, a defiant Donald Trump showed no sign Wednesday of making any big changes before his second faceoff with Hillary Clinton, pressing ahead with a strategy focused on speaking directly to his white working-class loyalists across the Midwest. Democrat Clinton, meanwhile, pushed to improve her standing among younger voters with the help of the president, Sen. Bernie Sanders and other key allies, 48 hours after her debate performance that seemed to spark badly needed enthusiasm. Those closest to Trump insisted the Republican presidential nominee was satisfied with Monday night's debate, even as prominent voices within his own party called for more serious preparation next time following an opening confrontation marked by missed opportunities and missteps. "Why would we change if we won the debate?" former New York Mayor Rudy Giuliani, a key Trump ally and traveling partner this week, told The Associated Press. "Donald Trump is going to prepare for debates the way Donald Trump prepares for debates."

Associated Press: Trump's stance on nuclear restraint is ambiguous

Donald Trump's ambiguous answer to a debate question on nuclear restraint raised doubts about his understanding of the issue. On the other hand, his words — by design or coincidence — mirror the nub of a policy argument the administration is wrestling with in the final months of Barack Obama's presidency. Asked at this week's debate whether he supports the decades-old U.S. policy of refusing to rule out being the first to use nuclear weapons, Trump at first said, "I would certainly not do first strike." That would seem to indicate he does not support the current policy of keeping it indefinite. But then he said, "I can't take anything off the table." And that would suggest just the opposite: that he would not rule out a nuclear first strike. It was difficult to tell whether Trump has considered this aspect of nuclear weapons policy. Or some others. During a Republican primary debate he was asked his view on modernizing the three main elements of the U.S. nuclear arsenal, known as the "triad," and he couldn't name all three: missiles launched from the air, underground silos and submarines.

Union members are calling the public to boycott Republican presidential nominee Donald Trump's

businesses nationwide because he isn't negotiating a contract with the more than 500 eligible workers at his high-rise Las Vegas hotel. UNITE HERE announced the effort this week. The group is the parent organization of the Culinary Union, which represents about 57,000 Las Vegas-area hospitality workers. "After a disgraceful anti-union campaign against their own workers, the hotel still refuses to negotiate with their employees," Geoconda Arguello-Kline, the top officer at the Culinary Union, said in a statement. "We call on allies and workers to stand in solidarity in a national boycott until Donald Trump, the 'Great Negotiator,' comes to the table." Workers at Trump's hotel voted in December to unionize, but management hasn't started bargaining with them. Experts say it could take years, and court action, before management is forced to come to the table.

A top Cuban diplomat on Wednesday rejected Donald Trump's threat to undo detente with Cuba unless the single-party government meets the Republican presidential candidate's demands. Trump said in Miami this month that he would reverse President Barack Obama's executive orders loosening the U.S. trade embargo on the island unless Cuba meets demands including "religious and political freedom for the Cuban people and the freeing of political prisoners." Gustavo Machin, Cuba's deputy director of U.S. affairs, said Cuba would never be pressured into making internal reforms, and he said whoever is the next U.S. president should respect Cuba's right to self-determination. "Cuba has always made clear that Cuba's internal matters aren't on the negotiating table," Machin told reporters. "They're a function of internal decisions by Cuba and the Cuban people and we really call on the next president of the United States to stick to those principles. They're not Cuba's principles; they're principles of international law."

Associated Press : Black man shot dead in California just after police arrived

Police in the San Diego suburb of El Cajon shot and killed a black man a minute after arriving near a strip mall to investigate a report of a mentally unstable person walking in and out of traffic, an official said Wednesday. El Cajon Police Department spokesman Lt. Rob Ransweiler said two officers arrived at the scene at about 2:10 p.m. Tuesday. Ransweiler says the shooting happened at 2:11 p.m. He said police received the report about the mentally unstable person at 12:57 p.m. but did not immediately respond because they had other calls for service. Police have said the man refused to comply with instructions to remove a hand from his pants pocket, paced back and forth, then rapidly drew an object from the pocket, placed both hands together and extended them in a "shooting stance." The officers simultaneously fired a handgun and an electric stun gun.

Averting an election-year crisis, the Senate on Wednesday passed a bill to keep the government operating through Dec. 9 and provide \$1.1 billion in long-delayed funding to battle the Zika virus. The House was poised to act on the measure before day's end. The sweeping 72-26 vote came after top congressional leaders broke through a stalemate over aid to help Flint, Michigan, address its water crisis. Democratic advocates for Flint are now satisfied with Republican assurances that money for

Flint will be finalized after the election. The hybrid spending measure is the last major item on Capitol Hill's pre-election agenda and caps months of wrangling over money to fight the mosquito-borne Zika virus. The spending bill also includes \$500 million for rebuilding assistance to flood-ravaged Louisiana and other states. Both the House and Senate in rapid succession also overrode President Barack Obama's veto of legislation to allow families of Sept. 11 victims sue Saudi Arabia for its alleged backing of the attackers, handing him the first veto override of his presidency.

In a resounding rebuke, Democrats joined with Republicans Wednesday to hand Barack Obama the first veto override of his presidency, voting overwhelmingly to allow families of Sept. 11 victims to sue Saudi Arabia in U.S. courts for its alleged backing of the attackers. Both the House and Senate voted decisively to reverse Obama's decision to scuttle the legislation. Democrats in both chambers abandoned the president in large numbers despite warnings from Obama and top national security officials that flaws in the bill could put U.S. interests, troops, and intelligence personnel at risk. The Senate vote was 97-1, with only Senate Minority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., backing the president. The House vote a few hours later was 348-77, with 123 Democrats rebuffing the president and voting to override. Obama said during a CNN interview that overriding his veto was a mistake that may set a "dangerous precedent." Lawmakers said their priority wasn't Saudi Arabia, but the 9/11 victims and their families who continue to demand justice 15 years after attackers killed nearly 3,000 people in New York, the Washington, D.C., area, and Pennsylvania. Fifteen of the 19 Sept. 11 hijackers were Saudis.

Associated Press: Saudi Arabia has ways to hit back at 9/11 lawsuit effort

Saudi Arabia and its allies are warning that U.S. legislation allowing the kingdom to be sued for the 9/11 attacks will have negative repercussions. The kingdom maintains an arsenal of tools to retaliate with, including curtailing official contacts, pulling billions of dollars from the U.S. economy, and persuading its close allies in the Gulf Cooperation Council to scale back counterterrorism cooperation, investments and U.S. access to important regional air bases. "This should be clear to America and to the rest of the world: When one GCC state is targeted unfairly, the others stand around it," said Abdulkhaleq Abdullah, an Emirati Gulf specialist and professor of political science at United Arab Emirates University. "All the states will stand by Saudi Arabia in every way possible," he said. When Saudi Arabia wanted to pressure Qatar to limit its support for the Muslim Brotherhood group in Egypt, it spearheaded an unprecedented withdrawal of Gulf Arab ambassadors from Doha in 2014 and essentially isolated the tiny gas-rich nation within the GCC.
