Post and Courier: Nikki Haley: 'I will sit down and talk' if offered vice presidency

In what amounted to a coming-out party for her national aspirations, South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley said Wednesday she would listen to vice presidential offers, while acknowledging there's a long way to go before any of the 17 Republican White House contenders come courting.

Note: "If there is a time when a presidential candidate wants to talk, of course I will sit down and talk," Haley said during a speech Wednesday on the "New South" at the National Press Club.

Note: "Today there truly is a New South," she said in her prepared speech. "It is different in many ways, perhaps most especially in its attitudes toward race. We are still far from perfect. We still have our problems. There's still a lot more to do. But the New South, in many ways, is a place to look toward, rather than to look away from, when it comes to race relations and racial advancement."

Gov. Nikki Haley said Wednesday that South Carolina has shown that racial progress comes from listening to, not shouting at, one another. Noting the deaths of unarmed black men in cities across the country, Haley told the National Press Club in the nation's capital that black lives do matter. But they've been "disgracefully jeopardized" by the Black Lives Matter movement "that has laid waste" to Ferguson, Missouri, and Baltimore, she said to applause.

Note: "As a state, we came together - black and white, Republicans and Democrats," she said. "We didn't have riots, we had vigils. We didn't have violence, we had hugs."

Note: "The problem for our party is that our approach often appears cold and unwelcoming to minorities," she said. "It's on us to communicate our positions in ways that wipe away the clutter of prejudices."

Note: "With the grace of the aftermath of the Mother Emanuel church massacre, the world saw South Carolina as we are," she said. "We've been that way for some time now - it's just that a lot of people outside of our state never noticed."

S.C. Gov. Nikki Haley is generating buzz that she will be in the mix for the Republican vice presidential spot in 2016, following her successful handling of the removal of the Confederate flag from the State House grounds after the shooting deaths of nine African-Americans inside a historic Charleston church.

Note: "I'm not wasting any energy or any time thinking about that because I've got too much to do," Haley said after her speech. "I'm trying to continue to heal the state, we're trying to get back on track because we lost time, getting ready for a legislative session. . . . I've got a son in middle school. I got a daughter who's a senior in high school. I've a husband who just came back from Afghanistan."

Note: That said, she added, "If there's a time where a presidential nominee wants to sit down and talk, of course I will sit down and talk."

Note: "But the New South, in many ways, is a place to look toward, rather than away from, when it comes to race relations," Haley said.

Note: "As a state, we came together, black and white, Republican and Democrat," the governor said. "Two months, to the day, after the shooting of Walter Scott, our Republican-controlled General Assembly passed a body camera bill. A few days later, Mr. Scott's family stood with me when I signed the bill into law."

Note: "The Statehouse belongs to all people, and it needed to be welcoming to all people. That was not possible with that flag flying," Haley said.

Note: "If there is a time where a presidential nominee wants to sit down and talk, of course I will sit down and talk," she said in response to audience questions after delivering a speech promoting South Carolina. She touted the state's success in recruiting industry, expanding workforce training and avoiding violence in the aftermath of two racially charged shootings this year. .

It's not just black lives matter, we've got lots of groups that want to yell and scream. You can do that, but it's not going to get you anywhere."

vowing to use “all possible means” to keep terrorists in Guantanamo Bay and off American soil.

Members with the Department of Defense team surveyed the Consolidated Naval Brig in Hanahan Wednesday, and will again Thursday morning. Officials with the Department of Defense say the brig is one of several sites being considered to house terror detainees if the prison at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba is closed.

Even though the president signed this on his first day in office, Congress has never given him the support to move these terrorists into any of our states. We are absolutely drawing a line that we are not going to allow any terrorists to come into South Carolina.”

I will take that very personally the entire way so that the president, and Congress, and anyone involved in this decision understands that they are not wanted, they are not needed, and we will not accept them in South Carolina.”
