28 Counter Terrorism

SC Code Section 23-3-15(A)(8) -The Counter Terrorism unit ensures coordination and management of SLED law enforcement and intelligence resources (JTTF, Seahawk, FWMDRT, Fusion, and the State WMD team) to avoid duplication of effort and to assess needs and provide appropriate resource allocation. This unit also includes: coordination of the overall security and personal protection for at-risk officials; and coordination of emergency planning and preparedness functions with appropriate federal, state and local agencies during local, state, and federal high risk events or emergency situations.

Expected Results:

Improve the safety of people and property. Provide timely, efficient, and quality coordination and management of state counter terrorism resources; provide manpower and technical assistance to local, state and federal agencies during natural disasters, emergency situations and high risk events.

Outcome Measures:

Approximately 350 agents have completed Incident Command System (ICS) training 100 and 200. Additional ICS training is scheduled and the agency will soon be in full compliance with Homeland Security Presidential Directive 8 (HSPD-8). The agency's WMD team continues to train on a monthly basis. A total of 30 Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosives (CBRNE) related exercises were conducted with external partners. SLED continues to provide technical assistance to local first responders through the Homeland Security Grants program to purchase Personal Protection Ensembles for law enforcement, emergency medical technicians, and coroners statewide. Security operations reviews were conducted at nuclear plants, railroads, airports, and sea ports. This unit serves as technical staff to the Statewide and Regional Counter Terrorism Coordinating Councils (monitoring over 50 meetings and over 50 speaking engagements annually). During FY04-05, this unit planned and coordinated resources for 87 special events requiring substantial numbers of manpower assets, and technical support.

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29 Missing Persons

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SC Code Section 23-3-200 - Operates Missing Person Information Center to provide missing persons information for dissemination; and provides statewide AMBER Alert triggering mechanism.

Expected Results:

Improve the safety of people and property. Provide and distribute timely and accurate information regarding missing persons to local, state and federal law enforcement agencies; transportation agencies; broadcasters; the emergency alert system; etc. in an effort to recover missing and abducted children and vulnerable adults.

Outcome Measures:

Maintain a Missing and Exploited Children's program to support the National program. Trigger the statewide AMBER Alert System when a case meets the established criteria and is specifically requested by a Chief, Sheriff or another state. During FY04-05, five (5) such alerts were triggered (two were South Carolina cases, and the other three were requested by Mesquite, TX, North Carolina, and Georgia).

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30 Investigative Services

SC Code Section 23-3-15(A)(1) - Investigative units at SLED provide extensive investigative and technical assistance, upon request, to local, state and federal agencies. The Investigative Services Unit at SLED assists local, state and federal entities and conducts approximately 3,800 criminal investigations per year. Services include: field investigations of major felony crimes, special event assistance, and sequestered jury security details.

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31 Arson/Bomb

SC Code Section 23-3-15(A)(1) - This unit is responsible for assisting local law enforcement and fire services with the investigation of suspicious fires, explosives and related incidents. This unit maintains technical equipment and specialized K-9's to detect accelerants and explosives. Provides bomb and explosive disposal services.

Expected Results:

Improve the safety of people and property. Provide timely, efficient and quality manpower and technical assistance for local, state, and federal law enforcement, prosecutorial and judicial entities.

Outcome Measures:

The Arson unit investigated approximately \$2.8 million in property losses last year. This unit strives to continue to exceed the national average for arson cases cleared by arrest. During 2004, this unit conducted a total of 582 arson/bomb investigations, of which over 30% were cleared by arrests; this is almost double the national average of 16%. The Bomb unit is now regionalized throughout the state and continues to rapidly respond to requests (24/7) to defuse explosive devices.

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32 State Grand Jury/Insurance Fraud

SC Code Sections 23-3-15(A)(1); 14-7-1610; 14-7-1780 - This unit provides multi-jurisdictional investigations into narcotics and dangerous drug violations; investigates public corruption, securities fraud, pornography and computer crimes; and, conducts insurance fraud investigations.

Outcome Measures:

This unit opened or investigated over 700 State Grand Jury or insurance fraud investigations; 59 convictions and 38 civil remedies resulted from the Insurance Fraud unit's investigations (ranking 2nd nationally in convictions). These investigations resulted in over \$175,000 in civil fines and restitution.

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33 Tactical Services

SC Code Section 23-3-15(A)(5) - The tactical services units consists of Aviation, Bloodhound Tracking and SWAT services. These units provide state helicopter law enforcement operations to include search and rescue and tactical support; provide aerial assistance during natural disasters; offer tracking assistance in search of criminal suspects and lost or missing persons; and, provide specialized assistance in dealing with armed fugitives and suspects.

