Washington Post: The march against the Confederate flag continued Thursday — this time in Congress

A year after America suddenly and overwhelmingly began unraveling itself from the Confederate flag, here's more evidence our relationship with it is ending. On Thursday, the House of Representatives — including 84 Republicans — voted to make it illegal to drape or hoist the flag prominently in national veterans' cemeteries, including over mass graves. Those who want to mark their ancestors' spot with a Confederate flag could do so with a small one, but only on two days a year: Memorial Day and Confederates Memorial Day.

Note: "That flag, while an integral part of our past, does not represent the future of our great state," said South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley (R), who led the charge. Shortly after the shooting, South Carolina lawmakers heeded Haley's call and voted to take down the Confederate flag from state Capitol grounds in an emotional debate. The flag fell in Alabama as well as on the campus of the University of Mississippi. And a design change to Mississippi's flag, which is dominated by the rebel cross, was put to a vote there. (Voters decided to keep it as-is.)

Note: This week, House Democrats also tried (but failed) to take down the Confederate flag flying at the Citadel — which is about two miles from the Charleston church, Marcos notes. But Democrats trying to take down the Confederate flag got further Thursday than they ever had.

WJBF: SC Abortion Bill Heading to Gov.'s Desk for Expected Signature

A bill that would ban abortions in South Carolina after the 19th week of pregnancy is heading to Gov. Nikki Haley's desk, after the state House gave its final approval Tuesday. She's expected to sign it because she said in March, after the Senate passed the bill, "By nature, I have always signed pro-life bills and I can't imagine any scenario where I wouldn't sign it." The bill does have exceptions for a medical emergency or severe fetal anomaly, but would not allow abortions in cases of rape or incest. Bill co-sponsor Rep. Donna Hicks, R-Boiling Springs, says a woman who is raped or the victim of incest still has almost five months to get an abortion.

Larry Martin said Thursday he could not name the candidate or provide details because the commission has already sent the candidates to a Wednesday vote by the General Assembly. Martin says the rule was broken before the candidates were allowed to ask lawmakers for their votes, so the Legislature could send the matter back to the committee.

With just two weeks left in the session and one more committee meeting scheduled between now and the June 2 adjournment, the bill stands little chance of becoming law.

Top state education and economic officials helped sway senators to stall a bill reversing a school district policy allowing students to use restrooms with which they identify. Third reading was delayed Thursday, preventing the bill from heading to the House for a vote by members of the delegation. The bill would require Berkeley County students to use the restroom that corresponds with their gender at the time of birth. The bill only affects county schools and only the 2016-17 school year, but prominent state officials worry it would jeopardize \$870 million in federal education dollars and perspective economic development.

The House of Representatives voted to bar the Confederate flag from being flown at cemeteries operated by the Department of Veterans Affairs in the latest movement against displaying the rebel banner at federal sites. Thursday's vote was the first of its kind to be allowed to proceed on the House of Representatives floor since the June 2015 racially charged shooting of nine black parishioners at Charleston's Mother Emanuel AME Church. Eighty-four Republicans joined with nearly all of the Democrats in the 260-164 vote in favor of the amendment. All six of the Republicans in the South Carolina delegation voted against it.

The soldier in the gas mask goes by "Unbreakable." He's been seen along Ga. 144 on Saturday mornings, determined and steady as he runs, oxygen intake dramatically reduced and heat building between the black plastic and his face. The black Special Operations gas mask doesn't leave his head until he gets to his unit's Fort Stewart compound - 18 miles later. That's nothing compared to what the 3rd Infantry Division soldier, Sgt. 1st Class Augusto "Tito" Piñeiro, plans to do Friday. The 37-year-old aims to run for 100 miles straight in Greenville, South Carolina, while wearing the oxygen-restricting device. If Piñeiro succeeds, he will, by default, surpass the 41-mile world record for distance run in a gas mask.

Associated Press: House would ban Confederate flags on VA cemetery flagpoles

he House voted on Thursday to ban the display of the Confederate flag on flagpoles at federal veterans' cemeteries. The 265-159 vote would block descendants and others seeking to commemorate veterans of the Confederate States of America from flying the Confederate Battle Flag over mass graves on the two days a year that flag displays are permitted. California Democrat Jared Huffman drafted the prohibition, saying the flag represents "racism, slavery and division."

Oklahoma lawmakers have moved to effectively ban abortion in their state by making it a felony for doctors to perform the procedure, an effort the bill's sponsor said Thursday is aimed at ultimately overturning the U.S. Supreme Court's 1973 decision that legalized abortion nationwide. The bill, which abortion rights group Center for Reproductive Rights says is the first of its kind in the nation, also would restrict any physician who performs an abortion from obtaining or renewing a license to practice medicine in Oklahoma. It passed 33-12 Thursday with no discussion or debate.

Morley Safer, the veteran "60 Minutes" correspondent who was equally at home reporting on social injustices, the Orient Express and abstract art, and who exposed a military atrocity in Vietnam that played an early role in changing Americans' view of the war, died Thursday, according to Kevin Tedesco, a CBS News publicist. Safer, who had been in declining health, died at his home in Manhattan. He announced his retirement last week and "60 Minutes" aired a tribute hour on Sunday, which he watched from his home, Tedesco said.

Donald Trump kept himself planted firmly in the political spotlight this week with one headline-grabbing move after another — launching a social media defense of his treatment of women, listing possible Supreme Court nominees, rapidly declaring an Egyptian plane crash an act of terrorism. His likely general election opponent, Hillary Clinton, seemed content to hang in the background. But Clinton's stay-above-the-fray attitude masks unresolved questions that have gnawed at her campaign since Trump virtually locked up the Republican nomination.

Associated Press: Terrorism suspected in crash of Egyptian plane; 66 missing

An EgyptAir jetliner en route from Paris to Cairo with 66 people aboard swerved wildly in flight and crashed in the Mediterranean Sea early Thursday, authorities said. Egyptian and Russian officials said it may have been brought down by terrorists. There were no immediate signs of survivors. EgyptAir Flight 804, an Airbus A320 with 56 passengers and 10 crew members, went down about halfway between the Greek island of Crete and Egypt's coastline after takeoff from Charles de Gaulle Airport, authorities said.

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
