A newly formed council will rank the business-friendliness of local governments across South Carolina and establish guidelines to help counties attract jobs. Gov. Nikki Haley on Wednesday announced the Local Government Competitiveness Council, which will evaluate counties and rank them based on several of factors including public infrastructure, taxes and business regulation and workforce readiness, said Department of Revenue director Rick Reames, who is heading the task force.

Note: "Right now I have some of my counties saying, 'Why didn't that company come to us? What else could we have done?'" Haley said during a news conference. "My job is to bring companies to South Carolina. The counties' job is to win them."