Outcome Measures:

The goal of the Tactical Services units is to resolve critical situations and includes the following functions: perform rescue and recovery operations; track and arrest armed and dangerous fugitives; recover missing persons; and provide aerial support in support of these and other emergency or critical events. In 2004, the Tracking Team responded to 89 calls and 28 persons were apprehended. The Fugitive Task Force opened 188 cases and arrested 157 fugitives. The SWAT Team responded to 24 calls and the Aviation unit made 327 flights.

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34 Special Operations

SC Code Sections 23-3-15(A)(1)(6) - This unit consists of several services to include Behavioral Science assistance, Fugitive Operations (Operation Intercept), Forensic Art, Case Files, and Polygraph. This unit provides psychological profiling, prepares court exhibits, computer aging, skull reconstruction and composite sketches; provides polygraph examinations for criminal matters statewide; and assists local, state, and federal authorities with the apprehension of fugitives.

Outcome Measures:

The Support Services unit conducted 856 polygraph tests in 2004; approximately 78 requests for psychological profiling were received (of which approximately 43 were threat assessments). The Fugitive unit investigated 188 fugitive cases which resulted in the arrest of 157 fugitives. The Forensic Art unit prepared 118 composite sketches, 4 facial reconstructions, and generated 19 graphics for criminal prosecution/courtroom presentation purposes.

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35 Forensic Laboratory - DNA/Serology

SC Code Sections 23-3-15(A)(2); 23-3-610 - The DNA/Serology laboratory performs serological and DNA analysis of biological evidence, and maintains the Combined DNA Indexing System Database (CODIS). In addition to ASCLD/LAB accreditation the DNA/Serology laboratory continues to maintain compliance with FBI-directed DNA Advisory Board (DNAB) guidelines. The DNA/Serology laboratory provides services to the South Carolina criminal justice system with expert examination of evidence in criminal cases and expert testimony delivery in court proceedings. The purpose of the DNA/Serology laboratory is to manage, coordinate and provide DNA/Serology services through a partnership with local, state, and federal criminal justice agencies to improve law enforcement's capacity to assist in the detection, capture, and prosecution of criminal suspects, and ultimately, to assist crime prevention efforts.

Outcome Measures:

During FY04-05, SLED DNA/Serology laboratory personnel: received 2,024 cases, and completed 840; received 14,337 service requests, and completed 8,230; provided 34 expert witness courtroom testimonies; attended 46 training events; processed and added DNA offender samples to bring the CODIS database to a current total of approximately 38,800 profiles; and, to date, utilized the DNA Offender Database to link 84 previously unrelated cases, and to provide identification of 188 suspects.

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36 Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS)

SC Code Sections 23-3-15(A)(1)(4); 23-3-410; 23-3-1010(C) - Criminal Justice Information Services include Central Records management, maintenance of the Crime Information Network, Uniform Crime Reporting, Computer Crimes, identification services, and data processing. The purpose of this program area is to provide criminal justice information needed to prevent crime, solve cases, recover property, and identify and apprehend criminals; and investigate high tech computer crimes including child pornography and conduct the retrieval and analysis of digital information. This component also provides screening to

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identify persons with criminal warrants, arrests, and convictions, and to provide crime statistics and analytical data to policy-makers and to the public.

Expected Results:

Improve the safety of people and property. Provide timely, efficient and quality operation of the statewide criminal justice information system in support of local, state, and federal law enforcement, prosecutorial and judicial entities.

Outcome Measures:

Customers of the Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS) are provided immediate access to criminal history information, warrant files, sex offender information, etc. through electronic information sharing. In FY04-05, CJIS had approximately 9,757 terminals accessing its information; approximately 500,000 daily electronic transactions were processed; 1,740 incident and arrest reports were processed daily; approximately 926 fingerprint cards were received for processing daily; and approximately 1,086 criminal history records were processed daily for custody, dispositions, expungements, deaths, consolidations, and deletes. Total electronic submission and distribution of information is a priority; electronic reporting increased from approximately 90% last year to approximately 95% this year. The number of agencies submitting fingerprints electronically increased during the past twelve months with the implementation of 24 livescans. Also during FY04-05, 780 new National Crime Information Center (NCIC) operators were certified by SLED personnel.

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37 Community Services

SC Code Sections 23-3-15(A)(1), 23-3-65 - Community Services units provide community relations development between law enforcement and the community. This unit houses the SCLEAP program which is responsible for responding to and providing counseling services to all requesting law enforcement agencies and departments in the state that have experienced deaths or other tragedies involving law enforcement officers or other employees. The Training Unit trains SLED personnel on various subject matters, provide training for various law enforcement qualifications and certifications.

