

10/03/2015	FEMA-3373-EM-SC	The President declared an Emergency Declaration for Direct Federal Assistance (DFA) for South Carolina in all 46 counties for Severe Storms and Flooding.
10/05/2015	FEMA-4241-DR-SC	The President signed a Major Disaster Declaration FEMA-4241-DR-SC for Severe Storms and Flooding on October 05, 2015. The declaration provides Individual Assistance for eight (8) counties (Charleston, Dorchester, Georgetown, Horry, Lexington, Orangeburg, Richland, and Williamsburg) and

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		Public Assistance for 11 counties (Berkeley, Charleston, Clarendon, Dorchester, Georgetown, Horry, Lexington, Orangeburg, Richland, Sumter, and Williamsburg counties) for debris removal and emergency protective measures (Categories A and B), including Direct Federal Assistance (DFA) under the Public Assistance program.
10/06/2015	Amendment No. 1	The President added three (3) counties for Individual Assistance (Berkley, Clarendon, and Sumter).
10/07/2015	Amendment No. 2	The President added five (5) counties for Individual Assistance (Calhoun, Darlington, Florence, Kershaw, and Lee).

8. Current Situation: Over \$45 million in Individual and Households Program (IHP) funds are approved and over \$43.2M disbursed. There are 70 maximum awards totaling over \$2M granted. All Individual and Public Assistance Preliminary Damage Assessments (PDAs) are complete as of COB October 21, 2015. 23 Disaster Recovery Center/Mobile Disaster Recovery Centers (DRC/MDRC) are open.

15. Threats or Disruptions to Infrastructure, Significant: National Weather Service (NWS) Flood Warning remained in effect for the Santee River near Jamestown (Berkeley County) as of 10/21/2015.

17a. Operations – Public Assistance (PA): All PA PDAs are complete as of COB 10/21/2015. Supported three (3) Applicant Briefings in Kershaw, Fairfield, and Lee counties. Removed 24,026 cubic yards of debris in Dorchester, Lexington, Richland, Sumter, and Georgetown counties as of COB 10/21/2015.

17b. Operations:

Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP): Participated in a strategy meeting with the State to identify disaster project types and priorities.

Community Education and Outreach (CEO): Mitigation Advisors provided 404 survivors with personal and property risk reduction information and guidance. The cumulative interview total is 2,838.

Floodplain Management and Insurance (FPM&I): Floodplain specialists contacted non-participating communities in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) to discuss NFIP requirements, benefits, and scheduled community visits. Insurance specialists supported DRC operations, the State Fair, and provided insurance policy claim assistance to 17 individuals.

Substantial Damage Estimator (SDE): Contacted 13 communities to obtain addresses of structures with substantial flood damage in order to perform field SDE inspections and populate SDE software. Analyzed and prioritized SDE inspection addresses input from Sumter County and the City of Sumter regarding SDE inspection addresses. Conducted SDE training classes for local officials in Orangeburg County.

Flood Recovery Office (FRO): Conducted quality claim reviews and reviewed claims submitted through the Community Claims Monitoring Initiative.

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17c. Operations – Disaster Survivor Assistance (DSA): Provided outreach support with Speakers Bureau in Lexington County. Continued to assist survivors with registrations, inquiries, whole community referrals, and the distribution of disaster materials.

ESF #3 – Public Works/Engineering: US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), in partnership with South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control (SCDHEC) inspected a total of 652 Class 1&2 dams: 176 are high hazard (C1) and in the event of failure, loss of life and economic loss will occur. 476 are significant hazard (C2) and in the event of failure, substantial economic losses will occur. The team also completed 30 of 75 reassessments of high concern dams.
