### Governor Nikki Haley News:

**Associated Press:** Ex-Sen. Lugar says MOX facility vital to nuke agreement

Finishing a South Carolina plutonium reprocessing project is critical to keeping up the U.S. end of a critical nonproliferation deal with Russia, one of the federal lawmakers instrumental in the agreement said Thursday after touring the facility that's still under construction.

**Note:** But the project is years behind schedule and billions over its original budget. Last week, Gov. Nikki Haley told South Carolina's attorney general that she wants to sue the U.S. Department of Energy for the agency's failure to meet completion deadlines.

**Note:** Haley warned Energy Secretary Ernest Moniz in December that the state would be forced to sue if his agency didn't start making payments. A clause in the law, however, makes the fine "subject to the availability of appropriations."

A month into the legislative session state senators are no closer to finding a way to fix South Carolina's crumbling roads but they spent hours arguing over their inability to officially debate the issue. Senate Majority Leader Harvey Peeler criticized his colleagues Thursday for "dilly-dallying" on the public's top priority.

**Note:** That's because Gov. Nikki Haley has pledged to veto any legislation that increases gas taxes without cutting income taxes and restructuring the Department of Transportation.

Senate Majority Leader Harvey Peeler of Gaffney watched the Senate meet for a month without taking up the issue he said most South Carolinians want addressed and he couldn't take it anymore. So Peeler took to the floor Thursday to lecture his colleagues about the delay and pleaded with them to start the debate on road funding.

**Note:** Peeler asked the Senate to take up a controversial DOT restructuring bill immediately, saying restructuring was one of four "hurdles" any roads bill had to clear before something could be passed, the others being funding, tax relief and a possible veto by Gov. Nikki Haley.

**Note:** The issues were linked by Haley a year ago when she said she would approved a 10-cent increase in the gas tax if lawmakers also agreed to an income tax cut and a new way of picking highway commissioners.

Advocacy for the Savannah River Site MOX facility continued Thursday when former U.S. Sen. Richard Lugar said shutting down the facility would be "catastrophic." Lugar, a former Republican senator from Indiana, spent Thursday morning touring the Mixed Oxide Fuel Fabrication Facility – the main building in the MOX project that is expected to convert 34 metric tons of weapons-grade plutonium into commercial nuclear fuel.

The town of Pawleys Island will pay \$665 an hour for a contractor to push up sand on the island's narrow south end to rebuild a dune damaged by storms in October. Work is scheduled to start March 1. Town Council awarded a contract this week to Goodson Construction of Darlington.

**Note:** The council also approved a contract with Beam and Associates to lobby the legislature for a share of \$40 million Gov. Nikki Haley put in her budget for beach nourishment. The town wants \$3 million.

During the February 1 North Myrtle Beach City Council meeting, City Council passed second (final) reading of an ordinance that provides an exception to the prohibition against the use of tents on the beach between May 15 and Sept. 15 by allowing "baby tents" to be placed on the beach during that time frame to provide shade only for "persons 18 months of age or under."

**Note:** City Council passed a resolution in support of Gov. Nikki Haley's \$40 million budget request for beach restoration. The governor's proposed budget includes \$40 million for beach renourishment in recognition of the importance of South Carolina beaches to the state's tourism economy.
