2000-2001 LIFE Scholarship Program

The Legislative Incentives for Future Excellence (LIFE) Scholarship was established by the General Assembly during the 1998 legislative session and was signed into law on Friday, June 19, 1998. The LIFE Scholarship Program is a merit-based scholarship designed to increase access to higher education, improve the employability of South Carolina's students, provide incentives for students to be better prepared for college, improve SAT scores, and encourage students to graduate from college on time.

During the 2000 legislative session, the General Assembly approved an increase to the LIFE Scholarship award amount. Students who attended a four-year public or independent institution received up to \$3,000, while students who attended a two-year public or independent institution received up to the cost of tuition and fees for thirty credit hours or its equivalent.

In order to qualify for the LIFE Scholarship for the 2000-2001 academic year, students were required to earn a 3.0 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale and earn a minimum score of 1050 on the SAT (22 ACT).

To renew or gain scholarship eligibility, the student was required to:

- 1) meet all general eligibility criteria;
- 2) enroll full-time (at least 12 credit hours);
- 3) enroll as a degree-seeking undergraduate student;
- 4) earn a minimum 3.0 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale by the end of the academic year (fall, spring, summer); and

- 5) earn an average of 30 credit hours each academic year (fall, spring, summer) equaling a minimum of 30 credit hours if a rising sophomore, 60 credit hours if a rising junior, or 90 credit hours if a rising senior.

As of September 4, 2001, the Commission on Higher Education awarded 17,269 students, totaling \$46.4 million for the 2000-2001 academic year. The following reports provide: the number of students awarded and the amount of funds dispersed; recipients by classification; retention; ethnicity; first-time entering freshman by county of origin; and recipients by county of origin.

(as of 5/30/01)


Students receiving the scholarship in fall 1999 retained the scholarship in fall 2000 at a rate of 61.1%. First-time entering freshman in fall 1999 retained the scholarship in fall 2000 at a rate of 45.0% as compared to sophomores, 79.1% and juniors, 80.3%. The lower retention rate among freshman is likely due to the unique college adjustment issues they confront. However, the retention rate has increased 1.5% since last year.

2001-02 Palmetto Fellows Scholarship Awards

The Palmetto Fellows Scholarship Program is a merit-based scholarship program designed to recognize the most academically talented high school seniors in S.C. and encourage them to attend college in the State. During the 2001-02 academic year, each Palmetto Fellow could receive a scholarship of up to \$5,000 per year for a maximum of eight full-time terms. The scholarship must be applied towards the cost-of-attendance to pursue the first baccalaureate degree at a participating senior institution in the State.

In order to be eligible to apply for a Palmetto Fellows Scholarship, a student must meet the following minimum academic requirements: (1) score at least 1200 on the SAT or 27 on the ACT; (2) earn a 3.5 cumulative GPA on the Uniform Grading Scale through the end of the junior year; and (3) rank in the top five percent of the class at the end of either the sophomore or the junior year. For the 2002 cohort of first-time entering freshmen, the Commission on Higher Education received 1318 applications. 1022 new scholarships were awarded to students with an average SAT score of 1310 (ACT scores were converted to SAT). Of the 1002 Palmetto Fellows Scholarships awarded, 8% were to minority applicants.

For the 2001-02 academic year, 2641 Palmetto Fellows were awarded and \$12.6 million was disbursed. The following pages provide detailed reports to include: number of Palmetto Fellows awarded and amount disbursed per institution; retention statistics, 2002 first-time entering Palmetto Fellows awarded by institution; 2002 applicants by county of origin; and, 2002 first-time entering Fellows by county of origin.



2001-02 South Carolina Need-based Grant Awards

The South Carolina General Assembly established the South Carolina Need-Based Grants Program in 1996 to provide additional financial assistance to South Carolina's neediest students. Students are required to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form to be considered for the Need-based Grant. The S.C. Higher Education Tuition Grants Commission administers the program for students attending independent institutions in South Carolina. For students attending public institutions, the offices of financial aid administer the program.

Full-time students may receive up to \$2,500 per year and part-time students may receive up to \$1,250 per year. Based on the results of the FAFSA and available funding, the institution determines exact award amounts. The grant must be applied directly towards the cost-of-attendance. Recipients may receive a Need-based Grant for a maximum of eight full-time equivalent semesters toward the first one-year certificate or diploma, associate degree, and baccalaureate degree.

On the following pages, we have provided the number of recipients and the average award at each institution, the number of Grant recipients by student level, the number of recipients by enrollment status, the number of recipients by ethnic group, and the number of recipients by county. For the 2001-02 academic year, the State Need-based Grants Program received \$12 million in funding and awarded 8,797 grants with an average award amount of \$1,079 at public institutions and 10,982 grants with an average award amount of \$228 at private institutions.

2001-02 South Carolina National Guard Student Loan Repayment Program

During the 2001 legislative session, the General Assembly approved Act 41. The Commission on Higher Education, in consultation with the South Carolina Student Loan Corporation, developed a loan repayment program for providing incentives for enlisting or remaining for a specified time in both the South Carolina Army and Air National Guards (SCNG) in areas of critical need *. The Commission on Higher Education must define areas of critical need annually in consultation with the Adjutant General. The Commission on Higher Education promulgated regulation to set forth the following terms of the loan repayment program:

- Must enlist, reenlist, accept a warrant or be commissioned for a term of at least six years and, at the time of enlistment, meet a critical needs area
- Must be a legal resident of South Carolina
- Must maintain satisfactory performance in the National Guard
- Must submit an application each year to Commission on Higher Education in order to be eligible for loan repayment
- Eligible student loans may be repaid at the rate of \$4500 per year for a maximum of four years
- Payments made directly to the loan provider
- Eligible loans are guaranteed under part B, part D, or part E of Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, must not be in default and be at least one year old

The following 2001-02 report provides: names of the loan providers who received payment; the amount of funds disbursed to each loan provider; and, the number of service members who received loan repayment.
