The Greenwood County Sheriff's Office is warning residents to be aware of flood related scams in the area.

"There is usually a lot of scams that pop up after any natural disaster," said Capt. Dale Kittles, commander of GCSO's Community Services Division. "People are trying to save their homes and businesses and the last thing they need is a scammer taking advantage of them when they are the most vulnerable."

The most common disaster related scams include debris removal and clean up, shoddy repairs and construction,

and charity fraud, according to Kittles.

Kittles said never give a contractor a down payment in cash. Legitimate contractors typically bill after the work is completed and will accept a check or credit card as a payment method. You can also ask for a current license and certificate of insurance, Kittles said, and always confirm with your insurance company to make sure any repairs are covered by your policy before letting a contractor begin work.

Though contractor scams seem to be the most common, Kittles said there are other ways scammers can take advantage of a natural disaster.

“We also see a lot of suspect charities popping up,” Kittles said. “Either it’s a totally fake charity or the charity is not honest about how the donated money will be used.”

Kittles said it is generally better to stick with recognized charities such as the United Way and American Red Cross or charities which you personally know are legitimate.

“The bottom line is scammers will always find a way to try to take your money,” Kittles said. “Like any other scams out there, you just need to keep your guard up and if something doesn’t seem right then don’t hand over any money and report it to the appropriate authorities.”

Receive information about **FEMA** home inspections.

Get other questions answered about federal disaster assistance.

Applicants should have their nine-digit **FEMA** registration number and zip code if they want to discuss their application.

Survivors may still visit other recovery centers to ask disaster assistance questions. They can locate the closest center by visiting asd.fema.gov/inter/locator/home.htm.

Representatives from the South Carolina Emergency Management Division, **Federal Emergency Management Agency**, U.S. Small Business Administration and other agencies are at centers to answer questions about disaster assistance and low-interest loans.

Red Cross launches multi-state response to storms (Pickens Sentinel)

GREENVILLE — The American Red Cross launched a massive relief response across multiple states in the wake of the deadly storms that have been hammering communities across most of the country since before the Christmas holiday.

“Red Cross disaster workers have been helping people affected by these storms since before Christmas and will continue to help them as long as needed,” said Ann Wright, executive director for the American Red Cross of Upstate SC. “We ask everyone to remember these families who have lost everything and had their holiday celebrations tragically interrupted by giving to Red Cross Disaster Relief. We depend on generous financial donations to provide comfort and hope to people in need.”

Several days of tornadoes, flooding and winter storms left behind damaged homes, downed power lines and closed highways. Red Cross and community shelters are open in Texas, Alabama, Georgia, Oregon, Illinois, Missouri, New Mexico and Oklahoma. The Red Cross is also supporting families in Arkansas, Tennessee and Mississippi due to severe weather and flooding.

More than 1,100 homes have been damaged by storms across the affected areas and the number could increase. Hundreds of trained Red Cross disaster workers left their loved ones and homes over the holiday and opened shelters for those affected, providing meals, distributing comfort kits and clean-up supplies and meeting with those affected to help them plan their next steps.

The onslaught of storms plaguing most of the country have resulted in possible flooding and flash flooding along many rivers and has prompted flood warnings for areas of the Upstate. The Red Cross urges people in the path of these storms to get ready now. Information about what people should do to prepare their household for possible flooding, tornadoes, winter storms and other weather emergencies is available at redcross.org.

If flooding occurs

Listen to local radio and television stations for possible flood warnings and reports of flooding in progress or other critical information from the National Weather Service (NWS). People should also:

- Be prepared to evacuate at a moment’s notice.
- When a flood warning is issued for your area, head for higher ground and stay there.
- Stay away from floodwaters. If you come upon a flowing stream where water is above your ankles, stop, turn around and go another way.

• If you come upon a flooded road while driving, turn around and go another way. If you are caught on a flooded road and waters are rising rapidly around you, get out of the car quickly and move to higher ground. Most cars can be swept away by less than two feet of moving water.

- Keep children out of the water.
- Be especially cautious at night when it is harder to recognize flood danger


The Red Cross will be helping people affected by this storm for weeks and months to come, while at the same time responding to other emergencies, including helping people whose homes are destroyed by fires. The Red Cross responds to nearly 70,000 disasters each year in the United States — the vast majority of which are home fires.

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

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