Regulatory components increase compliance with state statute and regulations by detective and security companies.

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41 Administration

SC Code Section 23-3-10 - The agency administration activity includes the Office of the Chief, public information, legal services, intergovernmental affairs, grants processing, policy development and review, financial services, facilities management, personnel services, communications, interagency billing, debt service and other related administrative services. The inspections unit conducts annual audits of evidentiary property and unannounced inspections of evidence storage areas; trains personnel on administrative procedures regarding OSHA/Safety, vehicle accidents, workers' compensation and evidence procedures.

Expected Results:

Improve the safety of people and property. Provide timely, efficient, and quality administrative support to internal and external customers.

Outcome Measures:

SLED has consistently received positive approval ratings from its customers. Customer satisfaction surveys have been completed over the last decade whereby the agency's performance has been highly rated. The agency continues to receive good audit reports, positive compliance reviews, and has been nationally accredited and reaccredited through two separate organizations: Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) and the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/Laboratory Accreditation Board

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(ASCLD/LAB). SLED was recently designated a Flagship Agency by CALEA. The agency has met all federally imposed timeframes for Homeland Security initiatives and funding priorities. SLED is administering approximately 95 million dollars in Homeland Security Grants to local and state entities to address counter terrorism needs, and has completed a new statewide homeland security assessment and strategy. SLED has received, and manages through Grants Administration personnel, approximately \$28 million in federal grant funds.

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42 Homeland Security Grants

SC Code Section 23-3-15 (A)(8) - South Carolina receives homeland security funding from the federal government (based on population). Grant funds are received each year and are allocated based on statewide, regional, and local needs established by those entities and within the requirements outlined in the federally required state strategies. Federal guidelines dictate that all funds be awarded, obligated and expended within very specific timeframes. States are required to distribute a minimum of 80 percent of their awarded funds to local government entities. To date, approximately 95 million dollars have been scheduled to pass through SLED to local and state entities. The State Counter Terrorism Coordinating Council is integrally involved in the process of allocation of these funds, which have been awarded pursuant to the State strategies; this process has been recognized by the Department of Homeland Security as a "Best Practice".

The purpose of the Drug Analysis laboratory is to manage, coordinate and provide Drug Analysis services through a partnership with local, state, and federal criminal justice agencies to improve law enforcement's capacity to assist in the detection, capture, and prosecution of criminal suspects, and ultimately, to assist crime prevention efforts. The SLED laboratory has been continuously accredited through the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/ Laboratory Accreditation Board (ASCLD/LAB) since 1994.

Evidence Control functions include evidence intake, assignment of case identification numbers, packaging, routing, destruction, and disposition; and maintenance of written and/or electronic evidence chain of custody disposition data. Evidence Processing functions include: initial processing for biological and trace evidence, performance of screening tests, report generation representing the results of evidence examination, and forwarding of this evidence to other departments for confirmatory testing. This unit provides services to the South Carolina criminal justice system with expert examination of evidence in criminal cases and expert testimony delivery in court proceedings. The SLED laboratory is accredited through the

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American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/Laboratory Accreditation Board (ASCLD/LAB).

This unit provides services to the South Carolina criminal justice system with expert examination of evidence in criminal cases and expert testimony delivery in court proceedings. The purpose of the Firearms Laboratory is to manage, coordinate and provide firearms and toolmark examination services through a partnership with local, state, and federal criminal justice agencies to improve law enforcement's capacity to assist in the detection, capture, and prosecution of criminal suspects, and ultimately, to assist crime prevention efforts. The SLED laboratory has been continuously accredited through the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/ Laboratory Accreditation Board (ASCLD/LAB) since 1994.

The purpose of the laboratory is to manage, coordinate and provide forensic services through a partnership with local, state, and federal criminal justice agencies to improve law enforcement's capacity to assist in the detection, capture, and prosecution of criminal suspects, and ultimately, to assist crime prevention efforts. The SLED laboratory has been continuously accredited through the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/ Laboratory Accreditation Board (ASCLD/LAB) since 1994.

