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Distilleries in the Carolinas

'Shine on!

Be very careful if you enjoy a drink made from Firefly Sweet Tea Vodka. You'll think you're on Granddad's porch sipping a southern staple. Trust me here – this adult beverage tastes like the real thing, but it packs a wallop. Delicious! Made with tea grown on the nearby Carolina Tea Plantation – you get a fresh farm-to-glass drink that's pure enjoyment.

There are 20+ distilleries in the Carolinas, with more jumping on board the beverage train every month. Some, like Firefly, are large enough operations to be found at retailers all over. Others are tiny, backroom distilleries, where folks can drop in and enjoy a taste, and buy a jar, or two from the source.

The names are as fanciful as the drinks, playing off the moonshine (or 'shine) folklore of the Appalachians. History and family recipes play a large part in the distilleries and the experts behind them are justifiably proud of using local ingredients and keeping the process as pure and natural as can be. (These are licensed businesses – none of the backwoods copper stills made famous from prohibition days.)

We haven't tasted them all, but plan on several road trips soon. Some of these companies receive rave reviews from foodies and locals who return, month after month, to stock up on distilled delights.

WOW Factor: The sheer creativity, hard work and pride that goes into these beverages. Descriptions often wax poetic and with good reason. At Dark Corner Distillery, near Greenville, SC, their Lewis Redmond Carolina Bourbon offers "rich aromas of molasses and peanut, with subtle notes of vanilla and toasted spice." At Six & Twenty Distillery, in nearby Piedmont, a whiskey called "Old Money" promises a soft, smooth, sweet, palatable taste." Asheville Distilling Company features Blonde Whiskey – "smooth and welcoming, velvety, vanilla, caramel" with locally grown wheat and corn.

The Outer Banks Distillery prides itself on being the first "legal" distillery on the Outer Banks of North Carolina. Located in historic downtown Manteo, they offer Kill Devil Rum tastings and soon, bottles of the good stuff. At Top of the Hill, in Chapel Hill, TOPO spirits are sourced locally and created using organic ingredients.

Hint: We've listed just a few of the distilleries we found in our search. Go online and you will find more southern-based drink recipes than you ever dreamed possible. You'll learn about renegades and outlaws, southern gentlemen and ladies, Native American princesses and good ole boys. You'll also discover a burgeoning cottage industry that is worthy of a road trip (or 20). As for me, I can't stop thinking about the Blackberry Moonshine from Carolina Moon Distillery in Edgefield, SC.

When we set out to discover more about the Graedons, we learned that they've got a wealth of experience that gives enormous credence to their words of wisdom. And so, although they may not be "famous faces," they're certainly "famous voices" that resonate from the Carolinas to everywhere public radio is heard and enjoyed.

Joe Graedon has a Master of Science degree in Pharmacology from the University of Michigan. He's a founding member of the Society for Participatory Science, and Co-editor of the Journal of Participatory Medicine. He's an adjunct assistant professor at the University of North Carolina Eshelman School of Pharmacy, and a founding member of the Patient Advocacy Council. He's been on the Dr. Oz Medical Advisory Board since 2012.

Terry Graedon has a Ph.D. in Anthropology from the University of Michigan. She was Postdoctoral Fellow in Medical Anthropology at the University of California, and was an assistant professor at the Duke University School of Nursing and adjunct assistant professor in Duke's Department of Anthropology. She's Co-editor of the Journal of Participatory Medicine, and a founding member of the Patient Advocacy Council.

Some folks call these "squishy chairs" but there's nothing squishy about the design aesthetic that brought Annie Evelyn to a three-year artist residency at Penland School of Crafts, in Penland, North Carolina. She's been on the cover of *American Craft Magazine* and been featured in dozens of publications – national and international. *Avant Garde* blogs tout her skills. Exhibitions in New York, Italy, New Orleans and China, among many others, have welcomed her work.

Ms. Evelyn started with furniture DNA. Before she was born, her grandparents owned a furniture company called Old Colony Furniture.
