BACKGROUND: The goal for this event is to educate, engage, and support women to become successful business owners.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS:

1. Intro – it's a great day in South Carolina
 - a. Our economy is among the fastest growing in the nation.
 - b. More people working in SC than ever before. Our unemployment rate has fallen to 5.7%.

- c. Tens of thousands of new jobs announced. ex. (just recently, Volvo announced it is investing \$500 million and creating 4,000 new jobs)
 - d. Thousands from welfare-to-work (Approximately 30,000 recipients of TANF and/or SNAP found a job between Feb. 2011 and Jan. 2015)
 - e. Biggest education reform in decades.
2. So things are going well – we’re the envy of the nation – but we still have much more to do.
- f. Workforce – those jobs don’t mean anything if it’s not our people getting them.
 - 1. Get creative in how we train people.
 - 1. We’ve already started: opportunity centers in prisons (Manning), welfare-to-work successes.
 - 2. Who are we talking about?
 - 2. Single mom
 - 3. Liberal Arts student.
 - 4. Father of four.
 - 3. What do we propose doing for them? SUCCEED South Carolina.
 - 5. Opportunity Centers – culture change.
 - 6. Pay it forward – state loans for training that end in a JOB, not a certificate.
 - 7. Small business involvement – companies working with tech schools to develop programs that train workers to fill specific business needs.
3. Business Climate in SC
- g. In 2014, South Carolina ranked first in U.S. exports for tires and passenger automobiles, second in exports of gas turbines, and twelfth in civilian aircraft.
 - h. South Carolina’s exports continue to grow because we have built a reputation around the world as a great place to do business.
 - i. South Carolina ranked first for jobs linked to foreign investment.
 - j. Businesses from all over the world are interested in coming to South Carolina.
 - k. This is due in large part to our world-class workforce and business-friendly climate.
 - l. Large-scale manufacturers certainly have a significant impact, but small businesses are just as important to our economic future.
 - m. Small businesses account for 97% of our state’s total businesses.
 - n. Women in Business:
 - 4. Between 1997 and 2014, South Carolina's growth in women-owned businesses ranked 6th in the nation, with a 78% increase.
 - 5. In 2014, there were over 114,000 women owned firms.
 - 6. Need to focus on getting young women interested in business at a young age, especially in manufacturing and STEM-related fields.
 - 7. Continuously focus on STEM education and workforce readiness, both present and long-term need.
 - 8.
