## **Former President Dwight Eisenhower:**

Excerpts [ Emphasis added ]:

"We now stand ten years past the midpoint of **a century** that has witnessed **four major wars** among great nations."

continued...

"Until the latest of our world conflicts, the United States had no armaments industry. American makers of plowshares could, with time and as required, make swords as well. But we can no longer risk emergency improvisation of national defense; we have been compelled to create **a permanent armaments industry of vast proportions**. Added to this, three and a half million men and women are directly engaged in the defense establishment. ..." [ continued ]

"Now this **conjunction of an immense military establishment and a large arms industry** is new in the American experience. The total influence - economic, political, even spiritual -- is felt in every city, every State house, every office in the Federal government. We recognize the imperative need for this development. Yet we must not fail to comprehend its grave implications. Our toil, resources and livelihood are all involved; so is the very structure of our society."

"In the councils of government, we must guard against the acquisition of unwarranted influence, whether sought or unsought, by **the military-industrial complex**. The potential for the disastrous rise of misplaced power exists and will persist."

"We must never let the weight of this combination endanger our liberties or democratic processes. We should take nothing for granted. Only an alert and knowledgeable citizenry can compel the proper meshing of **the huge industrial and military machinery** of defense with our peaceful methods and goals, so that security and liberty may prosper together."

The Central Intelligence Agency was created on 26 July 1947, when Harry S. Truman <[https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Harry\\_S.\\_Truman](https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Harry_S._Truman)> signed the National Security Act

And if I'd known what was going to happen, I never would have done it.... But it got out of hand....

Now as nearly as I can make out, those fellows in **the CIA** don't just report on **wars** and the like, **they go out and make their own** and there is nobody to keep track of what they are up to. They spend billions of dollars on stirring up trouble so they will have something to report on. They've become ... it's become a government of all its own and all secret. They just don't have to report to anybody...." [ emphasis added ]
