

Gonzales Gardens To Be Dedicated This Afternoon

Home Project Is Named for Three Brothers

Gonzales Gardens will be dedicated at 5:30 this afternoon with services on Garden Plaza in the center of the project, off Forest Drive. The program has been arranged by the Housing Authority of Columbia and the public is invited to attend.

William Elliott, publisher of The State, will make the dedicatory address, after which a plaque in memory of the Gonzales brothers, for whom the project was named, will be unveiled by Miss H. R. E. Gonzales, a sister. Miss Eva Hampton a grandniece of the Gonzales, will lay a wreath at the foot of the plaque on behalf of The State company.

D. W. Robinson, Columbia attorney, will speak on "Public Housing in Columbia."

Music for the dedication will be furnished by the One Hundred Second Cavalry (Essex Troop) band and the Allen-Benedict Court chorus. The Essex band will also present a concert at 5 p. m. prior to the dedication.

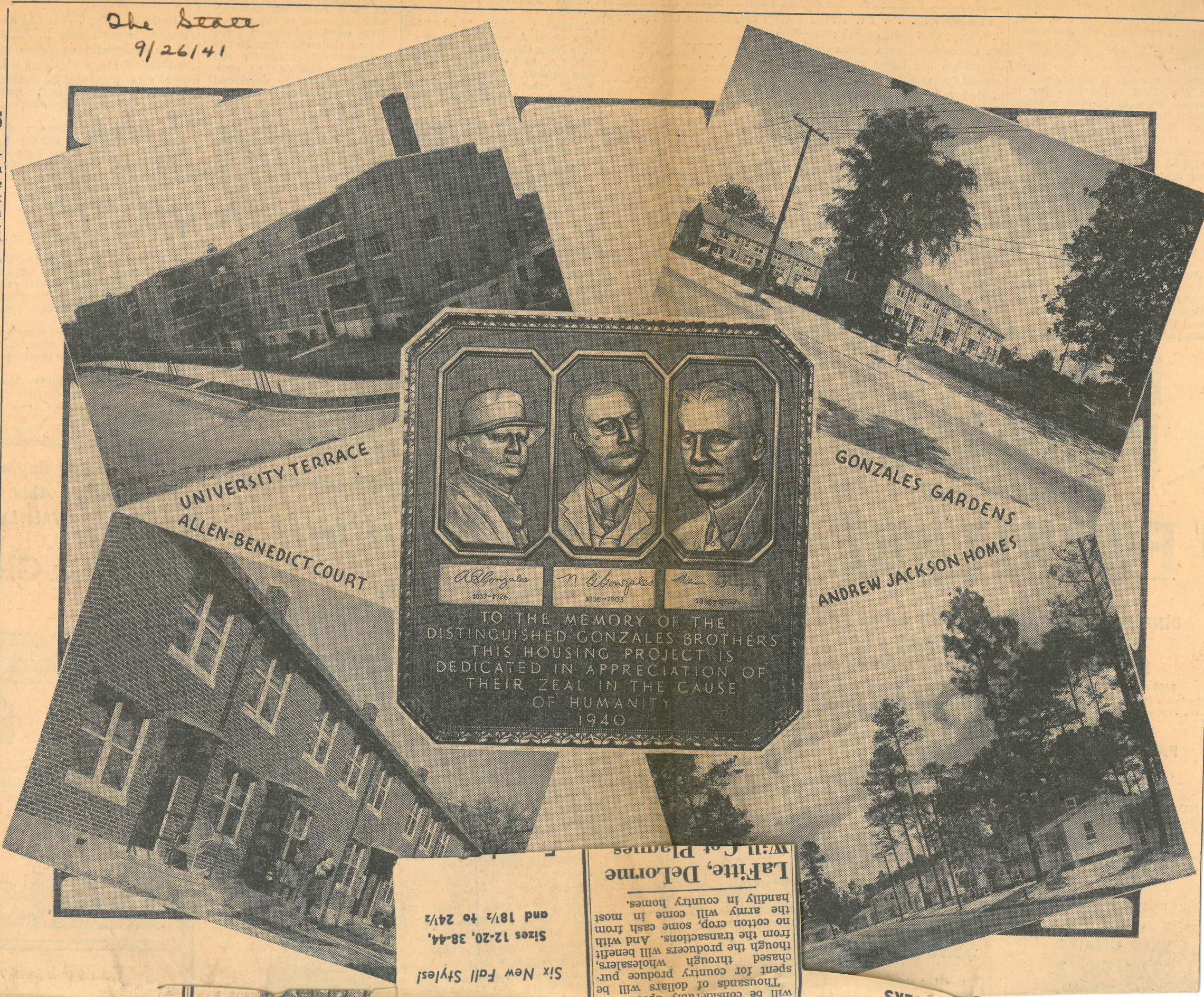
At the conclusion of the program, the project flag will be lowered by members of the Gonzales Gardens Boy Scouts and retreat will be sounded. The audience will be invited to inspect typical housing units.

The invocation is to be delivered by Capt. Gonzales Barron of the United States army. A special guest from the army will be Lieut. Col. Frank L. Whitaker, post executive. Of the 236 units at Gonzales Gardens, 100 are occupied by soldiers stationed at Fort Jackson and their families. These units were given to the soldiers by the Housing Authority upon request of fort officials.

Introduced on the program will be Governor Burnet R. Maybank, Mayor L. B. Owens and other distinguished guests. The service clubs and various organizations in the city, including the University of South Carolina and the American Legion, will attend the ceremonies as guests of the Housing authority.

The South Carolina Press association, of which William E. Gonzales was president, will send a special delegation, including the following: McDavid Horton, editor of The State; G. A. Buchanan, editor of the Columbia Record; Col. E. H. DeCamp of Gaffney; W. R. Bradford of Fort Mill; J. M. O'Dowd of Florence; J. Irby Koon of Spartanburg; H. C. Booker of Batesburg; B. P.
