Preamble

We the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish Justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general welfare and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves, and our posterity, do ordain and establish the Constitution for the United States of America.

The local mental Health Center in Aiken South Carolina 29801 has charged my insurance company over six hundred thousand dollars and still havn't bought me (Clarence KEY) a house yet. A three hundred thousand dollar house would be nice.

The local mental health in Aiken South Carolina made me work and didn't pay from 4-18-2008 until 3-10-2015, Patient Employee 9103075 Social Security 250-25-4928

Article 1

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Congress Shall Make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof or abridging the freedom of speech or the press or the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

Article 2

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

Article 3

No soldier shall in time of peace be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

Article 4

The right of the people to be secure in their persons houses papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures shall not be violated and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

Article 5

No person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces or in the militia when in actual service in time of war, or public danger, nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb, nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life liberty, or property without due process of the law, nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

Article 6

6 In all criminal prosecution, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by a impartial Jury of the state and districts wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature, and cause of the accusation to be confronted with the witnesses against him, to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

Article 7

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of a trial by Jury shall be preserved, and no fact trial by a Jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

Article 8

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fine imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted.

The enumeration in the constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

Article 9

10. The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the state, are reserved to the state respectively, or to the people.
