

Emotions run high as Mt. Holly smelter begins shutdown process

contract workers. Brown said a lot of employees didn't think the plant would close, but the reality is starting to set in. "Now it really boils down to the end of the year, and they know the end of the year is final."

Century has said it will shut down the Mount Holly plant by Dec. 31 if a new electric contract isn't signed with Moncks Corner-based utility Santee Cooper. The two sides have been at a stalemate over the terms of such an agreement.

Santee Cooper spokeswoman Mollie Gore declined to comment Monday on Century's pending closure. The state-owned utility has said it is willing to continue negotiating but can't agree to a deal that would raise rates for its other customers.

On Monday, Century began shutting down one of its two pot lines, the power-hungry furnaces where high-quality aluminum is made. There are 90 pots to each line and workers must extract as much metal as possible from each of them before disconnecting the electricity. The more aluminum that's left in a pot, the harder it would be to restart the system at some future date. Shutting down the pot line will take several days. The second pot line is scheduled to shut down starting Dec. 26.

Mike Bless, Century's president and CEO, has said it would cost too much money — between \$20 million and \$40 million — to restart the plant if both lines are shut down. Mount Holly operates around the clock, but it previously shut down during Hurricane Hugo in September 1989.

A.J. Nelson, the plant's safety manager, said some workers hold out hope that a deal can be struck to keep that second pot line running through next year while negotiations for a new agreement continue. Berkeley County's legislative delegation met Monday with

Lonnie Carter, Santee Cooper's president and CEO, to discuss possible solutions.

"It was a good discussion and Santee Cooper confirmed our willingness to extend essentially the same terms of Century's current contract for Mount Holly for three years, with an option for Century to cancel the contract after six months," the utility said in a statement issued Monday evening.

The six-month period would let the state Legislature explore ways to keep Mount Holly operating, perhaps through state budget expenditures or special legislation, during the upcoming General Assembly session, which starts in January.

Century has said it will not accept an extension of the current deal and spokeswoman Samantha Dubay said the smelter will begin laying off workers next week. About half of the plant's 600 workers will be affected by the initial pot line shutdown.

"It would hurt a whole lot of people," said Robert Jefferson, a Mount Holly supervisor. "You've got a whole lot of

people who are upset because they don't know when they are going to get laid off. There's a lot of uncertainty. But there's always faith."

"I feel like Santee Cooper is just throwing us away," she said. "It's heartbreaking."

Under the current electric contract, Mount Holly gets 75 percent of its power from an out-of-state provider on the open market and 25 percent from Santee Cooper. Century Aluminum wants to buy all of its power on the open market.

Santee Cooper's board of directors said again last week that the Century proposal is a nonstarter because it would raise rates for its other industrial customers. That's because the 25 percent of power Mount Holly buys from the utility pays all of the costs associated with bringing power to the plant.

Century has offered to pay Santee Cooper to transmit power if it's allowed to buy it on the open market, but Carter, the utility's CEO, has said the offer wouldn't cover the utility's costs.

The open market savings would be substantial for Century — about half of what Santee Cooper currently charges. The lower rate is due to the out-of-state provider using cheap natural gas — instead of coal, which Santee Cooper primarily uses — to produce electricity.

They already have one line down, and three hundred people will be lay-off soon right now, don't know what going to happen, but in the mean time, before it happen, I need your help.
