### Governor Nikki Haley News:

**Post and Courier:** South Carolina officials take sides in refugee debate

South Carolina's Democratic and Republican lawmakers are taking sides in the debate over Syrian refugees, a fight that, as yet, has no battleground in the state. Calls to keep Syrian refugees from coming into the United States have increased since the terrorist attacks in Paris, with presidential candidates and governors branding them potential terrorists and questioning the federal government's screening.

**Note:** Gov. Nikki Haley sought to navigate a tightrope on the issue, initially saying the issue was inadequate vetting of refugees rather than their Muslim faith. Eventually, she joined other Republican lawmakers in saying the refugees should not be resettled in South Carolina because of the risk to public safety.

The Thanksgiving weekend marks eight weeks since historic rainfall flooded parts of South Carolina. Many things are returning to normal after up to 2 feet of rain fell in areas from Columbia to the coast from Oct. 2 to 5. Nearly 90 percent of the roads closed at the height of the storm are back open.

**Note:** But many questions remain. An official damage estimate has not been released, and until that figure is known, Gov. Nikki Haley and many state lawmakers say it will be impossible to commit to an exact plan on how to pay for the flood. The deadline to apply for federal assistance is Dec. 4.

The retirement of two South Carolina Supreme Court justices by the end of next year isn't expected to result in immediate or drastic changes in its rulings, primarily because of the importance of legal precedent. "The law stands on previous decisions," said Bob Bockman, University of South Carolina School of Law professor.

**Note:** That likely will disappoint Gov. Nikki Haley and legislative leaders who have criticized the state's high court for overstepping its authority on the 22-year-old Abbeville lawsuit.

Two state lawmakers believe 2016 is ripe for eliminating South Carolina's income tax. A recent study by the National Center for Policy Analysis revealed that income tax reform efforts by North Carolina's governor and General Assembly have made the state more competitive with South Carolina.

**Note:** But they also supported Gov. Nikki Haley's call last session for coupling a phased in 10 cents a gallon gas-tax increase with a 2 percent reduction in the income tax. But they want to take it further by eliminating the income tax.

**Note:** The new law, signed by Gov. Nikki Haley, will impose a lifetime gun ban on the worst abusers and an automatic three- or 10-year ban in other cases. Haley also appointed a domestic violence task force that looked at the problem from several angles.
