Charleston Shooting News:

Associated Press: Pastor, 8 others, fatally shot at church in Charleston, SC

A white man opened fire during a prayer meeting inside a historic black church in downtown Charleston, killing nine people, including the pastor, in an assault authorities described as a hate crime. The suspect attended the meeting at the church Wednesday night and stayed for nearly an hour before the deadly gunfire erupted, Police Chief Greg Mullen said.

Note: In a statement, Gov. Nikki Haley asked South Carolinians to pray for the victims and their families and decried violence at religious institutions. "We'll never understand what motivates anyone to enter one of our places of worship and take the life of another," Haley said.

Mullen said investigators are going through all kinds of video, public and private, to try to get more information on the suspect's whereabouts. Officers throughout the region are assisting in the search -- City of Charleston, Charleston County, SLED and FBI were all mentioned.
