On background here is a bio/ accomplishments one pager for the governor to help you out with your story.

Governor Nikki R. Haley 116th Governor of the State of South Carolina Biography

Elected governor on November 2, 2010; re-elected on November 4, 2014, by the largest margin of victory for a South Carolina gubernatorial candidate in 24 years

Youngest governor in the United States (age 43)

Elected governor at age 38

First woman and first minority governor of South Carolina

First Indian American woman governor in American history

Born in Bamberg, the daughter of Indian immigrants

- One of four children; two brothers, one sister; brother Mitti Randhawa served in Operation Desert Storm

Graduated from Clemson University with a B.S. in accounting

Married husband Michael Haley in 1996

- Michael Haley is Captain in the Army National Guard and a combat veteran who was deployed to Afghanistan's Helmand Province in 2013
- Two children: Rena, who is 17 and a high school senior, and Nalin, who is 14 and in middle school

In her first run for office in 2004, Nikki Haley challenged State Rep. Larry Koon, the longest serving member of the S.C. House of Representatives, for the Republican nomination to represent Lexington County's District 87 and won in a runoff. Won November general election.

- Served 3 terms in the S.C. House of Representatives (2004, 2006, 2008)

Announced candidacy for the Republican nomination for governor in May 2009

- Republican gubernatorial field included: Congressman Gresham Barrett (SC-03), Lieutenant Governor Andre Bauer and Attorney General Henry McMaster
- Securing 49 percent of the vote, nearly won the Republican nomination for governor outright on June 8, 2010
- Won Republican nomination for governor on June 22, 2010, defeating Congressman Gresham Barrett in runoff 65-35 percent
- Elected governor of South Carolina on November 2, 2010, defeating Democrat State Sen. Vincent Sheheen 51.4 – 47.0 percent

### Under Governor Haley South Carolina Is On The Move

Under Governor Haley more than 72,000 jobs have been announced in 45 of 46 counties and over \$17.5 billion has been invested in our state. (South Carolina Department of Commerce)

- Gov. Haley announced over 7,000 jobs in one day, making it the largest announcement of jobs in a single day in state history. ("7,100 new jobs: Biggest day of job announcements in South Carolina history," The Times and Democrat, 6/16/14)

Hi Chaney,

Thanks for getting back to me. My name is Nick Fouriezos, I'm a reporter with [Ozy.com](http://Ozy.com), a global online magazine that reaches about 20 million readers per month. We write about emerging trends and forward-looking ideas across a variety of global topics from politics to culture to sports and share content with a number of partners, including USA Today, NPR and CNN.

We're writing an article about Gov. Haley as a potential VP candidate and one of the most fascinating rising figures in politics, a virtual "Need to Know" for a national audience. In this section, we've interviewed and profiled people like Rhode Island Gov. Gina Raimondo, likely-House Speaker Kevin McCarthy and South Carolina's very own Brett Doster, who is working on the Bush campaign.

I know it's a very hectic week for your staff — God bless, and good luck by the way — but I wanted to reach out for comment on a few questions, which I've included below. Also, if there is any chance we could get a short phone call interview with the Governor, that would be very welcome, her schedule permitting; The story won't run for another month, at least, so we could work it out a week or two from now if needed.

I have other questions, more about her as a stereotype-defying, hard-hitting governor whose won jobs for the state (I'm from Georgia myself, so kudos to your win on the Volvo plant), but these are the questions I absolutely need comment on, if at all possible:

**Questions for comment:**

1. When Gov. Haley took her trip to the Golden Temple of Amritsar last year, was that on an official capacity or as an ordinary tourist, so to speak? Did she have any remarks about how that trip went, her thoughts from it, when she returned, that I might be able to use?

2. Gov. Haley received universal praise for her decision to remove the Confederate flag from the state house, but what are her thoughts on the fact that a year before she had not thought a decision like that was needed or relevant? (referencing statements she gave that business leaders hadn't approached her with concerns over it)

3. Gov. Haley's religion and upbringing has obviously shaped her — how has the dual nature of her Sikh Indian heritage and Christian faith played a role in her views toward social justice, race relations and other national and state issues?

4. I've had some political scientists tell me that Gov. Haley might not survive the vetting process for a national race, for VP for example, based on some of those affair allegations that were thrown around in that S.C. primary a while back. What has been her response to such accusations, either now or in the past? I'm not a particularly close watcher of S.C. politics, but does Gov. Haley believe there's been an abnormal amount of aggressiveness towards her based on external factors of her being a different sort of candidate, as a woman, outside challenger and first Sikh-Indian raised governor in S.C.?

Thank you for any help you can give Chaney — it's much appreciated.
