The state's crumbling roads and bridges likely won't be getting any new money from the Legislature this year, according to a key lawmaker.

Note: Gov. Nikki Haley, who is running for re-election this year, has threatened to veto any bill that includes a gas tax increase. The state's 16.5 cents-per-gallon tax is one of the lowest in the nation and was last raised in 1987.

Note: Haley has suggested that lawmakers use the difference between initial and final state revenue estimates, typically more than \$100 million a year, to provide extra funding for road and bridge needs.
