South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley is holding one-on-one meetings with residents in Union. Haley is scheduled to meet with constituents Saturday afternoon at Union City Hall. Those who wanted time with the Republican governor needed to make appointments on Friday. Appointments are set on a first-come, first-served basis. Haley says she'll discuss any issue. Haley has held constituent meetings across the state since becoming governor in January 2011. The meetings continue a tradition started by her predecessor, former-governor-turned-congressman Mark Sanford.

Required vaccines for those children entering seventh grade are also available for free.

"Butch" Otter's office. Bennett is facing charges for allegedly taking her four children to Idaho instead of returning them to their father July 7.

For President Barack Obama, August was supposed to be the month a sweeping immigration bill landed on his desk. There was hope for movement on a grand deficit deal with Republicans, and in the optimistic early days of his second term, even a belief that Obama would have already achieved stricter gun laws. Instead, Obama finds his fifth year in office beset by distractions — perhaps none with broader domestic and foreign policy implications than the revelation of secret government surveillance programs. The matter dominated Obama's hour long news conference Friday, with the issues the White House had hoped to be promoting this summer either playing a diminished role or none at all.

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