Acting as a neutral third party, the ombudsman determines if indeed a problem does exist between a crime victim and the criminal justice agency, and if so what could be done to rectify the problem. In cases where an agency has committed no wrongdoing and/or has acted within the scope of authority for that agency, those findings are presented to the complainant as well as the agency. In instances where a case is founded in all or part, recommendations are made in an attempt to modify the circumstances so that the same problem does not occur in the future, and so that the current problem can be addressed for the benefit of the crime victim involved. Case management for formal complaints varies in complexity and may take anywhere from two weeks to more than a year to resolve. When the inquiry uncovers additional problems it may necessitate other agencies being contacted and more intensive response on the part of the ombudsman.

Outcome Measures:

In Fiscal Year 2004-2005, approximately fifty formal cases were handled along with other formal cases opened the previous year by the Crime Victims' Ombudsman. The resolutions in these cases have involved an array of actions, including disciplinary responses on the part of the agency against whom the complaint was filed, procedural changes as deemed necessary, and even agency-wide policy change when needed. Training is provided to many groups and organizations, including the Solicitor's Association, the South Carolina Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Victim Services, Law Enforcement Victim Advocates, the Optimist Club, the Columbia Chapter of Parents of Murdered Children. The South Carolina Court Administration is the State's repository of criminal records for both General Sessions Court and Family Court. Court Administration's year-end reports best describe the activities of the Office of Solicitor as it relates to adult and juvenile prosecutions. In the area of adult criminal prosecution for the fiscal year 2003-2004, the Solicitors of this State disposed of 106,363 General Sessions criminal warrants. In the area of juvenile criminal prosecution for fiscal year 2003-2004, the Solicitors of this State disposed of 19,278 Family Court petitions. South Carolina Court Administration's goal of the disposition of criminal cases within 180 days from the date of arrest is a significant factor in all prosecutorial decisions. Currently, 70% of all Family Court petitions are being disposed of within 180 days or less and 56% of all General Sessions warrants are being disposed of within 180 days or less. ** Victim and Witness Assistance Programs within the Offices of the Solicitors assisted 72, 872 adult and juvenile victims during FY 2003/04. During fiscal FY 2003/04, adult criminal drug treatment courts were operational in 7 of 16 judicial circuits. During FY 2003/04 juvenile criminal drug treatment courts were operational in 9 of the 16 judicial circuits. During FY 2003/04, one abuse and neglect treatment court was operational.

The Agency operates and maintains 71 armories IAW National Guard Regulation (NGR) 5-1 and South Carolina Code of Laws 25-1-1640. Most are considered State property. National Guard Bureau (NGB) pays 75/25 of the construction costs and retains its interest for 25 years in exchange for the State agreeing to operate and maintain them. In recent years due to the lack of state funding around the nation, NGB has allowed Appendix 1 funds (see info in next item regarding cooperative agreements and appendices) to be used, if available, to pay some O&M costs on a varying match scale dependent upon the intended use or classification of the facility. The most often used classification/match is state-owned armories on state land and 50/50 match for utilities and repairs to major operating systems of the building. Included in this activity is the Agency's Building and Grounds (B&G) department. B&G performs or contracts for maintenance and repairs on these armories and provides grounds care for the headquarters facilities.

For example, our law enforcement grants measure a project's effect on public safety through reductions in jurisdictional crime (e.g., narcotics task forces), savings in law enforcement time (e.g., LiveScan fingerprint machines), and reductions in operating costs through automation (e.g., computerization of incident-based reporting systems). Victims of crime grant programs use outcome measures based on the number of victims served. Juvenile Justice programs use a variety of measures such as the number of at-risk youth served, delinquency and crime rates and reductions in the numbers of youth held in secure custody. This data is compiled annually, analyzed and reported to the respective federal authorities.

It's the law and it's enforced. campaign, which included an enforcement blitz combined with paid media and diversity outreach components during the Memorial Day holiday period in 2004. The campaign was kicked off with press conferences, which included the unveiling of a new television spot to be aired around the state, were held in four areas of the state on May 17, 2004. Extensive media coverage was achieved. A public information and education effort involving motorcycle safety was held during three motorcycle rallies in the state, two of which were held in May 2004 in Myrtle Beach and one in Anderson in September 2004. The OHS conducted its version of You drink and drive. You lose., known as Sober or Slammer!, surrounding the Labor Day holidays of 2004 (August 27-September 14, 2004). All law enforcement agencies in the state participated in the campaign and conducted more than 100 reported public safety checkpoints and numerous saturation patrols during the nineteen day emphasis. The agencies that reported enforcement numbers for the campaign indicated the following statistics: 760 DUI arrests; 2,856 safety belt citations; 572 child safety seat citations; 127 felony arrests; 52 recovered stolen vehicles; 60 fugitives apprehended; 1,131 suspended license citations; 603 uninsured motorists; 16,974 speeding citations; 103 reckless driving citations, 566 drug arrests; and 8,929 other citations including open container, failure to yield right of way, failure to obey police officer, equipment violations and other violations relating to laws not covered in categories listed above. The OHS implemented NHTSA's DWI Standards Assessment Program in a pilot county in South Carolina. The OHS participated in the "100 Days of Summer Heat" effort by the Southeastern Region of NHTSA during the summer of 2004. Results were positive as traffic fatalities declined during the summer months of 2004 by 16% over against the same time frame in 2003.

