### Governor Nikki Haley News:

**Post and Courier:** Gov. Nikki Haley looks ahead to governing

Gov. Nikki Haley wants to let South Carolinians know that she is still overwhelmed by the trust voters placed in her on Tuesday - and that she feels a lot of responsibility over her second term.

**Note:** Haley discussed her plans for her new four-year term with reporters Thursday, two days after she crushed her main challenger, Democratic Sen. Vincent Sheheen, D-Camden, by 15 points - a margin about three times larger than her win over him in 2010.

**Ethics reform:** Aside from continuing to try to bring more jobs to the state, she said a top item on her agenda is ethics reform, something she has pushed for during the last two years.

**Infrastructure:** Haley took some heat during the campaign for saying that she would announce her plans for addressing the state's road system in January - well after the election. On Thursday, she continued to decline to elaborate on her roads plan.

**Domestic violence:** Haley said "I love" that the legislature has a criminal domestic violence committee working on the issue and that she was looking forward to working with lawmakers.

Gov. Nikki Haley said Thursday she's optimistic about getting ethics reform through the South Carolina Legislature next year. The newly re-elected Republican governor said the Legislature feels pressure following former House Speaker Bobby Harrell's guilty plea to campaign spending violations.

**Note:** "We've talked about cleaning up Columbia enough," Haley said in her victory speech Tuesday night, following her decisive win over state Sen. Vincent Sheheen. "This is the year we will clean up Columbia. This is the year we will make sure you trust your government again."

**Note:** "I'm very hopeful of a better working relationship with the House. ... It can't be any worse, right?" said Haley, who was a three-term House member from Lexington County when voters elected her governor in 2010. Speaking of Lucas, she added, "I think he has a true passion for wanting to move South Carolina forward."

**Note:** "I've never really had a lieutenant governor I could work with before. This is a real opportunity to show what a governor and lieutenant governor on the same ticket would look like," Haley said, adding their teamwork includes McMaster's ability to "advise us going forward every time we get sued."

Gov. Nikki Haley says her 15-point re-election win on Tuesday – three times larger than her victory margin in 2010 – was the result of her economic development push. Haley also addressed her still-undisclosed roads plan, the possibility of higher office and potential changes in cabinet while answering questions from reporters, including:

Governor Nikki Haley says she and her staff are already looking ahead to her second term. Haley told reporters she met with senior staff members Thursday morning in a post-election news conference. Haley talked about her expectations moving forward with the general assembly.

**Note:** "I'm excited about the fact that we're going to have a new speaker. I'm excited about the fact that we've worked really well with the senate these last two years. They've been very good to work with and so the fact that's we've got a little bit of a change in the dynamic gives me some hope," said Haley. "I really hope that we can all be on the same page. For me, I've always hoped and wished for a good relationship with the legislature."

**Note:** "Yesterday, I'd love to do it yesterday," said Haley. "We've got meetings scheduled going forward, but we're gonna look for a director we know can actually come in and carry it to another level in a way that we have that team approach for those caseworkers. That will really make a big difference." Haley says they're also looking at policy changes for the agency.

A special School Safety Task Force is working on its recommendations for making South Carolina schools safer, including recommending that an armed officer be put in every school in the state. But the group heard opposition Thursday from the American Civil Liberties Union of South Carolina.

They know what presence they need to have and I don't think we, as a state, need to be dictating-down on what they need to do. I think they know what's best to save their children,” she said Thursday.
