TIME: GOP Faces Divergent Paths After South Carolina

Standing triumphantly on stage in South Carolina, Florida Senator Marco Rubio seemed to be the paragon of a modern, more diverse Republican Party. The symbolism was hard to miss as South Carolina's first Indian-American female governor and first African-American Senator flanked the would-be first Cuban-American President.

Note: "Take a picture of this, because the new group of conservatives that's taking over America looks like a Benetton commercial," quipped South Carolina Governor Nikki Haley of the grouping Thursday. On Saturday night, she declared Rubio the leader of their "new conservative movement."

Marco Rubio's rebound here in South Carolina was more than just Gov. Nikki Haley's endorsement. It was rooted in years of methodical planning, building inroads with the state's political power players, developing a deep network of donors stemming from his 2010 Senate race and hiring well-connected South Carolina-bred operatives who had circled February 20 on the calendar as a possible turning point in the race.

Note: What gave Rubio a late boost was Haley's endorsement this week, which both Rubio, Bush and Texas Sen. Ted Cruz had heavily sought. Rubio had met with Haley once, but rumors about the popular governor potentially backing the senator had persisted for weeks. It was not locked down until the day it became public, a sign that his momentum was growing.

Stanley Beard is thankful to be done with chasing squirrels through his north Columbia home. The furry pests for years had taken up residence with Beard, 67, a retired widower who lacked the money or physical strength to repair a hole in his home's roof.

Note: More than a dozen nonprofits so far have received funding through the One S.C. Flood Relief Fund, set up by the Central Carolina Community Foundation and endorsed by Gov. Nikki Haley.

Note: The fund's first round of grants, amounting to \$500,000, helped nonprofits repair about 350 homes in 13 counties across the state, said Dana Fulmer, who directs the fund. Another 244 homes will be repaired using funds from the second round of grants, Fulmer said.

The areas of South Carolina influencing major statewide Republican elections are shifting. Clout is no longer just coming from major cities or specific regions of the state. Instead, new S.C. residents along the Grand Strand and angry GOP voters in rural counties are exerting increasing influence.

Note: In 2010, Nikki Haley, then a backbench state lawmaker running as a Tea Party candidate, won the Republican primary for governor over two establishment candidates — a state attorney general and congressman.

Note: In all three of the elections, GOP voters in 14 counties handed the non-establishment candidate — Haley, Gingrich or Trump -- big victories with results above their statewide tallies.

Note: U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio of Florida received endorsements from three top S.C. Republicans — Haley, U.S. Sen. Tim Scott and U.S. Rep. Trey Gowdy.

Note: But Wilson suggested he wasn't going to be a footsoldier for Rubio as Gowdy, Scott and Haley have been.

Cruz, meanwhile, faced a ceaseless barrage of attacks from every direction.

The cracks in Jeb Bush's candidacy for president surfaced before he formally entered the race. It was meant to be like any other primetime appearance on Fox News: an opportunity for a son and brother of former presidents to tout his conservative credentials and record as a two-term governor of Florida.

Note: By midweek, South Carolina governor Nikki Haley delivered what one Bush aide described as "a gut punch". She had chosen to endorse Senator Marco Rubio, Bush's onetime ally turned rival, rewriting the narrative days before a primary critical to the direction of the two Floridian campaigns.

Note: Although the Bush campaign sought to downplay the impact of Haley's endorsement, Bush himself had referred to it only the day before as "the most powerful, meaningful one in the state."