In order for a law enforcement candidate to be certified as a police officer, part of their training curriculum includes firearms and driving training. Through 1995 firearms and driving training components of training were successfully completed by officers around the state for certification; approximately 550 – 650 annually. The class size was 40 – 50 officers, and 12 classes were conducted each year. Advanced firearms and driving components of training are successfully completed by all certified law enforcement candidates for instructor level certification, approximately 120 – 130 annually. Over the past ten years the basic training curriculum for police officers has been expanded and updated to meet departmental needs necessary to ensure that each officer has been given the best information (both knowledge and skills) to perform his/her job properly. With the availabilities of numerous grants, departments and agencies have increased in size to keep up with rising demands for their services. Programs such as School Resource Officers and Homeland Security have provided positions that were not available 10 years ago. Along with this growth, the Academy's basic training has grown, also the number of basic classes has nearly doubled and the number of students trained increased 20 – 25 percent in each class. During this rise, the Range Unit incorporated an additional week of advanced firearms training to broaden the officer's knowledge of weapons skills and to compliment the fundamentals learned earlier in the training cycle. The numbers of advanced instructor level classes, both firearms and driving, have been increased as well to meet increased requests. Currently firearms and driving components of training are successfully completed by all basic law enforcement candidates for certification, with 1,415 graduates in FY 05. Advanced firearms and driving components of training are successfully completed by all certified law enforcement candidates for instructor level certification, approximately 200 -250 annually; in-service and recertification requirements are successfully met for veteran officers and instructors, approximately 300 – 350 instructors recertified annually.

This review process is based upon findings in job task analyses conducted every five years. These job task analyses validate curriculum and establish the essential job functions of SC law enforcement officers. During FY 04/05 the Standards Unit has completed a job task analysis for Basic Law Enforcement, Basic Jail, and E911 curricula. Application of findings in the training conducted at CJA and throughout SC law enforcement agencies enhances the standardization of training over the law enforcement community. Additionally, the CJA conducts training classes for two levels of departmental instructors. These instructors are schooled in the use of job task analyses results and in the importance of linking training to the SC law enforcement essential job functions. During FY 04/05 the CJA conducted six in-house Basic Instructor Development and nine Specific Skill instructor development courses. Just as important as content validation is the evaluation component used to select officers for law enforcement certification/re-certification. The Testing Unit of the CJA has completed a thorough academic testing review and conducts on-going in-house reviews associated with establishing valid/non-biased cut scores, grade level readability of test items, etc. The Testing Unit conducts an item analysis of every item used on every test administered. The item analyses are reviewed weekly and thereby a continuous re-validation occurs. All testing activities are in keeping with national standard criteria.

In FY05 DPS entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with the FBI and SLED whereby the FBI would provide \$400,000 to be utilized for renovation of our Weapons Range in exchange for use of the range. The Academy has reached an agreement with the SC National Guard to provide their services over a two year period thus making this project possible. The Academy was given \$1.5 million to be utilized for dormitory renovations. DPS Capital Improvement is setting up a project which will include new carpet, paint, lighting, furniture, HVAC improvements, tile work and ceiling repairs.

Outcome Measures:

The Criminal Justice Academy has entered into a memorandum of understanding with the FBI and SLED whereby the FBI would furnish \$400,000 and a new target system for renovations to our Weapons Range complex. These renovations include raising the current earthen berm, removing the broken concrete flooring and overhead baffles on range #3, replacing the target system on range #3 and construction of a 12 foot wall atop the berm on ranges #3 and #4. Most of the grading, demolition and renovations will be performed by the S.C. National Guard at little cost to DPS. The Legislature provided the Academy with capital funds in the amount of \$1.5 million for renovations to our 33 year old dormitories. These renovations include replacing carpet, repainting, upgrading lighting fixtures, tile and ceiling repairs, HVAC upgrades, waterproofing exterior of buildings and replacement of broken, non-functional furniture. The measurable outcome for Facilities Planning and Facilities Management must be whether or not the facility is maintained in such a condition, within budgetary constraints, to properly support the Academy's training mission.
