Signs of a steady economic recovery are reflected within the first draft of the city of Greenville's proposed \$131 million budget as revenues generated by tourists, businesses and new construction continue to swell city coffers. If approved, the budget would come with three percent employee raises and some fee adjustments, but no tax increase. Wastewater fees would rise five percent and stormwater 2.1 percent, city documents show. Property tax millage would remain at 85.4.

Columbia streets and parks will have about 800 more security cameras and police and 911 dispatchers will get extra raises in January, City Council decided Tuesday in a political version of a security sweep. Council dipped into six pots of money to get the cash to finance the proposals – \$700,000 for cameras and \$400,000 for mid-year, 3.3 percent pay raises – in next fiscal year's budget for the public safety improvements.

Federal regulators on Tuesday warned several companies that the quick, easy background checks they are providing online might violate the Fair Credit Reporting Act. The Federal Trade Commission sent warning letters to 10 businesses, including sites like 4Nannies.com and USA People Search, after FTC staff posed as employers and creditors looking for information that could be used to deny a person a job, an apartment or even insurance.

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
